## **CHAPTER 1**

#### **AN INVITATION**

The reader may wish to visit APPENDIX 1 to review "The Program" of "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library 2016 Luncheon Seminar." APPENDIX 2 shall provide the reader the opportunity to explore and discover supporting **Story Bookmarks** (**SB**) authored by The STAR DAY Foundation (**SB 30**) as a supporting Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group) (**SB 1**) after-school library expanded learning opportunities network curriculum sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. The complete digital Story Bookmark Collection of The Group is archived at "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library." The **SB** notation refers to a Story Bookmark in Appendix 2 used to provide the reader with additional information in association with various words and phrases used in this Immediate Release.

The Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group) "invites" every Texas student and their families and student friends of Texas worldwide to join a Texas conservation, preservation and restoration collective and collaborative service achievement of merit effort proposed by The Group called **THE STATE OF TEXAS TREASURE** "MY BISONSTAR" PROJECT (The Project) sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation with the support of parents, grandparents and others. "BisonStar" is the "Official Mascot (SB 3)" of The Texas Bison Student Study Group. She is a member of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas (SB 6)" at the majestic 15,000 acre Caprock Canyons State Park (SB 2). BisonStar was born at the park during May 2013.

The main goal of The Project is to support additional Texas conservation, preservation and restoration initiatives proposed by The Texas Bison Student Study Group of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" and the majestic 15,000 acre Caprock Canyons State Park land whose main entrance is just three (3) miles north of the City of Quitaque know known as "The Official State Bison Capital of Texas (SB 7)" as a "Service Achievement of Merit (SAM)" STAR DAY 175<sup>th</sup> birthday gift for the State of Texas.

On February 19, 2021 Texans shall gather at the State of Texas Capitol grounds in Austin to celebrate the anniversary of the 175<sup>th</sup> birthday of the State of Texas now known as "**The State of Texas Anniversary Remembrance (STAR) Day**" to honor and remember the life and legacy of the founders of the State of Texas. On February 19, 1846, James Pinckney Henderson (1808-1858) was sworn in as the First Governor the State of Texas in Austin.

Students with approval of their parents are invited to join and be volunteers of "The Junior Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Volunteers Corps (SB 33)" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. The duties of The Volunteers include activities to explore and discover "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas", considered to be a "State of Texas Treasure", roaming free over the 15,000 acre majestic Caprock Canyons State Park land whose main entrance is just three (3) miles north of the City of Quitaque know known as "The Official State Bison Capital of Texas"; to research and study the founding and founders of

Caprock Canyons State Park (APPENDIX 2); to plan, develop and conduct a School approved STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Field Trip and family holiday adventure by traveling on "The Quitaque Trail" to the park; to share a documented STEM family adventure story of their park visit with fellow students at their respective school libraries; and to pioneer and lead a personal effort to roundup, save and donate money in partnership with parents, grandparents and other relatives to The STAR DAY Foundation each year as "Service Achievement of Merit" STAR DAY 175<sup>th</sup> birthday gift for the State of Texas to support the goals and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund (SB 26)" proposed by The Group and sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation.

At the request of The Texas Bison Student Study Group, The STAR DAY Foundation established "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund (The Fund)" with a challenging goal and a set of activities to help launch The Fund (SB-17). The goal proposed by The Group is to invite Texas families and their school age children along with other Texans, Texas business and friends of Texas worldwide to save and donate to The STAR DAY Foundation to pioneer and lead an effort help raise 100 million dollars! The Fund has been established as an "Endowment Fund" whose annual interest shall support an annual grant to the Quitaque Caprock Partners Foundation to pioneer and lead the management in partnership with Caprock Canyons State Park Superintendent of additional conservation, preservation and restoration initiatives of the majestic 15,000 acre Caprock Canyons State Park land and the unique bison herd at the park now known as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" considered by The Group to be a "State of Texas Treasure." The STAR DAY Foundation shall launch a four (4) year effort to raise the first \$10,000,000 to support the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund (The Fund)" as a collective and collaborative STAR DAY 175<sup>th</sup> birthday gift for the State of Texas from the students and their families, businesses and non-profit organizations and "Friends of the State of Texas" worldwide. The State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Program Research and Development Report illustrates six (6) initial "Donation Premium Gift (DPG)" packages created by "The State of Texas Treasure Work Shop" and manufactured, packaged and distributed as thank-you gifts to donors by "The Texas BisonStar Mint (TBM) Corporation" established by The STAR DAY Foundation to support the goals and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund."

# THE PALS OF TEXAS VOLUNTEERS CORPS BADGE THE GOAL

The STAR DAY Foundation is pioneering and leading the development of a program with the goal to establish and maintain a "Post" (Point Of Service in Texas) in "The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps (The Corps)" of The STAR DAY Foundation in partnership with Texas schools and Texas homeschooling families as a "school service student study group: organization" supervised by the School principal in partnership with volunteer faculty sponsors The program shall seek to charter a "Post" of The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps featuring an "initial" Student Study Group of The Corps to provide supervised students with additional opportunities to pioneer and lead in planning, developing, conducting and documenting service achievement of merits for their school communities in support of the mission of The STAR DAY Foundation with the mission to carryout the legislative intent of the STAR DAY bill (SB 1656-76<sup>th</sup>).

#### THE TEXAS STAR DAY STUDENT STUDY GROUP

The "initial" Student Study Group of The Corps chartered and organized at a partnering school shall be "THE TEXAS STAR DAY STUDENT STUDY GROUP (TSD)" of The Corps. TSD shall be organized as an after-school library expanded learning opportunities student enrichment activity to plan, develop and conduct the birthday of the State of Texas on February 19 at their school with appropriate and patriotic programs as a service achievement of merit birthday gift for the State of Texas. TSD shall provide the opportunity for volunteer supervised students to explore and discover the founding and founders of the State of Texas; plan, develop and conduct appropriate and patriotic programs possibly during all-campus event featuring a school band and/or school choir performance featuring invited community guest

speakers if appropriate and approved by the school principal. The STAR DAY birthday celebration may also feature STAR DAY birthday party refreshments for invite guests created by student and their families including community business participation and offered at their school library in a "Meet and Greet" hospitality program. The reader may wish to explore "The Spirit of STAR DAY 2014 Celebration Report" and "The Spirit of STAR DAY 2012 Celebration Report" found on the website of The STAR DAY Foundation at the STAR DAY tab illustrating TSD programs.

At a School Post TSD event "The Spirit of STAR DAY School Address" issued by the Governor may be read by a student selected by the School principal. The Spirit of STAR DAY School Address has been issued by Texas Governors each year at the request of The STAR DAY Foundation for over 20 years beginning on February 19, 1996, the first year of celebrating STAR DAY, the birthday of the State of Texas. "The Spirit of STAR DAY "IWO JIMA DAY" Proclamation" issued by the Governor beginning in 2015 may also be read at the event by a student selected by the School principal. These STAR DAY communications and others may be found and downloaded for use at a school STAR DAY event from the website of The STAR DAY Foundation at the STAR DAY tab. The STAR DAY tab on the website of The STAR DAY Foundation shall feature a multi-part history of "The Spirit of STAR DAY" from 1996-2016. In addition, five (5) "Spirit of STAR DAY Celebration Reports" beginning with the current year shall be posted for review and study as an activity of TSD. When February 19 falls on a Saturday, the school event may be scheduled on the previous Friday. When February 19 falls on a Sunday, the school event may be schedules on the next Monday.

A partnering Texas school that has charted a TSD of The Corps the school may also wish to expand their after-school library expanded learning opportunities student studies program by organizing and maintaining a "Texas First PALS Student Study Group (TFP)." The STAR DAY Foundation organized The First Pioneers and Leaders of the State of Texas Hall of Honor hosted by The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps on STAR DAY, February 19, 2000 to honor and remember the life and legacy of Texas men and women who have been noted for being "First" in a walk-of-life and who have made service achievements of merit for the State of Texas. A Texan may be nominated by a member of The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps for induction. The Nominator shall be required to conduct research and author a First PALS of Texas Induction Story Bookmark to be approved by the editors of The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor and shall be required to plan, develop and conduct an Induction Service event. The Nominator shall also prepare and submit to The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor an Induction Service Event Report featuring the inductees' Story Bookmark. A Texas school supporting a TFP shall provide students with the opportunity in partnership with their faculty sponsor(s) to study, research, recommend and nominate an inductee(s) and plan, develop, conduct and document an Induction Service Event at their school library or other approved venue by the School principal as a unique service achievement of merit STAR DAY birthday gift for the State of Texas.

A partnering Texas school that has charted a TSD of The Corps may also wish to expand their after-school library expanded learning opportunities student studies program by organizing and maintaining a "Texas Bison Student Study Group (TB)" whose statewide service

achievement of merit activities are illustrated in this report. The STAR DAY Foundation has pioneered and led an effort in partnership with Texas school over the last 20 years to plan, develop and conduct a variety of Texas Student Study Group programs commended by Texas Governors. In this report, "The Texas Astronomy Student Study Group (TA)" and "The Texas Silver Student Study Group (TS)" activities with partnering Texas schools are illustrated.

#### THE ORGANIZATION

The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps (The Corps) is organized with a "**State Corps Post Commander**" appointed by The STAR DAY Foundation and 20 "**Regional Corps Post Commanders**" each appointed by the State Corps Commander. The word "**Post**" is an acronym for "**Point Of Service in Texas**."

The State Corps Post Commander and the twenty (20) Regional Corps Post Commanders constitute "**The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps Regional Post Council**." Each of the twenty (20) PALS of Texas Corps Post Regions coincides with a Texas Education Service Centers (ESC) defined by the Texas Education Agency and are designated as a "**Volunteer Service Centers (VSC)**."

The Regional Corps Post Commanders are formally designated as the "VSC Corps Post Commanders." In each school district of a VSC, a "School District Corps Post Commander" is appointed by The PALS of Texas VSC Corps Post Commander. The VSC Corps Post Commander and the School District Corps Post Commanders of a VSC constitutes a "VSC Corps Post Council."

For each school in a School District, a "School Corps Post Commander" is appointed by School District Corps Post Commander. The School District Corps Post Commander together with the School Corps Post Commanders constitutes a "School District Corps Post Council."

When a school charters a "Texas STAR DAY Student Study Group (TSD)", the school is said have charted a "**Post**" (**Point Of Service** in **Texas**) of The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. The participating students in a TSD at a School Post are designated as volunteers of "**The Junior PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps**" of The PALS of Volunteers Corps. The adult volunteer members of a TSD at a School Post including volunteer parents and community volunteers are designated as volunteers of The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps.

#### THE AWARDS

The STAR DAY Foundation has developed "The PALS of Texas Service Achievement of Merit (SAM) Awards Program" to honor and recognize volunteers and the volunteer service initiatives planned, developed and conducted at partnering Texas schools that have established a Post of The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps.




Each "Donation Premium Gift" illustrated in this report has been designed by "The State of Texas Treasure Workshop (The Workshop)" established as a nonprofit division of The "Donation Premium Gifts" shall be manufactured, inventoried, STAR DAY Foundation. illustrated, packaged and shipped to donors from "The Texas BisonStar Mint (TBM) Corporation" established as a for-profit division of The STAR DAY Foundation. TBM shall upgrade the DAY also and website of The STAR manage Foundation http://www.thestardayfoundation.org. TBM shall create at the website "The Pioneers and Leaders of the State of Texas Donation Premium Gift Center (The Center)" to illustrate currently available "Donation Premium Gifts" offerings of The STAR Day Foundation. In addition, TBM shall also feature "The Texas BisonStar Press (The Press)" and "The Texas BisonStar Bakery (The Bakery)." The Press shall publish media proposed by The Workshop. The Bakery shall bake, package and distribute a "cookie package" to partnering Texas schools to support fund raising initiatives of students and their families in support of the goal and activities of The Fund. The above "State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Collection" is offered for a \$36 donation to The STAR DAY Foundation and is composed of six "ONE DOLLAR DONATION SAVINGS COINS" (Aluminum), two "FIVE DOLLAR DONATION SAVINGS COINS" (Copper) and two "TEN DOLLAR DONATION SAVINGS COINS" (24K gold plated). Each coin is placed in a plastic coin capsule. A "Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Volunteers Badge" is included. The PALS of Texas Volunteers Badge is a 1 inch diameter lapel pin design featuring a pin/cap back. A "Texas Flag of Sky Camp Goodnight Texas Tent" (card) which is uniquely numbered is also enclosed. The Tent is a State of Texas Treasure commemorative created by The Texas Astronomy Student Study Group. A "State of Texas Treasure Box" with a white fiber insert is used as a treasure box for the coins, badge and Texas Flag of Sky Camp Goodnight Texas Tent. The top of the box features the "Official Seal" of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund." The Collection shall be offered in 2017 as a "State of Texas "My BisonStar" Donation Land Grant Family Homestead Spirit Bison Ranch Kit (DPG KIT 1)" providing a student with the opportunity to own and operate his/her Spirit Bison Ranch Herd. Additional Collections shall be offered to expand a student's Spirit Bison Ranch Herd.

The State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Collection Report is presented to The Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Volunteers of The STAR DAY Foundation at The Luncheon and shall be posted on the website of The STAR DAY Foundation. The State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Collection" illustrated in this report is one of five (5) initial collections that shall be offered as a "Donation Premium Gift" for Texas school-age children in partnership with their parents, grandparents and other relatives. The **DPG KIT 1** collection is offered for a \$36 donation made at the website of The STAR DAY Foundation in support of the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" proposed by The Texas Bison Student Study Group.

The three (3) State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coins of the collection illustrated in the photograph above are offered by The STAR DAY Foundation as "**Donation Premium Gifts**" for Texas students in partnership with their parents, grandparents and other relatives for saving and making donations to The STAR DAY Foundation to support the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund (The Fund)."

The three State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coins were designed by Thomas S. Cleveland, a former United States Mint Coin Designer. Cleveland owns an operates "The Artist Within Schools" in Cypress and Houston Texas. Cleveland is the Art and Graphics Department Director of The Texas BisonStar Mint Corporation established in 2014 by The STAR DAY Foundation as a Texas for-profit small business to support the goal and activities of The Fund. The State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Collection is a component of The Texas "My BisonStar" Donation Premium Gift Collection which also features The Texas Silver BisonStar Donation Coin Collection. "Silver" was designated by the State of Texas Legislature in 2007 as "The Official Precious Metal of the State of Texas" as proposed by The Texas Silver Student Study Group (SB 22) sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation.

The obverse side of each State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin features an image of "BisonStar." "BisonStar" is the "Official Mascot" of The Texas Bison Student Study Group. She was born at Caprock Canyons State Park in May 2013 and is considered by The Texas Bison Student Study Group to be a "State of Texas Treasure!" Each State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin features the use of "The Official Seal of the State of Texas" on the reverse side of the coins. Governor Rick Perry, a STAR DAY 1999 Founder, authorized the use of "The Official Seal of the State of Texas" at the request of The Texas Bison Student Study Group to support the offering of The State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coins and other related precious metal coins. The Collection is designed by The State of Texas Treasure Workshop (The Workshop) and manufactured and distributed by The Texas BisonStar Mint Corporation (The Mint). The Workshop and The Mint have been established by The STAR DAY Foundation to support the goal and activities of The Fund.

The State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coins are offered in "Donation Savings Denominations" of \$1, \$5 and \$10. The \$1 State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin represents a one-year old "BisonStar." In a similar fashion, the \$5 and \$10 State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin represents a five-year old and ten year-old "BisonStar" respectively. When a student saves and makes a donation with the help of his/her parents, grandparents or other relatives at the website of The STAR DAY Foundation to The Fund, a collection of donation savings coins are sent to the student by The Texas BisonStar Mint (TBM) Corporation.

As an example, if a family makes a \$36 donation in the name of their school-age child to The STAR DAY Foundation, a collection of ten (10) State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coins are sent to the donating family with a thank-you note. The ten (10) State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Collection represents the \$36 donation made and is composed of two \$10, two \$5 and six \$1 State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin is being designed by The State of Texas Treasure Workshop and shall be manufactured by The Texas BisonStar Mint Corporation.

The State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar Donation Savings Coin Collection donation proceeds are divided into two (2) interrelated funds which shall support the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. Seventy (70) percent of the donation proceeds of each family donation supports the goal of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" and is directly placed in "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund". Thirty (30) percent of the donation proceeds of each family donation supports the activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" and is directly placed in "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library Fund".

The State of Texas "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Collection (Donation Premium Gift (#36) shall provide parents with a parent activity to pioneer in partnership with their Texas school-age child an opportunity to explore and discover knowledge and skills in

saving money and at the same time making donations to The STAR DAY Foundation as an annual service achievement of merit STAR DAY birthday gift to the State of Texas supporting additional conservation, preservation and restoration initiatives of The Official State Bison Herd of Texas at Caprock Canyons State Park. Each participating student would pioneer and lead an activity to raise money with their parents matching their savings so that the student may acquire a "State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Collection. Each coin in a collection represents and documents a "Donation Savings Denomination" such as a \$1, \$5 and \$10 donation make to The STAR DAY Foundation whose proceeds support the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund"

The coins are awarded to the partnering students as a "Service Achievement of Merit (SAM) Award" for their service in raising, saving and donating money with the help of their parents and other relatives to The STAR DAY Foundation to support the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund"

A participating family in partnership with their school-age student(s) making a donation to The STAR DAY Foundation will participate in "The Great State of Texas Treasure Donation Land Grant Program." Not every family can own and operate a Texas Bison Ranch but in this case, a family will plan, develop and conduct an expedition to travel on "The Quitaque Trail" from their home to "The William Elmo Merrem Frontier Wilderness" in Briscoe County, Texas to stake out a Family Homestead parcel of land (Texas Flag of Land) to establish and maintain their "Family Homestead Donation Land Grant Spirit Bison Ranch" featuring a "BisonStar Spirit Bison Herd" composed of "Spirit Bison" each represented by one State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Saving Coin. The donation saving denomination of \$1, \$5, \$10 and \$20 each represents a bison one year old, five years old, ten years old and twenty years old respectively.

The STAR DAY Foundation shall launch a statewide effort to visit the twenty (20) Education Service Centers (ESC) established and maintained by the Texas Education Department (TEA) to support the mission and activities of Texas public schools districts in partnership with parents of Texas K-12 students. The STAR DAY Foundation shall seek to share the story of The Texas Bison Student Study Group goal and activities with Texas 4<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> grade school principals, librarians, teachers, students and their families and community volunteers and sponsoring community businesses in a series of Story Telling School Student Sessions and Librarian and Teacher Workshops at schools created by The State of Texas Treasure Workshop.

# **CHAPTER 3**

#### THE TEXAS BISON STUDENT STUDY GROUP



MAY 7, 2011-AN EXPEDITION TO CIBOLO CREEK RANCH-PRESIDIO COUNTY

Students from Presidio ISD Lucy Rede Franco Middle School (LRFMS) in Presidio County gathered on a high bluff to explore and study a herd of bison located in a valley below as the bison migrated toward a watering hole located close by at a natural spring shaded by cottonwood and grey oak trees on the 30,000 acre Cibolo Creek Ranch established by Don Meliton (Milton) Faver (ca 1822-1899) in 1857 and owned today by Dr. John B. Poindexter. The expedition to the Cibolo Creek Ranch was supervised by Science Teachers Cynthia Obrero (Photographer) and Jaspher Valeriano (Back Row-Right). The Expedition school bus driver was Manuel Aguilar. The Ranch expedition was guided by Ranch Manager Robert Cavness (Back Row-3<sup>rd</sup> left), and Ranch Activities Director Mike "Sugar" Dorris (Back Row-2<sup>nd</sup> Left).

A group of students at Presidio ISD LRFMS had been initially organized as "The Texas Student Bison Study Group" on September 12, 2010 under the supervision of Principal Teresa Porras and sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation of El Paso under the direction of President Dennis M. Kulvicki (Back Row-Left) as an after-school student enrichment program.

The Group is engaged in studies to explore and discover ancient Texas Bison, the Texas State Bison Herd at Caprock Canyons State Park in Briscoe and Floyd counties, and to pioneer and lead an effort to explore and discover the benefits of the use of Texas bison ground meat in partnership with school cafeteria staff and family volunteers to enhance the school year lunch menu program with a lower fat and calorie content meat. The Group shall also explore and propose ways and means to support the work of the Texas State Bison Herd Management Team whose mission is save the Texas Herd Bison Herd from extinction in these very difficult economic times and engage in activities to enhance the story of Texas for the people of Texas.

After a lunch at a beautiful tree shaded natural spring, the students returned from the field to explore and discover the history of "EL FORTIN DEL CIBOLO (The Fort)", one of three forts established by Faver protecting natural range springs with a tour led by Cindy Hernandez. Dr. Poindexter pioneered and led a decade-long conservation, preservation and restoration effort to historically recreate the three forts established by Faver as ranch guest accommodations featuring an internationally known restaurant. The Cibolo Creek Ranch is located on the frontier of the Great State of Texas at http://www.cibolocreekranch.com. The photograph was taken by school science teacher Cynthia Obrero.

The Texas Bison Student Study Group after review and study proposed that the bison herd at Caprock Canyons State Park be designated by the Texas State Legislature as "THE OFFICIAL STATE BISON HERD OF TEXAS." House Concurrent Resolution (HCR 86) was filed on March 7, 2011. The bill designates the "Texas State Bison Herd" at Caprock Canyons State Park as the "Official State Bison Herd of Texas." State Representative Pete Gallego was the initial author of HCR 86. State Representative Warren Chisum at the request of Rep. Gallego volunteered to be the primary author of HCR 86. State Representative Jim Landtroop and State Representative Pete Gallego volunteered to be joint authors of HCR 86. Caprock Canyons State Park, home of the Goodnight Bison Herd, is located in the Districts of Rep. Chisum and Rep. Landtroop. HCR 86 was sponsored by State Senator Robert Duncan. Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, issued a Commendation Letter to honor, recognize LRFMS teachers and students for their service achievement of merit in proposing HCR 86.

The Texas Bison Student Study Group also pioneered and led a successful effort to invite the Texas State Legislature in 2013 to designate September 12 as "THE MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT DAY" in Texas and to designate March 5 as "THE CHARLES GOODNIGHT DAY" in Texas with the support of State Senator Kel Seliger and State Representative Ken King. In addition, The Texas Bison Student Study Group pioneered and lea a successful effort to invite the Texas State Legislature in 2015 to designate the City of Quitaque in Briscoe County as "THE OFFICIAL STATE BISON CAPITAL OF TEXAS."

The Texas Bison Student Study Group seeks to inspire and motivate students to explore and discover the life and legacy of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1939-1926) who pioneered and led an effort to save the last free-roaming bison of "The Great Texas Southern Plains Bison Herd" on The John Adair (JA) Ranch (**SB 12-16**) in Palo Duro Canyon beginning in 1876 with

the help of her husband Charles Goodnight (1836-1929), the first Manager and part-owner of The JA Ranch.

The JA Ranch in partnership with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department rounded up the last 36 bison found on the ranch and donated them in 1997 to 15,000 acre Caprock Canyons State Park located just a few miles north of the City of Quitaque in Briscoe County. Mr. Robert Cavness, Cibolo Creek Ranch (Presidio County) Manager is an Advisor. Mr. Stuckey is also an Advisor to The Group.

The Texas Bison Student Study Group sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation named the "First Female" bison of The Great Texas Southern Plains Herd to be born on the land that is now know as the State of Texas-"**OLD BLUE**." "**BISONSTAR**", the Official Mascot" of The Texas Bison Student Study Group born during May 2013 is a female bison member of The Official State Bison Herd of Texas roaming free over the majestic 15,000 acre Caprock Canyons State Park whose entrance is just 3 miles north of the City of Quitaque know known as The Official State Bison Capital of Texas as designated by the Texas State Legislature in 2015 as proposed by The Texas Bison Student Study Group.

The Texas Old Blue Bison sculpture illustrated in the photograph was donated to the Culberson County Historical Museum located in the historic Clark Hotel in Van Horn by the

Marian Blakemore Museum Planetarium of Midland. Mr. Larry D. Simpson, owner and editor of The Van Horn Advocate, pioneered and led the donation effort with Mr. Frank Cahoon of Midland. The Texas Old Blue Bison sculpture was painted by artist Karen Winkler of the Children's Museum of the Southwest Museum of Art of Midland in a scheme featuring celestial planets and stars.

The Texas Old Blue Bison sculpture was sponsored by the family that owned the Longfellow Ranch in Culberson County which was purchased by Jeff Bezos, founder and owner of Amazon.com to establish the Blue Origin launch facility. The Texas Old Blue Bison sculpture was created by the Marian Blakemore Museum Planetarium to symbolize space as the last frontier of Texas being pioneered and led by the Blue Origin launch facility in Culberson County set to launch people into space from Culberson County. Dr. Andrew Kerr, Curator of the Marian Blakemore Museum has volunteered to pioneer and lead the effort to create The Great Texas "Old Blue" Bison Sky Constellation in partnership with the West Texas Astronomer Club membership which meets on the second of each month at the planetarium.

Charles Goodnight (1836-1929), the "First Manager" in 1876 of The John Adair (JA) Ranch in Palo Duro Canyon, had a longhorn steer named "Old Blue" that was used to lead his cattle herds on the trail to the railhead to ship cattle to the east. Goodnight would bring "Old Blue" back to his ranch and plan another cattle drive with the help of his "Old Blue!"

#### THE TEXAS ASTRONOMY STUDENT STUDY GROUP


The Texas Bison Student Study Group proposed to The Texas Astronomy Student Study Group sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation a STEM (Science, Technology Engineering

and Mathematic) research and design project to honor and memorialize "**OLD BLUE**." Midland Planetarium Director Dr. Andrew Kerr volunteered to be the Advisor of The Texas Astronomy Student Study Group to pioneer and lead the STEM objectives of the project in partnership with volunteers of The West Texas Astronomy Club of Midland. The project was composed of two (2) astronomy STEM objectives. The Texas Astronomy Student Study Group would conduct research and design a "Sky Constellation" and a "Sky Valley."

The Sky Constellation was created to be a 254 star constellation, one star for each Texas County, designed in the shape of a Bison facing west and rising in the night sky during the summer in the southern sky to honor and memorialize "OLD BLUE." The Sky Valley is simply a sky rectangle specified by four (4) sky points. The Sky Valley is immediately east of The Sky Constellation. The sky rectangle is designed with an aspect ratio of 1.5 as is the State of Texas Flag. The Sky Valley is designated as a "Texas Flag of Sky." The Sky Valley is partitioned into a matrix of smaller 7,920 by 7,920 Texas Flags of Sky by specifying that sky points so that each smaller sky rectangle is of aspect ratio of 1.5. Each smaller Texas Flag of Sky in The Sky Valley is like a window in the night sky! The Texas Astronomy Student Study Group hypothesizes that each smaller Texas Flag of Sky has at least one visible star that may be observed with an appropriate telescope. Since each smaller Texas Flag of Sky in The Sky Valley has at least one visible star that star shall be associated with its Texas Flag of Sky as the "Lone Star" of a State of Texas flag. Furthermore each "Lone Star" of a Texas Flag of Shy shall represent the "Spirit" of a bison of The Great Texas Southern Plains Bison Herd that was born on the land that is now known as the State of Texas over the thousands and thousands of year that bison roamed free.

From The Sky Valley design specifications above, it is estimated that as many as 62,726,400 (7,920 x 7,920) bison may have been born and roamed free over the millennia on the land that is now the State of Texas! As "OLD BLUE" runs west across the night, the "Spirit Bison Herd" in The Sky Valley follows their leader "OLD BLUE" on their annual Spirit Bison migration trail (The Quitaque Trail) across the night sky forever and ever! The Sky Valley and The Sky Constellation together form "THE MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT SKY MONUMENT (The Sky Monument)." "THE MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT LAND MONUMENT (The Land Monument)" is a projection of The Sky Monument onto the ground. The Sky Monument and The Land Monument together form "THE MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT MONUMENT (The Monument)."

#### THE TEXAS SILVER STUDENT STUDY GROUP

Presidio ISD Lucy Rede Franco Middle School (LRFMS) students embark on a hands-on expedition to explore and discover the history, science, technology engineering and mathematics and the founding and founders associated with the emerging Shafter Silver Mining operations as an after-school student "Expanded Learning Opportunities Network (ELON) Program" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. The following text is from a Texas State Legislature bill proposed in 2007 by The Texas Silver Student Study Group to designate "SILVER" as "The Official Precious Metal of Texas." The photograph was captured by Dennis M. Kulvicki, The Shafter Silver Mine Expedition Project Coordinator.

"The State of Texas has customarily recognized a variety of official symbols as tangible representations of the state's culture and history.

The precious metal silver has played a prominent role in the story of the Lone Star State, and it continues to be a visible part of Texas culture, reflecting the enduring influence of Spanish colonial design and the western heritage that is so much a part of the state's lore.

Silver has been mined in Texas for more than three centuries, beginning shortly after the Spanish established their first permanent settlements in the area in the late 1600s; the first mines were founded by Franciscan friars who dug for silver deposits near El Paso, and these same sites were worked periodically for the next 200 years.

In the late 1800s, prospectors began exploring other parts of West Texas, with figures such as John W. Spencer, Samuel B. Buckley, Lieutenant John L. Bullis, and Colonel William R. Shafter focusing their efforts on Presidio County; this led to the opening of the Shafter Mining District, which was the site of the famous Presidio Mine; operated between 1884 and 1947, it produced more than 90 percent of all the silver that has ever been mined in Texas and became a prominent business that spurred greater development in the Big Bend region.

Other mining districts in the state also yielded silver; Hudspeth and Culberson Counties were home to the Van Horn-Allamoore and the Plata Verde Districts, and Hudspeth County also contained the Quitman Mountains District; in addition, Brewster County was the site of the Altuda Mountain District, and mining took place at locations in Llano, Mason, and Gillespie Counties in the Hill Country; in total, Texas mines yielded more than 33 million fine ounces of silver, which had a value of nearly \$23.5 million, between 1885 and 1952; the manual labor of carving these riches from the rocks fell to a hardy group of miners who, in true Texan fashion, used their skill and determination to complete a difficult and dangerous job.

Most mining came to an end in the 1950s, but interest in harvesting the state's silver deposits continues; 20 million troy ounces of the metal are believed to still remain in the Shafter Mining District, and resources of this kind may prove profitable given silver's widespread use in commercial and industrial applications, where it plays a role in everything from photography to coin making, x-rays, water treatment, and electronics.

Jewelry makers and other artisans also rely on this precious metal, and the stately sheen of silver is a key element in beautiful stylistic designs, both rustic and refined, that can be seen throughout Texas; in belt buckles, tie clasps, and boot decorations, it is a staple of the western-wear fashions that harken back to the state's pioneer past; moreover, silver's rich, pure luster also makes it a favorite material for religious jewelry and other devotional objects, as well as any item or decoration that may benefit from its luxurious, glittering hues.

In both its historical and economic significance and its enduring connections to Texas imagery and culture, silver is a fitting symbol for the state and its people, and it is indeed appropriate that this metal receive special legislative recognition."

The above italics text is the actual text of House Concurrent Resolution 102 signed into law on June 15, 2007 by Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder. "The Texas Silver Student Study Group (The Group)" was organized on October 16, 2006, the birthday of Shafter Silver Mine Founder General William Rufus Shafter (1835-1906), at Presidio ISD Lucy Rede Franco Middle School (LRFMS) as an after-school student enrichment program under the

supervision of School Principal Teresa Porras and guided by volunteer teachers and others of The PALS of Texas Volunteer Corps of The STAR DAY Foundation with the sponsorship of The STAR DAY Foundation. The Group proposed a bill in 2007 to designate "Silver" as "The Official State Precious Metal of Texas" as a service achievement of merit "SPIRIT OF STAR DAY 2007" birthday gift for the State of Texas. State Representative Gallego filed HCR 102 on STAR DAY, February 19, 2007!

State Representative Pete P. Gallego volunteered to be the author of House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) 102. State Senator Carlos Uresti volunteered to be the sponsor of HCR 102. The Texas Silver Student Study Group planned, developed and conducted several STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics expeditions to the Shafter Silver Mine in Presidio County approximately 20 miles north of Lucy Rede Franco Middle School in the City of Presidio in partnership with The STAR DAY Foundation and sponsored by the Aurcana Corporation of Canada, new owner of the Shafter Silver Mine to explore and discover the science, technology, engineering, and mathematics principles of silver mining with mine engineers and staff. The Group has proposed "THE TEXAS SILVER WORKS CAMPAIGN!" in 2007 to pioneer and lead an effort to explore and discover ways and means to create silver donation savings coins whose donation proceeds may be used to fund Texas conservation, preservation and restoration initiatives. Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, issued a Commendation Letter to honor, recognize LRFMS teachers and students for their service achievement of merit in proposing HCR 102 on October 19, 2007.

LUCY REDE FRANCO (1902-1977)

Lucy Rede Franco was the first Hispanic student enrolled at Sul Ross Normal College known today as Sul Ross State University in Alpine, Brewster County during the first summer session in 1920.

Lucy Rede Franco was born on February 3, 1902 in Shafter, Presidio County to Eusebio and Mary Ann (Maria Antonio de Jesus) Rede. Lucy was the oldest of five children.

Mary Ann was born on January 17, 1878, in Redford, Presidio County and was the eleventh child of Matilde Acosta and Secundino Lujan. When Mary Ann was seventeen, she began teaching English to other people in Shafter, charging two dollars a month for tuition. This made her the first person of Mexican origin to teach English in the Big Bend Area, and marks the beginning of her teaching career. Lucy inherited a great love of learning from her mother and father.

The family's moving did not prevent Lucy from continuing her education. In Shafter she boarded and attended the Sacred Heart Academy for two years. The Irish Mother Superior, Mother Tarcisus, gave Lucy extra work and tutored her for the examination which was required for a teacher certificate. In 1920, she entered Sul Ross Normal College in Alpine and following one year at that institution, she passed the test and the teaching

tradition was passed to Lucy. Lucy Rede's first assignment was a one teacher school in Redford where she taught sixty students in grades one through eight.

After teaching four years, Lucy met Manuel Franco, a handsome gentleman from Durango, Mexico, who was visiting friends in Redford. Lucy married Manuel Franco on December 31, 1924 in Redford, Presidio County. Eight children were born to Manuel and Lucy and all obtained college degrees.

After her children were born, Lucy accepted a teaching position in Shafter. After the Shafter silver mines closed Manuel and Lucy moved to Redford to farm. In 1925, the Franco Family moved to Presidio.

In 1956, Lucy received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Sul Ross State College at the age of fifty four. Four year later this gracious lady won the Mother of Texas award, presented by the American Mother's Committee, Inc. As part of this high achievement, Lucy attended a banquet at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City, honoring all state winners.

Lucy taught school in Presidio ISD for thirtythree years. In 1972, Lucy Rede Franco retired from
teaching. In 1985, the Presidio ISD named the Lucy
Rede Franco Middle School in her honor. On
September 21, 2007, Family members established a
scholarship endowment in honor of Lucy Rede
Franco. The Lucy Rede Franco Scholarship
Endowment and Fund provides scholarships to
Presidio High School graduates enrolled at Sul Ross.
"This endowment is a true testament to a woman
whose love of and belief in higher education was an
inspiration to both her family and countless other
individuals" said Dr. R. Vic Morgan, President of
Sul Ross.

The donor shall note that "Silver" has been designated as "The Official Precious Metal of Texas" by the Texas State Legislature in 2007 as proposed by The Texas Silver Student Study Group (SB 22) sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation.

At Caprock Canyons State Park there is well-known research site of the late 1970's known as "The Lake Theo Bison Archeology Site" featuring the remains of Texas Bison from nearly 10,000 and 3,000 years ago that were herded off a cliff near Lake Theo in several events by Native Americans of the area. The Texas Bison Student Study Group has proposed to The STAR DAY Foundation the organization of "The Texas Archeology Study Group" to explore and discover if The Lake Theo Bison Archeology Site could yield additional high quality Texas Bison fossils for modern dating and DNA analysis. The field of DNA analysis has matured with breakthrough technologies. The proposed "Lake Theo Bison Archeology Site Project" would initially be approximately a one-year comprehensive study by a contracted professional of the existing research literature, evaluation of all existing Lake Theo Archeology Site fossils held at various sites and a review of the existing DNA analysis and method employed using the

existing Lake Theo Bison Archeology Site fossils in various collections.

The Center for Big Bend Studies at Sul Ross University at Alpine Director Andy Cloud is an Advisor of The Texas Bison Student Study Group has initially reviewed the proposed project initiative and has offered the opinion that the proposed project has merit. The proposed project would be funded as an activity of The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. If the initial proposed project arrives at the conclusion that further research study is appropriate, The Texas Archeology Student Study Group would be organized to participate each summer in the Lake Theo Bison Archeology Project summer field work led by a contracted professional team who would seek to explore and discover new fossils and conduct modern dating and DNA analysis during the school year. The first year of the proposed field project would also develop a complete DNA genome of BisonStar with the goal of comparing new field work findings to see if the Lake Theo Bison fossils could determine family history link with BisonStar.

The donor shall receive a "Texas Flag of Silver Ingot" in a plastic ingot capsule, a plastic folding easel, a "Texas Flag of Sky Camp Goodnight Texas Tent" and "The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps Badge" shipped in a State of Texas Treasure Box. The donor shall note that "Silver" has been designated as "The Official Precious Metal of Texas" by the Texas State Legislature in 2007 as proposed by The Texas Silver Student Study Group (SB 22) sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation.

The Texas Silver Student Study Group proposed the minting of a "TEXAS FLAG OF SILVER DONATION SAVINGS INGOT." The Texas BisonStar Mint Corporation created a 10 gram .999 fine silver ingot (38mm x 25mm x 1mm) featuring a colorized flag of the State of Texas on the obverse side. The reverse side featuring "The Official Seal of The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" and "The Official Seal of the State of Texas" with supporting weight in grams and purity percentage specifications. The use of "The Official Seal of the State of Texas" was granted by Governor Rick Perry, a STAR DAY 1999 Founder, at the request of The Texas Bison Student Study Group to support the offering of State of Texas Treasure Donation Savings Coins whose proceeds shall support the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" proposed by The Texas Bison Student Study Group.

The STAR DAY Foundation shall invite every adult Texas to save and make a \$60 donation to The STAR DAY Foundation to acquire and display a "Texas Flag of Silver Donation Savings Ingot" on their desk-top or library shelf at hone or work knowing that the proceeds of their donation to The STAR DAY Foundation support the fundraising goal and fundraising activities of "THE OFFICIAL STATE BISON HERD OF TEXAS FUND." The Donation Premium Gift package shall contain The Texas Flag of Silver Donation Saving Ingot placed in a plastic ingot capsule, a plastic folding easel, a BisonStar Sculpture of ironwood, a PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps Badge and a Camp Goodnight Texas Flag of Sky Tent. Each Lone Star in a Texas Flag of Sky represents a the "Spirit" of a bison calf that was born and roamed free over the land now known as the State of Texas whose "Spirit" is captures in a "Texas Silver Bison" Donation Savings Coin (1 gram) contained in the DPG KIT-3.

### THE DEDICATION

The Texas Flag of Silver Donation Premium Gift (DPG KIT 5A) has been created and dedicated by The State of Texas Treasure Workshop to honor and recognize the pioneer and leadership spirit of "The Texas Flag Student Study Group" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation to plan, develop and conduct an three day/two night "Camping and Mountain Climbing Expedition" in partnership with Fort Bliss soldiers as "The Spirit of STAR DAY Flags 2002 Expedition" during June 21-23, 2002. The goal was to carry the United States flag and the State of Texas flag along with other flags to the highest mountain peak (8749') in Texas at the Guadalupe Mountains National Park in Culberson County. The Texas Flags Student Study Group also planned, developed and conducted in partnership with soldiers of Fort Bliss as "The Spirit of STAR DAY Flags Expedition" on June 14, 2005 to climb to North Peak (7,192') of the Franklin Mountains in The City of El Paso to display "The Spirit of STAR DAY Flags" on Flag Day!

"THE SPIRIT OF STAR DAY STUDENT FLAGS EXPEDITION" was conducted during June 21-23, 2002 under the Fort Bliss PIE Program. The Program activity provided a challenging opportunity for eight (8) boys and eight (8) girls from San Elizario Middle School to volunteer as "Expedition Flag Bearers" to carry the United States Flag and the flag of the State of Texas and other flags acting as "Expedition Escort Flags" to the highest point in the State of Texas at Guadalupe Peak (8749") in the Guadalupe Mountains National Park in Culberson County with the support of four (4) volunteer soldiers of the Fort Bliss BOSS Program. MG Green made arrangements to outfit the Expedition Team of forty (40) adults and students with camping tents and gear to support the three (3) day, two (2) nights challenging camping adventure. The Fort Bliss BOSS Program volunteer soldiers provided the students with camping out knowledge and skills in making and setting up a camp. MG Green also provided the Expedition Team members with an outstanding US Army Meals Ready to Eat (MRE) lunch at the Peak on June 22, 2002 at 12 noon after the Expedition Team members conducted a Commemorative Flag Service.



June 22, 2002 -Guadalupe Peak Volunteer students from San Elizario Middle School in El Paso County stand on the highest point in the State of Texas on Guadalupe Peak at 12 noon after a trek of nearly six (6) hours to display the United State flag as their student STAR DAY birthday presents for our state. Sixteen (16) students (8 boys and 8 girls) volunteered to participate in a three-day/two-night camping adventure to the Guadalupe Mountains National Park to carry and display "THE SPIRIT OF STAR DAY STUDENT EXPEDITION FLAGS" to the highest point (8749') in our state as part of the after-school program of "THE STAR DAY SCHOOL LIBRARY READERS ARE LEADERS PROGRAM", sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. The STAR DAY Foundation has established THE STARS PHYSICAL FITNESS CHALLENGE PROGRAM as a component after-school program of "THE STAR DAY SCHOOL LIBRARY READERS ARE LEADERS PROGRAM" to challenge students to learn how to be fit and health through exercise and good eating habits.

JUNE 14, 2005- North Peak "THE SPIRIT OF STAR DAY STUDENT FLAGS EXPEDITION" to the North Peak (7,192') of the Franklin Mountains to celebrate FLAG DAY 2005 and the 230th Birthday of the United States Army was an outstanding "STARS CHALLENGE" summer activity for volunteer students of Lydia Patterson School in El Paso Texas in partnership with volunteer soldiers of the Better Opportunities for Single Soldiers (BOSS) Program at Fort Bliss and the United States Army Recruiting Service in El Paso. Seven (7) United States Army soldiers volunteered to be "Expedition Trail Guides" to lead eight (8) boys and eight (8) girls from the Lydia Patterson School in El Paso to the North Peak (7,192') of the Franklin Mountains State Park, the highest point in El Paso County, to celebrate Flag Day and observe the 230th Birthday of the U. S. Army during a special Commemorative Service. The event was hosted by the Fort Bliss Better Opportunities for Single Soldiers (BOSS) Program under a Fort Bliss Partnership in Education Program with The STAR DAY Foundation hosted by the Office of the Fort Bliss Commanding General, MG Michael A. Vane. The Fort Bliss BOSS Program is well known for its volunteer support of youth programs of nonprofit organizations in El Paso County. Davis, Post CSM. CMS Davis wrote an "EXPEDITION ADDRESS" to share his thoughts on meaning of Flag Day and his reflections on the 230th Birthday of the U. S. Army. CSM Davis provided an Air Defense Artillery (ADA) flag from his office to be carried by students and displayed at the North Peak. SGT Juan Chavira represented the Office of the U.S. Army Recruiting Station at 9109 Dyer Street in El Paso. SGT Chavira donated to The STAR DAY Foundation the U. S. Army flag pictured above as an Expedition Escort Flag. SGT Chavira presented each of the sixteen (16) students with a U. S. Army Recruiter Service Commemorative to honor and recognize each student for their volunteer service as "Expedition Flag Bearers." SGT 1st Class Jerry Tillison, Station Commander of the U. S. Army Recruiting Station on Dyer, volunteered to coordinate the participation of SGT Chavira and donated the U. S. Army flag and Commemoratives presented to the students.

## THE MOMUMENT PROJECT

DPG KIT 5B is a DPG KIT 5A with The BisonStar Sculpture added and packaged in a larger State of Texas Treasure Box.

"THE MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT MONUMENT (The Monument)" is a collaborative student STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) initiative hosted by The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corp and sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation among teachers, students and their families and community volunteers of The Texas Bison Student Study Group, The Texas Astronomy Group and The Texas Silver Student Study Group. The Monument is being pioneered and led to forever honor and remember the life and legacy of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926) who has been inducted into The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor as the woman who saved the last free roaming Texas bison of The Great Texas Southern Prairie Bison Herd in Palo Duro Canyon in 1878 with the help of her husband Charles Goodnight (1836-1929), the first manager of The John Adair (JA) Ranch in 1876. The Texas bison herd of Caprock Canyons State Park is known today as: "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas."

The John Adair (JA) Ranch in partnership with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department rounded up the last surviving 36 bison found on the ranch saved in 1878 by Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926) and donated them in 1997 to 15,000 acre Caprock Canyons State Park located just a few miles north of the City of Quitaque in Briscoe County. The exciting story of

The proposed **Monument** shall be constructed on the grounds of The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library at Camp Goodnight Texas in The William Elmo Merrem Frontier Wilderness in Briscoe County. The Monument is composed of a unique interlinked "**Sky Monument**" and "**Land Monument**." The Sky Monument is composed of **The Great Texas "Old Blue" Bison Constellation (The Sky Constellation)** and "**The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Sky Valley** (**The Sky Valley**)."

The Sky Monument development was pioneered and led by Dr. Andrew Kerr, Midland Planetarium Director, in partnership with the Midland West Texas Astronomy Club. The Sky Monument was proposed by The Texas Astronomy Student Study Group sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation and introduced at a special event hosted by The Midland Planetarium on August 31, 2011, the night of a "Texas Blue Moon"! The Sky Constellation has been created to honor and memorialize "OLD BLUE." The Sky Constellation is composed of 254 stars one for each Texas County. The Sky Monument rises in the Texas southern sky in September. The Sky Valley is a patch of sky just east of The Sky Constellation and determined by four (4) sky points as an asterism. The Sky Valley is a "Texas Flag of Sky" with an aspect ratio of 1.5. The Sky Valley as a Texas Flag of Sky is further partitioned into a matrix of 7920 x 7920 smaller Texas Flags of Sky. The Lone Star of each Texas Flag of Sky (62,726,400) in The Sky Valley represents a the "Spirit" of new born calf in Texas of The Great Texas Southern Plains Bison Herd that migrated into the land that is now the State of Texas thousands of years ago even before people populated the land. The number 62,726,400 estimates the total number of bison born in Texas and roamed free on the land that is now the State of Texas since the first bison migrated into Texas. The hypothesis of The Texas Astronomy Student Study Group is that each Texas Flag of Sky in The Sky Valley contains at least one star! The "Texas Silver Bison" Donation Savings Coin (1 gram 99.9% fine silver 15mm x 1mm) represents the Lone Star of each Texas Flag of Sky in The Sky Valley and represents a unique new born bison calf. In a poetic way, The Lone Star of each Texas Flag of Sky in The Sky Valley represents the legendary answer to the rhetorical question: "Where Have All The Bison Gone!"

"THE MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT LAND MONUMENT (The Land Monument)" is simply the projection of "THE MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT SKY MOMUMENT (The Sky Monument)" onto a fixed location on the earth. The Great Texas "Old Blue" Bison Constellation projects onto a large "BisonStar Sculpture." The large "BisonStar Sculpture" shall be designed at The State of Treasure Workshop using the "Ironwood Bison Sculpture" as a model. The large "BisonStar Sculpture" shall be constructed using an interior tubular framework covered over by copper sheeting externally etched with the features of a bison. The Sky Valley of The Sky Monument projects onto a parcel of land immediately to the east of "BisonStar Sculpture" called The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Land Valley (The Land Valley). The Land Valley is a parcel of rectangular land 990 feet by 660 feet (15 acres exactly)

with an aspect ration of 1.5 and is designated as a "The Land Valley" component of "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Land Monument." The Land Valley is also referred to as a "Texas Flag of Land." The Land Valley as a Texas Flag of Land is further partitioned into a matrix of 7,920 x 7920 smaller Texas Flags of Land. Each Texas Flag of Sky in The Sky Valley is uniquely numbered by a row and column designation. When projected on the earth each Texas Flag of Sky in The Sky Valley identifies a unique matrix address of a Texas Flag of Land in The Land Valley in the 15 acre parcel of land. The Lone Star of each Texas Flag of Sky uniquely connects to the associated Lone Star of each Texas Flag of Land in The Land Valley. Based on designed specifications above, a Texas Flag of Land in the 15 acre parcel defining The Land Valley is exactly 1.5 inches by 1.0 inches and is the same dimensions of the Texas flag printed on each Camp Goodnight Texas Tent (card)!

The Camp Goodnight Texas Flag of Sky Tent (card) featuring a unique number to identify a Texas Flag of Sky in The Sky Valley is the same number which uniquely identifies a Texas Flag of Land in The Land Valley! Calculating the matrix address from the unique number is a simple process. The State of Texas flag printed on the Tent is precisely 1.5 inches by 1.0 inches and represents a unique parcel of land in The Land Valley that shall be owned by the student donor offered as a Donation Premium Gift as a "Texas Donation Land Grant" to establish their "Family Homestead Spirit Bison Ranch" in The William Elmo Merrem Frontier Wilderness in Briscoe County, Texas. The Lone Star of a Texas Flag of Sky in The Sky Valley represents the "Spirit" of a new born bison calf of "The Great Texas Southern Plains Prairie Bison Herd" that once grew up, roamed free and died on the land that is now known as the State of Texas.

To commemorate the "Spirit" of each new born bison calf of "The Great Texas South Plains Prairie Bison Herd" that roamed free on the land that is now known as the State of Texas, The State of Texas Treasure Workshop of The STAR DAY Foundation has designed a "**Texas Silver Bison**" Donation Savings Coin. The coin is being manufactured by The Texas BisonStar Mint (TBM) Corporation of The STAR DAY Foundation and offered by The STAR DAY Foundation as a Donation Premium Gift (**DPG 3 KIT**) to donors as illustrated above.

At the request of The Texas Bison Student Study Group, The STAR DAY Foundation established "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund (The Fund)" with a challenging goal and a set of activities to help launch The Fund (SB-17). The Fund has been established as an "Endowment Fund" whose annual interest shall support an annual grant to the Quitaque Caprock Partners Foundation to pioneer and lead the management in partnership with Caprock Canyons State Park Superintendent of additional conservation, preservation and restoration initiatives of the majestic 15,000 acre Caprock Canyons State Park land and the unique bison herd at the park now known as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" considered by The Group to be a "State of Texas Treasure." ## THE DONORS

The STAR DAY Foundation shall invite Texans and Texas businesses to volunteer to roundup, save and donate to The STAR DAY Foundation to support the goal and activities of The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund as a STAR DAY birthday gift for the State of Texas. A person or a business wishing to donate **100%** of their donation directly to The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund may do so at the website of The STAR DAY Foundation at the time of donation.

## THE PROGRAMS

The State of Texas Treasure Workshop is pioneering and leading an effort to develop innovative fundraising programs as activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund." The following fundraising programs being studied are highlighted as:

**PROGRAM 1**: A Texan may wish to participate in "THE OFFICIAL STATE BISON HERD OF TEXAS FUND STAR DAY AID PROGRAM (The Program)" by volunteering to donate their "Age In Dollars" each year on their birthday, a personal "State of Texas Anniversary Remembrance (STAR) Day in Texas, as their personal STAR DAY birthday gift to the State of Texas!

**PROGRAM 2**: A Texas business may wish to participate in The Program by presenting each employee on his/her STAR DAY of employment a collection of State of Texas "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coins with a donation value equal to the number of years that an employee has worked for the company to honor and recognize an employees' service to their company. A STAR DAY of employment is the date on the calendar when the employee first joined the company.

**PROGRAM 3:** The STAR DAY Foundation shall also invite each Texas financial service institution such as a Texas Bank or a Texas Credit Union to join The Program by making periodic donations to The STAR DAY Foundation to acquire and maintain an inventory of State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coins (The Program Coins) and State of Texas Treasure Boxes to offer individual and business account holders the opportunity to make donations directly at their community financial institution trading US currency for The Program Coins. In one sense, each Texas financial institution who volunteers to participate in The Program acquires The Program Coins and provides the conversion service with the understanding that their annual volunteer service is an annual STAR DAY birthday gift for the State of Texas. The Program Coins are made available for face value conversion of US currency. The Program Coins shall be available in donation values of \$1, \$5, \$10 and \$20. A participating Texas financial institution may wish to pioneer and lead an effort to offer The Program Coins to customers to support special promotional programs such as new customer checking and saving accounts as well as offer Program Coins to customers who expand their savings accounts.

**PROGRAM 4**: The STAR DAY Foundation shall invite Texas retailers such as restaurants to participate in The Program by inviting them to periodically making donations to acquire Program Coins from The STAR DAY Foundation or their local financial institution to support the presentation of Program coins to customers during special promotional restaurant menu offerings during the year.

**PHOTOGRAPH 24:** The STAR DAY Foundation shall offer as a Donation Gift Premium a uniquely numbered Texas Flag of Sky in The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Sky Valley. Each Texas Flag of Sky is uniquely numbered as illustrated by the associated Texas Flag of Sky Camp Goodnight Texas Tent (card) which has the folded dimensions of 2.0 inches by 3.5 inches. The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps Badge represents a donor who is visiting Camp Goodnight Texas and sleeping in his/her Tent under the stars at night that are "Big and Bright Deep in the Heart of Briscoe County, Texas!" The Camp Goodnight Texas Tent is discussed in greater detail in the pages ahead.

"The Camp Goodnight Texas Flag of Sky Tent (The Tent)" card is a uniquely numbered commemorative "Donation Savings Benefit (DSB) Card" that is used as:

- DSB 1-A Library Card for "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library";
- DSB 2-A Texas Flag of Sky Locator Card;
- **DSB 3-**A Texas Flag of Land Locator Card;
- DSB 4-A Texas Flag of Land Donation Land Grant Deed Card; and
- **DSB 5-**A Texas Donation Stock Certificate Card

The reader shall find DSB 2-4 discussed in greater detail in this report.

**DSB 5** is a special benefit offered to student volunteers of The Junior PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps of The STAR DAY Foundation. The STAR DAY Foundation organized and incorporated "**The Texas BisonStar Mint (TBM) Corporation**" to pioneer and lead the effort

to support the manufacturing, inventorying and distribution of "State of Texas Treasure Donation Premium Gifts" created by The State of Texas Treasure Workshop of The STAR DAY Foundation as thank-you gifts to donors seeking to support the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. TBM was incorporated in Texas with 16,000 Capital (No-Par Value) Shares. The STAR DAY Foundation has set aside 49.5% (7,920) of the TBM Capital (No-Par Value) Shares as special "Donation Premium Gifts" for donors. Each TBM Capitol (No-Par Value) Share is divided into 7,920 "**Donation Savings Shares**" with each Donation Savings Share uniquely represented by a "**Camp Goodnight Texas Flag of Sky Tent (The Tent)**" card. Each Tent card features an eight digit number identifying one (1) unique "Donation Savings Share" of TBM Capital (No-Par Value) Shares.



## CAMP GOODNIGHT TEXAS

The BisonStar Sculpture represents "The Great Texas "Old Blue" Bison Constellation illustrated above.

Camp Goodnight Texas is at present a "virtual camping ground concept" which shall be developed in Briscoe County, Texas on land hopefully adjacent to Caprock Canyons State Park. A parcel of land shall be purchased from funds donated by Texas students and their families and others to be set aside as a "Texas Conservation Land Trust" to support Texas conservation, preservation and restoration activities of The Texas Bison Student Study Group. The parcel of land shall be designated by The STAR DAY Foundation as "THE WILLIAM ELMO MERREM

WILDERNESS FRONTIER (The Frontier)." William Elmo Merrem (1897-1982) was inducted into The First Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Hall of Honor in 2011 William Elmo Merrem was the first Texas Boy Scout to achieve the rank of Eagle Scout. A William Elmo Merrem Story Bookmark illustrating his life and legacy may be found in APPENDIX 2 of this report.

The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor was established by The STAR DAY Foundation in 2000. The Frontier shall be the home of The PALS of Texas Volunteers Memorial Forest and Camp Goodnight Texas on whose camping grounds shall be located The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library, The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (Land and Sky) Monument, The Texas Prairie Bison Observatory, The Great Texas "Old Blue" Bison Observatory and the Texas BisonStar Mint Corporation and its divisions.

"Old Blue" is the name of the very "first" female bison of The Great Texas Southern Plains Prairie Bison Herd born on the land that is now the State of Texas. "BisonStar" the "Official Mascot" of the Texas Bison Student Study Group born at Caprock Canyons State Park during May 2013 is said to be a direct descendant of "Old Blue." The legacy of "Old Blue" has been captured and immortalized in the creation of The Great Texas "Old Blue" Constellation by the Texas Astronomy Student Study Group sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation.

## THE ROUNDUP

The Spirit Bison of several PALS of Texas Volunteers families illustrated by Camp Good Night Texas Flag of Sky Tents with The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps Badges representing "Spirit Riders." A Texas Flag of Silver represents a Texas Flag at each of The Pals of Texas Flag of Sky Tents at Camp Goodnight Texas. The Spirit Bison are represented by different BisonStar Donation Savings Coins. In the lead on the migration trail is "BisonStar" represented by a BisonStar Sculpture. The Roundup begins on March 5 each year on The Charles Goodnight Day in Texas when PALS of Texas Volunteers families and the school-age children begin an effort to use the funds they raised and saved during the school year to acquire additional BisonStar Donation Savings Coins to expand their Family Homestead Ranch Spirit Bison Herd. The STAR DAY Foundation encourages the parents, grandparents and other relatives of their school age children to partner together to initially establish and maintains a "PALS of Texas Volunteers Family Homestead Spirit Ranch" in The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Monument Valley at Camp Goodnight Texas in The William Elmo Merrem Wilderness Frontier in Briscoe County, Texas. Each year PALS of Texas Volunteer Families representing a Texas school plan, develop and conduct an expedition on "The Quitaque Trail" to travel to Quitaque for "The PALS of Texas Volunteers Roundup" during the three-day "Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Celebration Days" to conduct business, visit and explore the majestic 15,000 acre Caprock Canyons State Park and seek and discover bison herd art the park now known as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas", attend "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library Luncheon Seminar" and participate in three-day and two-night "PALS of Texas Star Party" conducted in the park featuring amateur and professional presentations using Star Party telescopes.

## **CHAPTER 8**

## THE LIBRARY

"The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library (The Library)" has been established by The STAR DAY Foundation in 2015 initially as a "Virtual Library" at the website of The STAR DAY Foundation with the primary goal of being the "Official Library" of The STAR DAY Foundation. With a fundraising effort sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation, The Library shall be built in the City of Quitaque, known today as "The Official State Bison Capital of Texas."

The Library shall be located at Camp Goodnight Texas in The William Elmo Merrem Wilderness Frontier sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation Camp Goodnight Texas shall be the home ranch site of "The Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas" established by The STAR DAY Foundation on STAR DAY, February 19, 2000 to provide and opportunity for Texas students and adults to support the Mission of The STAR DAY Foundation and the goals of Texas Student Study Groups organized by The STAR DAY Foundation to support afterschool library expanded learning opportunities to explore and discover topics not generally offer in their school curriculum; to plan, develop and conduct expedition to visit Texas State Parks and other sites to study and document first-hand their Texas Student Study Group topic during the school year and to conduct research to identify, document, recommend, nominate and induct Texas men and women who are noted for being first in a walk-of-life in their specific Texas Student Study Group topic area. This report provides numerous examples of Texas Student Study Groups and their activities.

The STAR DAY Foundation shall purchase a parcel of land adjoining or adjacent to Caprock Canyons State Park in partnership with The PALS of Texas Volunteers to be set-aside as a "Texas Conservation Land Trust" as a gift from Texas families and their school children to be designated as "THE WILLIAM ELMO MERREM WILDERNESS FRONTIER." William Elmo Merrem (1897-1982) (SB 28) was inducted into The First Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Hall of Honor in 2011 William Elmo Merrem was the first Texas Boy Scout to achieve the rank of Eagle Scout. The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor was established by The STAR DAY Foundation in 2000.

The Library shall seek to partner with Texas school libraries (4<sup>th</sup> Grade through 9<sup>th</sup> Grade) and Texas and American history teachers to celebrate each year on or about September 12 "THE MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT DAY" in Texas and on or about March 5 "THE CHARLES GOODNIGHT DAY" in Texas to inspire and motivate students to explore and discover the life and service of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926) and Charles Goodnight (1836-1929) and the founding and founders of Caprock Canyons State Park and The Official State Bison Herd of Texas of Texas at the park, considered by The Texas Bison Student Study Group sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation as a "STATE OF TEXAS TREASURE!" The Texas Bison Student Study Group Story is illustrated in a Mary Ann

(Molly) Goodnight Library Collection of Story Bookmarks in APPENDIX 1.

The Library shall host "THE PALS OF TEXAS READERS ARE LEADERS PROGRAM" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation at participating school libraries in partnership with sponsoring school community businesses and non-profit organization. A primary goal of The Library is to pioneer and lead an effort to tell the story of the founding and founders of Caprock Canyons State Park and The Official State Bison Herd of Texas by creating a "Story Bookmark" Collection that shall be used to support The Texas Bison Student Study Groups' expanded learning opportunities network curriculum offered at partnering Texas schools and by home schooling families. .

A sample Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926) Story Bookmark is presented below for review. An additional goal of The Library shall be to raise the funds to support the publishing a book devoted to telling the story of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926). The Library also shall seek to republish a collection of books that shall be used to support The Texas Bison Student Study Groups' expanded learning opportunities curriculum. The first three (3) out-of-print book titles selected by The Library are illustrated in the following pages. The Library shall invite Texas families and their schoolchildren to help raise funds to support the effort to publish and republish Story Books that shall support the opportunity for schoolchildren to explore and discover the life and service of Molly and the founding and founders of the Caprock Canyons State Park and The Official State Bison Herd of Texas she helped save for the people of Texas.

The Library is dedicated to honoring and remembering the life and legacy of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1829-1926) who with the help of her husband Charles Goodnight (1836-1929) is credited with "indirectly" saving the last bison descendants of "The Great Southern Plains Bison Herd" who roamed free on the land that is now know as the State of Texas. In 1876 Charles Goodnight (1836-1929) was the first JA (John Adair) Ranch Manager.

The JA Ranch was initially located in the Texas Panhandle-Plains in Palo Duro Canyon. When Charles Goodnight and his ranch workers arrived in Palo Duro Canyon with a small herd of cattle he immediately established an initial JA Ranch Headquarters' site known today as the "Old Home Ranch" site. Charles was faced with a very challenging problem. On the initial JA Ranch range a herd of nearly 15,000 bison roamed free enjoining the Palo Duro grass and water. Charles recognized that the JA Ranch cattle and the bison herd could not co-exist. Charles hired William C. "Bill" Koogle (1848-1915) a noted bison hunter to quickly exterminate the bison herd. Koogle organized a crew of 18 to begin the bison hunt.

Koogle was very successful in killing the 1000's of bison and scattering the remaining bison. Koogle invited Charles to expand the bison hunt but Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight influenced her husband to discontinue the bison hunt. Molly found that Koogle would not waste bison cartridges to kill bison calves or yearlings since he was making additional money in skinning adult bison and selling and trading their skins for supplies. Molly found out that many bison calves and yearlings were dying of hunger on the JA Ranch range as told by the stories of

JA Ranch cattle wranglers returning to the ranch headquarters from their range duties. Charles following the advice of Molly stopped the bison slaughter and instead gave Koogle and his crew a contract to fence off the initial JA Ranch property. It is true that eventually Charles becomes very interested in crossing bison with his cattle. In 1888 Charles and Molly leave the JA Ranch with bison and cattle to start their own cattle/bison ranch. The bison that Charles took from the JA Ranch are not the bison that now are at Caprock Canyons State Park. In 1996, the JA Ranch rounded-up the very last bison that were descendants of the Koogle bison hunt and donated them to Caprock Rock Canyons State Park. Only 36 bison could be found! Today (2016) the park herd numbers approximately 140 bison!! The Texas Bison Student Study Group sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation pioneered and led a conservation, preservation and restoration activity in partnership with Texas State Legislators in 2011 to successfully have the Texas State Legislature designate the park bison herd as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas." The Group believes that "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" is in fact as "State of Texas Treasure!"

The reader may wish to explore the expanded Story Article authored by Robert W. Brown, "Bill Koogle (1849-1915)-The Mysterious Man of the West" published in Volume 2 as Article 4 of The Texas Bison Student Study Group Journal at the website of The STAR DAY Foundation.

## THE JOURNAL

The reader may wish to visit the website of The STAR DAY Foundation to explore and discover "Story Articles" authored by our volunteers of The PALS of Texas Volunteers published in "The Texas Bison Student Study Group Journal." Volume 2 of The Journal has been posted. Each Story Article of The Journal is posted as PDF document that may be read online or downloaded, saved and read on a digital device of the reader as his/her schedule permits. The Story Bookmarks, Story Articles and Story Books published by The STAR DAY Foundation and archived at The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library are used as curriculum materials to support the objectives and activities of a charted POST (Point Of Service In Texas) of The PALS of Texas Volunteers at partnering Texas schools and home schooling families.

The Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group) sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation has adopted an "Official 3D Wallpaper Poster" to help illustrate the majestic park land and unique bison herd of Caprock Canyons State Park located just three miles north of the City of Quitaque, Texas now known as "The Official State Bison Capital of Texas." The Poster features "BisonStar", the "Official Mascot" of The Group depicted as a bison calf. BisonStar was born at the park in May 2013.

A park prairie dog is illustrated on the right of The Poster and is named "Buddy." In the center bottom of The Poster Mexican Hat flowers can be seen. The Group has selected the Mexican Hat flower to represent the many native flowers that abound in the park. The Group

that named a Mexican Hat flower "Jose" character to help tell the story of the native flowers and other native plants at the park. BisonStar shall be a story character that shall help tell the story of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" at the Park. Buddy shall help tell the story of the many animals that call the park their home. In the background one can view the majestic Caprock Canyons geology against a cloud filled blue sky.

The Poster shall be used at the website of The STAR DAY Foundation as the entry portal to a website universe that shall provide members of The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library (The Library) established by The STAR DAY Foundation to provide the opportunity to explore and discover the wonders of the majestic park land, bison herd, flowers, plants and animals and all the other living creatures that call the park their home. The Group shall invite Texas students and students worldwide to join The Library to also explore and discover The Groups' conservation, preservation and restoration initiatives by studying their Story Bookmarks, Story Articles, Story Books and Story Videos of The Library. The Library shall invite Texas school libraries to establish a POST (Point Of Service in Texas) as a "special library" to assist students to access and use the digital story collections of The Library to support an expanded learning opportunities as an after-school student enrichment program. The Poster shall be offered to Texas families and individuals as a "Donation Premium Gift." The Poster is designed as a 2 foot by 3 foot removable wallpaper for a young person's home or school library shipped in a protect tube.

## THE CHARACTERS

The story of "BisonStar", "Jose" and "Buddy" are illustrated by the next three (3) Story Bookmarks. ## THE "MY BISONSTAR" POSTER KIT (DPG KIT-6)

The "My BisonStar" Poster Donation Premium Gift Kit (DPG KIT 6) shall be offered by The STAR DAY Foundation for a \$24 donation featuring The Poster with BisonStar, Jose and Buddy Story Bookmarks as illustrated below. The Kit shall also feature a State of Texas "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Collection composed of one (1) Twenty Dollar Donation Savings Coins, and four (4) One Dollar Donation Savings Coins in a State of Texas Treasure Box and a Camp Goodnight Texas Tent shipped by USPS to the donors US address. The Kit shall expand the student's "Family Homestead BisonStar Spirit Bison Herd" at their "Family Homestead BisonStar Spirit Ranch" in The William Elmo Merrem Frontier Wilderness with the student volunteering to act as "The Family Homestead BisonStar Spirit Herdsman" of The Junior PALS of Texas stationed at Camp Goodnight Texas in The William Elmo Merrem Frontier Wilderness in Briscoe County, Texas.



#### "BISONSTAR"

The Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group) was initially organized by The STAR DAY Foundation at Lucy Rede Franco Middle School in the Presidio ISD under the supervision of School Principal Teresa Porras with the volunteer support of school teachers, staff and community members on September 12, 2010, the anniversary of the birthday of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926), known as "The Woman Who Saved the Texas Plains Bison." The primary objectives of The Group are: to provide students with the opportunity to explore and discover the origin of the Texas Plains Bison and the native Americans who hunted them: to understand and appreciate the conservation, preservation and restoration efforts being pioneered and led by the Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team at Caprock Canyons State Park near Quitaque, Briscoe County, Texas dedicated to saving the Goodnight Bison Herd from extinction; to honor and remember the life and achievements of Molly and Charles Goodnight as the first Texas bison ranch family; to plan, develop and conduct school history and science field trips to partnering Texas bison ranches; and to study and evaluate school lunch menu applications of Texas bison ground meat in partnership with student families and school cafeteria staff. The Group shall also seek ways and means to help raise needed funds to support the conservation, preservation and restoration work of the Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team as a service achievement of merit to enhance the story of Texas for the people of Texas. The primary activities of The Group have included pioneering and leading successful legislative efforts to designate the Texas State Bison Herd at Caprock Canyons State Park as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas", to designate the 12th of September as "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Day" in Texas and the 5th of March as "The Charles Goodnight Day" in Texas in partnership with the Texas State Legislature. Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, issued Commendation Letters to honor, recognize The Group for their proposed legislative service achievements of merit. On September 12, 2013, The Group formally launched "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" to plan, develop and conduct activities over the next fifteen (15) years to raise \$100 million dollars as an endowment fund managed

by The STAR DAY Foundation in partnership with a leading Texas bank whose annual interest shall support a Texas conservation, preservation and restoration grant presented to the Caprock Canyons State Park Superintendent to support the work of the Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team to help conserve, preserve and restore "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas-a State of Texas Treasure" for the people of Texas and friends of Texas worldwide. Caprock Canyons State Park Ranger and eAdvisor of The Group Le'Ann Pigg proposed a male bison born during May 2013 to be designated by The Group as an "Official Mascot" of The Group. The Group named this new born calf "BisonStar." The Group proposed a "Partnership in Education" initiative to Governor Rick Perry to seek his authorization to use the "Official Seal" of the State of Texas as one side of a "Texas Silver BisonStar" donation coin series to be offered to the public to help raise funds. The "first" donation coins with supporting commemorative story bookmarks shall be offered to the general public as a "MY BISONSTAR" Donation Premium Package on September 12, 2014, the 175th anniversary of Molly's birthday as a thank-you gift for saving and making a donation to support the goal and activities of The Fund. The STAR DAY Foundation organized The Texas BisonStar Mint (TBM) Corporation as a for-profit Texas corporation to research, plan, develop, manufacture and package and distribute approved "Donation Premium Packages" as thankyou gifts to donors of The STAR DAY Foundation who seek to volunteer and enlist in the international effort to support the goal and activities of The Fund. The "first" Donation Premium Package shall be "MY BISONSTAR." The BISONSTAR" Donation Premium Package shall contain a "MY BISONSTAR" silver donation coin of 1 gram weight featuring .999 fine silver contents and be 15mm in diameter. It is true that "MY BISONSTAR" is of small weight and size but so is a new born Texas Plains Bison calf! The STAR DAY Foundation shall invite parents, grandparents, and other relatives of school-age children to save and make a donation to acquire a "MY BISONSTAR" Donation Premium Package for each of their schoolage children as a gift to challenge and encourage their school-age children to also volunteer and enlist in the effort to collect and save "Texas Silver BisonStars" to organize and manage their own "Texas BisonStar Spirit Herd" on their "Family Frontier Homestead Spirit Ranch" at Fort Goodnight Texas on the frontier of the future of the great State of Texas as a service achievement of merit STAR. DAY birthday gift for the State of Texas each year following in the foot steps of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926) when she saved Texas Plains Bison calves from extinction.

BISONSTAR-AN OFFICIAL STORY BOOK CHARACTER THE GREAT ADVENTURES OF BISONSTAR, JOSE AND BUDDY CREATED BY THE STATE OF TEXAS TREASURE WORKSHOP

The "Mexican Hat Prairie Coneflower" is a species (Ratibida columnaris (Asteraceae)) of flowering plant in the daisy family that is native to much of North America. It inhabits prairies, plains, roadsides, and disturbed areas from southern Canada through most of the United States to northern Mexico. This drought-tolerant US-native perennial blooms through much of the summer, with bright coneflowers appearing in profusion on tall stems.

"IOSE"

The flower clearly inspires the common name "Mexican hat," as it consists of a long central cone surrounded at the base by drooping petals—reminiscent in shape of a sombrero or 10-gallon hat. The flower attracts bees and butterflies with its flowers and birds with its seeds and is deer resistant.

Green leaves appear at the base of the plant. Flower stalks are leafless. The flower blooms from early summer into the fall. At maturity the upright branching stems may become woody. The flower prefers full sun in well drained soil and is outstanding in hot-humid climates. The flower is unfussy about soil type, but needs good drainage. It tolerates moist or dry soil. It is highly drought tolerant owing to its long taproot. One must provide supplemental moisture in late summer to extend flowering into fall. The flower may grow to two feet to three feet tall. An excellent variety for cut flower display arrangements lasting 5 to 10 days.

The flower is easy to grow from seed in fall or spring. Germination takes place in about 20 to 40 days. The average number of seeds that may be harvested from the flower per pound is approximately 1,230,000. A typical retail seed packed may contain approximately 1,075 seeds. One ounce of seed may cover approximately 2, 723 sq. ft. which is approximately 1/16 of an acre (43,560 sq. ft.).

Prairie dogs are mostly herbivorous burrowing rodents native to the grasslands of North America. The five species are: black-tailed, white-tailed, Gunnison's, Utah, and Mexican prairie dogs. They are a type of ground squirrel, found in the United States, Canada and Mexico. In Mexico, prairie dogs are found primarily in the northern states, which lie at the southern end of the Great Plains: northeastern Sonora, north and northeastern Chihuahua, northern Coahuila, northern Nuevo León, and northern Tamaulipas. In the United States, they range primarily to the west of the Mississippi River, though they have also been introduced in a few eastern locales.

Prairie dogs are named for their habitat and warning call, which sounds similar to a dog's bark. The name was in use at least as early as 1774. The 1804 journals of the Lewis and Clark Expedition note that in September 1804, they "discovered a Village of an animal the French Call the Prairie Dog". Its genus, Cynomys, derives from the Greek for "dog mouse". Prairie dogs raise their heads from their burrows in response to disturbances. On average, these stout-bodied rodents will grow to be between 30 and 40 cm (12 and 16 in) long, including the short tail, and weigh between 0.5 and 1.5 kilograms (1 and 3 lb).

Prairie dogs are chiefly herbivorous, though they eat some insects. They feed primarily on grasses and small seeds. In the fall, they eat broadleaf forbs. In the winter, lactating and pregnant females supplement their diets with snow for extra water. They also will eat roots, seeds, fruit, and buds. Grasses of various species are eaten. Blacktailed prairie dogs in South Dakota eat western bluegrass, blue grama, buffalo grass, six weeks fescue, and tumblegrass, while Gunnison's prairie dogs eat rabbit brush, tumbleweeds, dandelions, saltbush, and cacti in addition to buffalo grass and blue grama.

Burrows help prairie dogs control their body temperature as they are 5-10 °C during the winter and 15-25 °C in the summer. Prairie dog tunnel systems channel rainwater into the water table which prevents runoff and erosion, and can also change the composition of the soil in a region by reversing soil compaction that can result from cattle grazing.

Prairie dog burrows are 5-10 meters (16-33 ft)

long and 2-3 meters (6.6-9.8 ft) below the ground. The entrance holes are generally 10-30 cm (3.9-11.8 in) in diameter. Prairie dog burrows can have up to six entrances. Sometimes the entrances are simply flat holes in the ground, while at other times they are surrounded by mounds of soil either left as piles or hard packed. Some mounds, known as dome craters, can be as high as 0.2-0.3 meter (7.9-11.8 in) high. Other mounds, known as rim craters, can be as high as 1 meter. Dome craters and rim craters serve as observation posts used by the animals to watch for predators. They also protect the burrows from flooding. The holes also possibly provide ventilation as the air enters through the dome crater and leaves through the rim crater, causing a breeze though the burrow. Prairie dog burrows contain chambers to provide certain functions. They have nursery chambers for their young, chambers for night, and chambers for the winter. They also contain air chambers that may function to protect the burrow from flooding and a listening post for predators. When hiding from predators, prairie dogs use lessdeep chambers that are usually a meter below the surface. Nursery chambers tend to be deeper, being two to three meters below the surface.





WILLIAM DAVID BERRY (1926-1997)

William D. Berry was born on May 20, 1926, in San Mateo, California to Harvey and Ruth Berry. His father was an electrical engineer, his mother pursued interests in music. He had one sister, Ann.

From his early childhood in the southwestern desert to the closing days of his life in the taiga forest of Alaska, Berry was absorbed by the diversity of living creatures with which he shared the world. Years of observation gave him a singular capability to perceive animals; years of study and practice gave him an equally singular ability to convey them to observers through an array of artist's media.

Bill was drawing animals as soon as he was old enough to hold something to draw them with. By the time he was three, he was cutting out animal silhouettes that were recognizable creatures. He completed his first book, on slugs, when he was five. He illustrated school papers, did a mural in junior high school, worked up a series of cartoon characters and planned to work for Disney Studios when he was out of high school. He attended the Art Center in Los Angles, California in 1943, but World War II intervened in his career plans and he enlisted in the Army in 1944. He spent 3 years in the military, his last year as a cartoonist on the Pacific edition of the Stars and Strips.

Upon returning to California he attended the School of Allied Arts for three years. He then met and married Liz Lambert and moved to Alaska where he raised 2 sons. Mark and Paul.


William D. Berry was a nationally known and skilled wildlife artist, but to many Alaskans he was also a kind of state treasure. – and certainly a natural resource. He spent a life time studying and drawing the creatures around him. His clear vision, conveyed with his disciplined skills, captured creatures and their habitats in works that are both scientifically accurate and artistically compelling. Perhaps it is that honesty that makes his work a challenge to other artists who wish to capture the essence of animals and captivate viewers. It is surely one of the reasons that his sketches continue to please all who cherish wilderness. Each of his creatures has its own character presented with respect for individuality as well as accuracy for its species characteristics.

Berry is known to many through his books: Deneki: An Alaskan Moose and Buffalo Land: The Untamed Wilderness of the High Plains Frontier. Berry illustrated other volumes and expressed his art in many other forms, working in pencil, oil, silkscreen, and bronze sculpture. As well as being scientifically accurate, his work could also be lighthearted, as his cartoons and murals show. Bill's respect for all living things shines through in the way he caught the spirit of the animal or plant in his drawing. Although he left relatively few finished works, he did leave a wealth of material in his field sketches, notebooks, stories and letters.



CHARLES GOODNIGHT (1836-1929)

The names of certain individuals stand out boldly in the history of the Lone Star State, and for more than a century, the life of famed rancher Charles Goodnight has inspired generations of Texans.

Bom on March 5, 1836, to Charles and Charlotte Goodnight in Macoupin County, Illinois, young Charles Goodnight joined his family in 1845 on the 800-mile journey to Milam County, Texas, where the boy arrived riding bareback on a whitefaced mare named Blaze; from an early age, he learned the virtue of hard work, laboring as a farmhand, racing as a jockey, and hauling freight with teams of oxen.

Mr. Goodnight entered into a partnership with his stepbrother, John Wesley Sheek, in 1856 to raise 400 head of cattle in the Brazos Valley; in the late 1850s, he met Oliver Loving, and together the two young men drove a herd to the gold rush camps in Colorado before the Civil War; during the 1860s, he worked as a scout for the Texas Rangers, taking part in the Comanche wars and fighting outlaws along the Colorado and Brazos River.

After his service with the Rangers, Mr. Goodnight returned to the cattle business, and in 1866, he, Mr. Loving, and 18 cowhands drove a herd from Fort Belknap, Texas, to Fort Summer, New Mexico, and the route they forged became known as the Goodnight-Loving Trail, one of the most heavily trafficked cattle trails in the Southwest; Charles Goodnight is also credited with inventing the chuck wagon during that legendary drive.

In 1870, he married Mary Ann "Molly" Dyer, a schoolteacher, and the couple settled in Colorado for several years before returning to Texas; in 1876, he entered into a partnership with John G. Adair to set up the JA Ranch along Palo Duro Canyon, with Mr. Goodnight serving as resident manager and part owner of the operation; over the next 11 years, he increased the ranch's herd and expanded its range and helped establish law and order in the Panhandle; he pioneered the use of many new techniques and inventions, including artificial watering facilities, barbed wire fences, and the development of Hereford bulls through crossbreeding; he also created one of the first western sidesaddles, for use by his wife.


From 1887 to 1926, Charles and Molly Goodnight lived in a spacious, two-story ranch house on the Goodnight Ranch near the Salt Fork of the Red River; when his wife became distressed at the decline of the southern herd of native bison, Mr. Goodnight took up their cause, breeding them on his ranch and shipping buffalo to Yellowstone National Park and to zoos on the East Coast and in Europe; he also raised other animals and performed agricultural experiments with the encouragement of botanist Luther Burbank.

Molly Goodnight died in 1926, and Charles Goodnight followed her three years later at the age of 93, and they are buried together in the Goodnight Cemetery, not far from the ranch they called home for nearly 40 years; the descendants of the Goodnights' buffalo live on as the Official State Bison Herd of Texas at Caprock Canyons State Park, and the legacy of Charles Goodnight, pioneer, cattleman, and naturalist, will endure as long as the Lone Star shines bright over Texas.

CHARLES JESSE JONES (1844-1919)

Charles Jesse Jones, better known as "Buffalo Jones," was born in Illinois on January 31, 1844, the second of twelve children. His father Noah was a farmer. As a child, Jones had a natural affinity for wild animals. One of his earliest catches was a red squirrel he tamed and sold to a man in Bloomington for two dollars.

He attended Wesleyan University when he was 21, studying natural history. After two years, he contracted typhoid fever, and the resulting damage to his eyesight forced him to abandon his formal education. He then headed west to Kansas, where he married Martha Walton and began a family. Later, he joined the Fulton Brothers in founding a new community, Garden City, Kansas. During this time, he made his living by hunting buffalo, sometimes killing as many as sixty in one day. He kept what he needed for his family and sold the rest, primarily to traders from the east. Although he hated killing the mighty animals, he knew that other hunters would continue to profit from the slaughter of the buffalo, whether or not he participated.

In the 1880s, Jones led several expeditions to the Texas Panhandle, near Palo Duro Canyon. His purpose was to capture buffalo calves and take them to his ranch in Garden City and raise a herd of buffalo in captivity. On the hunt of 1886 he captured fourteen calves after struggling against a late winter storm. In 1889, he captured seven calves plus eleven adult buffalo. Carrier pigeons flew news of his progress to Garden City, which was then telegraphed to major newspapers and publicized throughout the world. He bred the buffalo with cattle to create

animals he called "cattalo" that could survive the harsh winters and provide meat for the families on the plains.

Jones became the first game warden of Yellowstone Park in 1902, appointed by his friend President Theodore Roosevelt. During his tenure as park ranger, he established the herd of bison that still inhabits Yellowstone Park. With funding from Congress, he purchased more than two dozen buffalo, including some from his own ranch in Kansas, which he herded across the plains and through the Rocky Mountains to Yellowstone.

Jones started a ranch on the north side of the Grand Canyon in 1906, where he continued his efforts to preserve the buffalo by breeding cattalo. In addition, he hosted Zane Grey on a trip to the area, which helped to launch Grey's career as a famous Western author. In fact, several of Grey's novels introduce characters modeled after Buffalo Jones, including Raiders of the Spanish Peaks and The Last of the Plainsmen.

While in his sixties, Jones made two expeditions to Africa in search of new quarry: rhinoceros, lions, and gorillas. Much to the astonishment of the traditional hunters, he did not kill the animals; he simply chased them down and lassoed them, with his camera crew filming the entire hunt. Many of the animals he caught were set free; however, he brought home a lioness to the Bronx Zoo. On his second expedition, he became ill with malaria. Over the next three years, he suffered numerous relapses and never recovered his full strength. Buffalo Jones died in Topeka, Kansas, on October 1, 1919, at the home of his daughter.

Charles Jesse Jones was inducted into the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, in 1959. Twenty years later, the Finney County Historical Museum in Garden City, Kansas, developed a permanent exhibit dedicated to his memory. Because of his lifelong efforts to save the buffalo from extinction, Buffalo Jones became known as the Preserver of the American Bison.



#### "THE FINAL ACT"

## THE INAUGURATION

On Thursday, February 19, 1846, two great Texas politicians met in front of the wood-planked Capitol building of the Republic of Texas in the City of Austin, Travis County to conduct one of the most important peace time flag services in the history of the United States. Dr. Anson Jones (1798-1858), the last President of the Republic of Texas, lowered the Lone Star flag of the Republic of Texas for the last official time at 12 noon and witnessed the flag of the United States being raised over the State of Texas, the 28th state of the Union, as James

Pinckney Henderson (1808-1858) was sworn in as the first Governor of the State of Texas to the cheers of a few thousand Austin residents and visitors.

The entry of Texas as the 28<sup>th</sup> state of the United States was a leading factor in the Republic of Mexico declaring war against the United States in 1846. Governor James Pinckney Henderson was formally invited by the first State of Texas Legislature to take a leave of absence from his duties as Governor and lead the State of Texas volunteers into battle which he did as an outstanding leader of men. Governor Henderson was formally honored by the United States Congress with commemorative sword for his feats of valor during the Mexican War.

## THE FOUNDATION

The STAR DAY Foundation was organized in 1998 and established in 1999 as a Texas nonprofit, 501(c)3 tax exempt, corporation with the MISSION to carry out the legislative intent of the STAR DAY Bill (Senate Bill 1656-76<sup>th</sup> State Legislature) in partnership with all Texas public schools and the people of the State of Texas. The mission and educational activities of The STAR DAY Foundation have been dedicated to carrying out the legislative intent of the STAR DAY bill (Senate Bill 1656-76<sup>th</sup>) in partnership with Texas schools and other organizations to inspire a greater appreciation for the history of the state and to honor and remember the life and legacy of the first pioneers and leaders who founded the State of Texas on February 19, 1846. The STAR DAY Bill states that all Texas public schools and other organizations shall celebrate the birthday of the State of Texas on the 19<sup>th</sup> of February each year with appropriate and patriotic programs to inspire a greater appreciation of the history of the state.

The STAR DAY Foundation has since 1996 planned, developed and conducted "The Spirit of STAR DAY Celebration" on February 19 each year with the support of State of Texas Governor's George W. Bush, Rick Perry and Greg Abbott with the mission to invite Texas schools to pioneer and lead an effort to celebrate the birthday of the State of Texas at their respective schools and to offer their time to volunteer to make Service Achievements of Merit (SAM) as their annual birthday gifts for the State of Texas. During odd years The STAR DAY Foundation conducts "The Spirit of STAR DAY Celebration" on STAR DAY February 19 in the Texas State Capitol Rotunda in partnership with sponsoring State Senators and State Representatives. During even years The STAR DAY Foundation accepts an invitation from a Texas school to conduct "The Spirit of STAR DAY Celebration" at their institution as an all-school community event.

The STAR DAY Bill was initiated by a Daniel B. Kulvicki, 9<sup>th</sup> grade United States History students' as a class paper. State Representative Craig Eiland introduced the bill and State Senator Mike Jackson sponsored the bill during the 76<sup>th</sup> State of Texas Legislature. The bill was signed into law by Governor George W. Bush on June 18, 1999. In order to show support for the bill, the student invited and received Memorial Resolutions from all 254 Texas County Judges, a first in Texas history in support of a legislative initiative. The support of all 254 Texas Counties for the passage of The STAR DAY Bill was pioneered and led by Galveston County Judge James D. Yarbrough and Loving County Judge Donald C. Creager.

## THE PALS OF TEXAS VOLUNTEERS CORPS

The Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Volunteers Corps was established in 2000 to pioneer and lead a statewide effort to support the Mission of The STAR DAY Foundation to plan, develop and conduct the birthday of the State of Texas on STAR DAY the 19<sup>th</sup> of February each year with appropriate and patriotic programs in partnership with Texas schools and other organizations to inspire and motivate young Texans to explore and discover the founding and founders of the State of Texas as their historical heritage. The PALS of Texas Volunteers are organized into Texas Student Study Groups.

Currently, The STAR DAY Foundation has organized with the help of The PALS of Texas Volunteers twelve (12) Texas Student Study Groups to provide students with the unique opportunity to volunteer and participate in after-school expanded learning opportunity activities at their school libraries. The participating students also have the opportunity to pioneer and lead as individuals or in groups in planning, developing and conducting service achievements of merit as their annual STAR DAY birthday gifts for the State of Texas guided by The PALS of Texas Volunteers.

The Texas Bison Student Study Group was established by The STAR DAY Foundation on September 12, 2010, "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Day" in Texas, and is guided by The PALS of Texas Volunteers with the help of teachers, librarians, parents and advisors at partnering schools. The PALS of Texas Volunteers plan to meet annually in Quitaque for a three-day weekend called: "THE PALS OF TEXAS VOLUNTEERS ROUNDUP (The Roundup)." The attendees of The Roundup shall conduct business and their families shall enjoy a musical camping visit with great food to explore and discover the majestic park land and "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas". The families may also wish to attend "THE GREAT TEXAS BISONSTAR PARTY" in the evenings to enjoy the dark night skies of the park with the help of partnering area amateur and professional astronomers to view "The Great Texas BisonStar Constellation." The highlight of The Round Up each year shall be attending "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library Luncheon!"

#### THE BADGE

The Badge is 1 inch in diameter featuring a pin and cap on the back. The design of the "Lone Star" featuring the letters of Texas is found in the Texas State Capitol Rotunda in Austin, Travis County, Texas. A person visiting the Rotunda may see this design when the visitor steps into the middle of the Rotunda and looks straight up. The visitor will see the design at the very top of the Rotunda Dome. The design was a featured emblem of The Republic of Texas (1836-1846). The phrase "CAMP GOODNIGHT TEXAS" is the name of the "Official Camp Grounds" of The PALS of Texas Volunteers.

The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps (The Volunteers) was organized by The STAR DAY Foundation on STAR DAY, February 19, 2000 to provide individuals the opportunity to help pioneer and lead the effort to support the mission and activities of The STAR DAY Foundation including efforts to support Texas Student Study Groups charted by The STAR DAY Foundation at partnering Texas public and private schools and at Texas Homeschooling sites. The Junior PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps (The Junior Volunteers) are K-12 students who volunteer to participate in a Texas School Student Study Group sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation and who are supervised by their parents as their plan, develop and conduct service achievements of merit as their annual STAR DAY birthday gift for the State of Texas. In each Texas County, The STAR DAY Foundation is inviting persons to volunteer and enlist in The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps to honor and remember the lives and achievements of men and women of their respective counties who have passed, who are generally known for being first in a walk of life or who have had made a notable first and who had made service achievements of merit for the state; to pioneer and lead Induction Service Events hosted by their county institutions to induct nominated persons into "THE FIRST PIONEERS AND LEADERS OF THE STATE (PALS) OF TEXAS HALL OF HONOR" hosted by The PALS of Texas Volunteers Corps and sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation since 2000.

The Nominator shall volunteer to author a First PALS of Texas Induction Story Bookmark and shall volunteer to plan, develop and conduct an Induction Service Event.



In even years the event is sponsored by a partnering Texas public school at their location. The Governor's "Spirit of STAR DAY School Address" is read at the event by a student selected by the school principal. At the event each year The STAR DAY Foundation presents its highest award "The Spirit of Spirit of STAR DAY Service Achievement of Merit (SAM) Award" to honor and recognize an individual or institution that has made outstanding service achievements of merit to enhance the story of Texas for the people of Texas.

## Texas celebrates 150 years of statehood and the future leaders of the state

**FEBRUARY 19, 1996-STAR DAY-AUSTIN, TRAVIS COUNTY TEXAS**-The First "State of Texas Anniversary Remembrance (STAR) Day Celebration" was designated by a Proclamation issued by Governor George W. Bush at the request of Daniel B. Kulvicki, a Galveston County Dickinson ISD student whose 9<sup>th</sup> grade American History class paper proposed that the State of Texas celebrates its birthday each year on February 19 to honor and remember the founding and founders of the State of Texas in partnership with Texas schools and other organization and to inspire a greater appreciation of the history of the state.

At the request and with the support of Governor George W. Bush, Kulvicki pioneered and led a successful legislative effort to invite the 76<sup>th</sup> Texas State Legislature meeting in the spring of 1999 to pass a STAR DAY bill (Senate bill 1656) to formally designate February 19 each year as STAR DAY. His legislative effort failed in the 75<sup>th</sup> Texas State Legislature meeting in the spring of 1997. The STAR DAY Foundation was formally launched in 1999 to carry out the legislative intent of the STAR DAY bill in partnership with Texas schools and other organizations as an annual "STAR DAY Birthday Gift" for the State of Texas.

During odd-years STAR DAY is celebrated in the Texas State Capitol Rotunda by The STAR DAY Foundation sponsored by Texas State Legislators in partnership with attending Texas school delegation with a support School Band performance. During even-years, The STAR DAY Foundation has invited a Texas public school to plan, develop and conduct a "Spirit of STAR DAY Celebration" event on their campus on STAR DAY supervised by the School Principal and in partnership with their school librarian, teachers, students and school band director as a STAR DAY birthday gift for the State of Texas. APPENDIX 3 of this report features an expand story of STAR DAY with illustrations of previous "Spirit of STAR DAY Celebration" events.

## THE STAR DAY 1996 STORY

The Galveston County City of Dickinson Mayor John Mitchiner issued the "First City of Texas" STAR DAY Proclamation on October 24, 1995. Governor George W. Bush issued the "First State of Texas" STAR DAY Proclamation on February 13, 1996. The 75<sup>th</sup> State of Texas Legislature meeting in spring of 1997 failed to pass a STAR DAY bill proposed by Daniel B. Kulvicki authored by State Representative Craig Eiland and sponsored by State Senator Mike Jackson. Galveston County Judge James D. Yarbrough issued the "First Texas County" STAR DAY Proclamation on April 16, 1998 and proposed that Daniel B. Kulvicki invite the other 253 Texas Counties to issue similar Texas County STAR DAY Proclamations to support the passage of a STAR DAY bill in the 76<sup>th</sup> Texas State Legislature in spring of 1999. Daniel B. Kulvicki and his father Dennis M. Kulvicki pioneered and led the campaign to successfully acquire the 253 Texas County STAR DAY Proclamations and also acquired ten (10) Texas City STAR DAY Proclamations during the summer and early fall of 1998. Lt. Governor Rick Perry invited State Senator Mike Jackson to author a STAR DAY bill in the 76<sup>th</sup> State of Texas Legislature. Senate Bill 1656 was sponsored by Texas State Representative Craig Eiland. Daniel B. Kulvicki was invited to present testimony and to show his collection of Texas County and City STAR DAY Proclamations in the Senate and House Committees considering the STAR DAY bill. The STAR DAY bill was passed by the 76th State of Texas Legislature and signed into law by Governor George W. Bush. Governor George W. Bush at the request of Daniel B. Kulvicki issued State of Texas STAR DAY Proclamations for the years 1996-1999.

The STAR DAY efforts of Daniel B. Kulvicki have been illustrated in a Chapter 8 of a college school textbook published in 2001 by Houghton Miffin entitled "*Texas Politics: Individuals Making a Difference*" authored by Nasser Momayezi.



## OFFICIAL MEMORANDUM STATE OF TEXAS OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

On December 29, 1845, President James K. Polk signed the Joint Resolution of Congress for Texas Statehood, which thereby designated the Republic of Texas as the 28th state of the United States of America. At that time, the Republic of Texas had only 36 counties, and 20 senators and 66 representatives elected to the first Legislature of the state of Texas.

On February 19, 1846, members of the Texas Legislature and other officials gathered in Austin at noon on Hickory (8th) and Colorado streets to witness Dr. Anson Jones, the last president of the Republic of Texas, lower the Lone Star flag of the Republic of Texas and raise the flag of the United States of America. On this day, James Pinckney Henderson was sworn in as the first governor of the state of Texas.

This year marks the 150th anniversary of the inauguration of the first governor of Texas.

Therefore, I, George W. Bush, Governor of Texas, do hereby proclaim February 19, 1996, as:



#### THE STAR DAY FOUNDATION FIRST PIONEERS AND LEADERS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS HALL OF HONOR



CHARLES NAPOLEON CHARLTON (1845-1908)

Charles Napoleon Charlton was born on January 19, 1845 to Napoleon Bonaparte Charlton (1815-1880) and a female slave whose name is not known on his plantation in Tyler County, Texas. N. B. Charlton married Sarah Lewis Foster, daughter of William Lewis Foster and Jane Lawson before 1845 in Tyler County. They had five children. Sarah Charlton passed away in January 1870.

N. B. Charlton is known as the "first" person to be elected and serve as Texas House District 23 Representative in 1849 until 1861 representing Tyler and Jefferson counties. He represented Liberty County in the First Texas Legislature in 1846. In 1850 N. B. Charlton owned 20,000 acres in Tyler County and listed his occupation as farmer. N. B. Charlton was one of Tyler's representatives to the Texas Secession Convention of 1861 where he voted for secession. N. B. Charlton died on June 17, 1896 and was buried in Tyler County.

C. N. Charlton was taught to read and write by his white step-mother, Sarah Lewis Charlton, beginning at the age of ten. He was called "Charlie Pole" as his nickname. He was freed in 1865 and married a Mary E. Runnels (1850-1930) in 1866 and they raised five boys and three girls who were all well educated by their parents.

C. N. Charlton came from Tyler County to Jefferson County in the early 1870's. Seeing that Negroes needed a public school C. N. Charlton along with Woodson Pipkin, set about the task pioneering and leading an effort of establishing "The Oakridge School" in 1874 in Beaumont as a "first" school for Negro children with the help of others. The Oakridge School was started in the Live Oak Baptist Church, on what is now known as Neches

Street in Beaumont. He interested other Negro citizens and with their aid constructed a building and organized The Oak Ridge School, later known as Pipkin School. C. N. Charlton was also employed in Beaumont as a Teamster as noted in the 1900 Federal Census.

C. N. Charlton was a "first" pioneer educator and community leader in Beaumont whose outstanding community and family educational service achievements of merit for Texas still challenge, encourage, inspire and motivate students to excel. He passed away on March 23, 1908 in Beaumont and is buried with his wife in the Anthony Cemetery in Beaumont, Jefferson County, Texas.

The Charlton-Pollard High School (decommissioned) in Beaumont was named to honor Professor Terry J. Charlton who was the schools' first principal and a son of C. N. Charlton and Thomas Titus Pollard, a son-in-law of C. N. Charlton, who came to Beaumont from the Tuskegee Institute. CORPORAL HARLON HENRY BLOCK (1924-1945)

The Senate of the State of Texas is pleased to join the State of Texas Anniversary Remembrance Day Foundation in celebrating the achievements of the late Corporal Harlon Henry Block.

Corporal Block was a native of Yorktown, Texas, and a graduate of Weslaco High School He joined the United State Marine Corps in San Antonio, on February 18, 1943.

After completing his basic training, he was assigned to the First Marine Parachute Regiment and deployed to the Pacific theater, where he took part in the Bougainville campaign.

He was transferred to the 28th Marines, 5th Marine Division. On February 19, 1945, his unit landed on the island of Iwo Jima, the site of some of the war's fiercest fighting, and on February 23, the 28th Marines overcame stiff Japanese resistance and captured Mount Suribachi.

Corporal Block subsequently appeared in one of the most famous combat photographs in the history of warfare, the Pulitzer Prize-wining shot taken by Associated Press photographer Joe Rosenthal that captured the United States Marines raising the American flag on the summit of Mount Sunbachi.

Corporal Block gave his last full measure of devotion to his country the next month when he was killed in action on March 1, 1945, but the iconic image in which he appeared has inspired generations of Americans. Today, he is buried beside the Iwo Jima Memorial at the Marine Military Academy in Harlingen. It is truly fitting that Corporal Block's contribution to the American victory in World War II receive special recognition.



Ms. Read pioneered and led her students to Austin to formally testify before the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee in favor of the passage of SB 961 providing her students with the unique opportunity to engage in experiencing expanded learning opportunities beyond the normal school curriculum.

"The State of Texas Treasure "My BisonStar" Donation Savings Coin Collection Project" shall be formally announced at The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library 2016 Luncheon Seminar to be conducted on Saturday, September 10, 2010 at the City of Quitaque Hope Center hosted by The Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Volunteers of The STAR DAY Foundation. C. L. HAWKINS

Chester Losey Hawkins was born August 19, 1966 to W.E. and Shirley Hawkins in Plainview, Texas. He is the third of four children with two sisters and one brother. C.L. grew up in Quitaque, Texas and graduated from Valley High School.

After graduating from high school, he began farming and ranching on the family farm. C.L. learned early on how to take care of livestock from his Dad and his ranching background. Later, he began working at Caprock Canyons State Park with the force account on July 1, 1993 reconstructing the bridges along the Caprock Canyons Trailway as a park ranger. After working out at the park for a few years, he acquired another title, the bison herdsman in 1998.

C.L. was on the "capture team" during the relocation of the Goodnight Herd off of the JA Ranch in 1997. Soon, this herd would come to be known as the Texas State Bison Herd, the official bison herd of the state of Texas. C.L. was transferred to the Wildlife Division of Texas Parks and Wildlife in order to stay with the herd as their caretaker in all the components needed to ensure their protection and preservation. In 2011, the Texas State Bison Herd was transferred over to be managed by the Parks division of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and C.L. followed with them now titled as a Park Ranger V.

Today, C.L. carefully watches over the herd and continues to maintain his oath of protection for these animals. The bison know him as their overseer and will follow his pickup if they hear the tink of the hopper, signaling a meal of cattle cake. C.L. diligently watches the herd for any signs of distress among them and oversees their annual well check.

As part of the Caprock Canyons State Park staff, C.L. works with many different organizations and experts in managing other aspects of the park as they relate to the bison herd as well. The current project being undertaken by park staff is the Caprock Canyons Restoration Project. The first phase of the project was to bring the bison herd back into their native habitat on the prairies of Caprock Canyons State Park and C.L. played a major role in their return to the prairie areas of the park. C.L. ensures that fencing for the bison herd is well maintained and his input on the availability of forage for the bison is always acknowledged.

C.L. wears many hats in Caprock Canyons State Park. He not only maintains the fencing for the bison herd, but also the facilities, signs, and equipment in the park. He also helps in the restorations efforts by keeping a handle on the invasive species that encroach on the prairie ecosystem within the park. C.L. knows many of the wildlife and plant species that live in Caprock Canyons State Park and is frequently the ranger asked if there is a question on wildlife or plant species identity.

C.L. hopes that his 20 + years of service with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has instilled an appreciation for the Texas State Bison Herd and Caprock Canyons State Park in Texas children so that they can go forth to continue to preserve the cultural and natural resources of Texas.



Turner began his career as an account executive with Turner Advertising Company and entered the television business in 1970 when he acquired Atlanta independent UHF station channel 17. In 1976, Turner purchased Major League Baseball's Atlanta Braves and launched TBS Superstation, originating the "Superstation" concept. The following year, Turner Broadcasting System, Inc. acquired the National Basketball Association's Atlanta Hawks, and in 1980 Turner launched CNN, the world's first live, 24-hour global news network.

With approximately two million acres of personal and ranch land, Ted Turner is the second largest individual landholder in North America. Turner lands are innovatively managed to unite economic viability with ecological sustainability. Turner ranches operate as working businesses, relying on bison and hunting/fishing/nature tourism as principal enterprises. In addition, Turner ranches support many progressive environmental projects including water resource and timber management, and the reintroduction of native species to the land. Turner Enterprises also manages over 51,000 bison across the various Turner ranches.

Turner has also made his mark as one of the most influential philanthropists in the U.S. He is the chairman of the Turner Foundation, founded in 1990, which supports efforts for improving air and water quality, developing a sustainable energy future to protect our climate, safeguarding environmental health, maintaining wildlife habitat protection, and developing practices and policies to curb population growth rates. Since its inception, the Turner Foundation has given more than \$380 million to hundreds of organizations.

The Turner Endangered Species Fund,

launched in June 1997, is a core grantee of the Turner Foundation, which works to conserve biodiversity by emphasizing restoration efforts of endangered or imperiled species on the Turner properties.

In January 2002, Tumer opened the first Ted's Montana Grill, in Columbus, Ohio, with his partner, George W. McKerrow Jr., founder of the Longhom Steakhouse chain. Ted's Montana Grill offers classic American comfort food, including bison or beef burgers, in an authentic Montana bar and grill atmosphere. To date, Ted's Montana Grill operates 46 restaurants nationwide. In keeping with Tumer's commitment to eco-friendly practices, Ted's Montana Grill utilizes innovative ways to reduce waste and energy consumption.

Tumer is also chairman of Tumer Enterprises, Inc., a private company, which manages his business interests, land holdings and investments, including the oversight of two million acres in 12 states and in Argentina. Through Tumer Enterprises, Tumer also manages the largest commercial bison herd (51,000) in North America on 15 ranches in Colorado, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and South Dakota.

Over the past several years, Turner has devoted his time and energy toward promoting the use of clean energy sources. While urging others to make the switch from fossil fuels to renewable energy sources, he has already done so in a very large way. In addition, Turner has added solar panels on his numerous properties and recently installed 25 solar canopies in the employee parking lots adjacent to his Atlanta offices.

Throughout his career, Ted Turner has won recognition for his entrepreneurial acumen; sharp business skills; a vision that transformed television; leadership qualities that won sports championships; and his unprecedented philanthropy.

Ted Turner has pioneered and led a conservation, preservation and restoration effort to donate bison bulls from his bison herds to Caprock Canyons State Park just north of Quitaque to enhance the genetic diversity of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" at the park.

MARY JANE MATHES ALEXANDER (1840-1929)

Mary Jane Mathes Alexander is noted today as having the distinction of being the "First Woman" rancher in the Texas Panhandle.

Mary Jane Mathes was born on September 3, 1840 in Washington County, Tennessee to Archibald Alexander Mathes (1812-1891) and Christinna Gray Cowan (1812-1883). She was the third child of eight children. Her great grandfather Alexander Mathes (1749-1806) has been noted by the Daughters of the American Revolutionary War (DAR) as an American Revolutionary War veteran.

Mary Jane Mathes was a graduate of Lindenwood Seminary in St. Charles, Missouri. On September 25, 1868 Mary Jane married Clifton Wrenshaw (C. W.) Alexander. C. W. was a neighbor and young pastor.

In 1884, C. W. and Mary Jane came to the Texas Panhandle from Sherman to Old Mobeetie. C. W. was possibly the first Presbyterian Minister in the Texas Panhandle. They had seven children: Erastus, Lucy, Nona, Hugh Payson, Maude, Robert Theodore (R. T.) and John Bunyan. Five children survived. But C. W. died in 1886 of pneumonia in returning by horseback from his circuit riding visitations when he was trapped in freezing rain near a swollen river. He left Mary Jane and their five children, who ranged in age from 4-7. The money from C. W.'s insurance was less than \$400. Mary Jane's father offered a quarter-section (160 acres) of land in Iowa. But they chose to stay in the Panhandle.

Hugh, 17, came home from Austin College in Sherman where he was a freshman, and was sent out to find some land with three necessities-wood, water and game. He found land on the Washita River some 25 miles northeast of Mobeetie. Mary Jane bought a section of railroad land (\$3 an acre) and a half section of government land (\$2 an acre at 5% interest). Mary Jane with the help of a hired hand built a two-room frame house with a half-dugout that served as a kitchen and dining room. It was the first frame house on the Washita River. On November 10, 1886 the family loaded their household goods onto a wagon drawn by two mules, Jack and Prince, took their red milk cow, Old Beut and her calf and started out for their new home.

They more or less lived off the land, which was overflowing with wildlife. In 1887 Hugh left the ranch to become a minister. Mary Jane and R. T., then 14, ran the ranch operation. R. T. was away at school in California in 1889-90, so May Jane was the rancher. In 1894, R. T. gave up his ambitions to become a doctor and decided to stay on the ranch, and was soon to be married. He married a Mae Palmer in January 1895.

These five children became five stalwart citizens. Hugh became a minister, Erastus was a doctor, and Lucy and her husband were missioners in China. Nona married Dr. Edward Snyder and spent her days in Canadian, where she was a leading citizen. R. T. and his wife Mae developed and enlarged the original ranch with more land and a fine, prize-winning her of registered Herefords.

Mary Jane Alexander was a loyal member of the Presbyterian Church and was a familiar figure in the congregation in Canadian, where in her later years she lived with Nona and her family. The faithful wife, loving mother, kind friend and successful entrepreneur died on April 12, 1929, at the age of 88. Mary Jane Alexander is buried in the Edith Ford Memorial Cemetery in Canadian, Hemphill County, Texas.



EDWARD DOW HARRELL (1868-1932)

Edward Dow Harrell, Panhandle rancher and livestock breeder, was born on February 16, 1868, in Forsythe County, Georgia. In July 1890 he and his brother Charles arrived in the Panhandle. They first settled in Floyd County, but a few months later they filed on two sections of land ten miles east of Happy in southern Randall County. There they built a dugout and attempted to raise and breed horses for the next four years.

Business was mediocre, however, and in 1894 the Harrell's sold out. Charlie moved to Amarillo and became that city's first resident dentist. Ed refiled on four choice sections on Palo Duro Creek seven miles northwest of Canyon City and then went to Canada and bought registered Herefords, which became the foundation for his herd. Subsequently he built one of the largest ranches in the area by leasing grazing land.

On December 22, 1898, he married fifteenyear-old Samuella (Sammie) Barks, who had moved with her mother to Canyon from Missouri in 1891. They spent their first years together at the ranch, where their only child, a son, was born.

In 1909 Harrell sold his registered herd and went into the commercial cattle business. In 1917 he bought 35,000 acres in Armstrong County from the JA Ranch. This acreage included the Old Rush Creek Division, Charles Goodnight's original headquarters.

Over the next few years Harrell continued to lease land in Randall County, including the 15,000 acres now encompassing Palo Duro Canyon State Scenic Park and another 10,000 acres around Buffalo Lake. Sammie Harrell worked the ranch with her husband and the cowhands and often accompanied the herds to the shipping pens in Amarillo. Harrell's son Newton assumed management of the family's cattle operations in 1924.

Harrell was a major stockholder and director of the First State Bank and the Canyon Supply Company. He also was instrumental in organizing the Old Cowboys Association, which held annual reunions for many years at the Old T Anchor Ranch headquarters site.

Harrell became a charter member of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society and gave liberally of his time and money to help build its museum. He and his wife were members of the Presbyterian church in Canyon. Harrell's health was poor during the last three years of his life; he died on September 14, 1932, and was interred in Dreamland Cemetery south of Canyon.

The Harrell Ranch, occupied and managed in the late 1980s by Ed C. Harrell and his family, continued to operate as a commercial Hereford cow and calf venture.

#### OUR INDIAN SUMMER IN THE FAR WEST

An Autumn Tour of Fifteen Thousand Miles in Kansas,
Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, and the Indian Territory

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In 1879 two Englishmen, writer Samuel Nugent Townshend and photographer John George Hyde, set out for a pleasant Indian summer on a tour of the American West. The duo documented their travels by steamship and train, through Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, and Chicago, across the Missouri to the "new state of Kansas" and the beginning of the western lands and business opportunities that were to become the focus of their narrative. Reprinted here with critical notes and introduction, *Our Indian Summer in the Far West* offers an enlightening—and often entertaining—perspective on an early moment in the growth of capitalism and industry in the American West.

Originally published as a photographic travelogue and guide to British investment in the American West, Townshend and Hyde's account is both idiosyncratic and emblematic of its time. Interested in the West's economic and environmental potential, the two men focused on farming in Kansas, railroads and mining in Colorado, a bear hunt in New Mexico, and ranching in Texas. The sojourners' own foibles also enter the narrative: alerted to the difficulty of finding a hotel with a bath, the two Victorians took along a portable bathtub made of India rubber. Their words and pictures speak volumes about contemporary attitudes toward race, empire, and the future of civilization. An introduction by coeditor Alex Hunt provides background on the creators and the travelogue genre.

The recovery and republication of this extremely rare volume, an artifact of the Victorian American West, make available an important primary document of a brief but pivotal historical moment connecting the American West and the British Empire.

Alex Hunt is Professor of English and Haley Endowed Professor of Western Studies at West Texas A&M University in Canyon, Texas. Kristin Loyd is an archival specialist with the Sowell Family Collection in Literature, Community, and the Natural World in the Southwest Collection/Special Collections Library at Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT (1839-1926)

Accomplished Texans who serve as positive role models for young people deserve special recognition, and Mary Ann "Molly" Goodnight, Armstrong County pioneer and wife of Charles Goodnight embodied the strength and spirit that has made Texas an enduring example to the rest of the country.

Molly Goodnight was born September 12, 1839, in Madison County, Tennessee; she moved with her family to Fort Belknap, Texas, in 1854; after the death of her parents, she worked as a schoolteacher and took care of her five brothers.

She met Charles Goodnight in the mid-1860s, and they married in 1870; the couple settled in Pueblo, Colorado, where Charles had already established a ranch; drought and the Panic of 1873 caused the family to return to Texas, where Charles received backing from Irish investor John George Adair, who became his partner.

The Goodnights founded a ranch in the Texas Panhandle based in Palo Duro Canyon; Molly became doctor, nurse, spiritual comforter, sister, and mother to the ranch hands who worked there, but her most important role was wife and helpmate to the most famous rancher on the High Plains.

She became interested in the plight of the baby bison left behind by the commercial hunters who had ravaged the great bison herds that roamed the Plains; recognizing that the extinction of the bison was imminent, she encouraged her husband to establish the Goodnight bison herd, which has since become the Official State Bison Herd of Texas and is now located at Caprock Canyons State Park.

Known as the Mother of the Panhandle of Texas, Molly helped establish Goodnight College, and the town of Goodnight is named in honor of her and her husband; Molly died in 1926, and her headstone reads "Mary Ann Dyer Goodnight, One who spent her whole life in the service of others."

The STAR DAY Foundation shall invite Texas Junior High and Middle School history teachers, librarians, home schooling families and others to plan, develop and conduct an annual "Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Day" classroom student studies activity to inspire and motivate students to explore and discover her life and achievements as an outstanding conservation, preservation and restoration historical role model as the woman who saved Texas Southern Plains bison for the people of Texas now known as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas. A State of Texas Treasure!" The STAR DAY Foundation invites Texans and Friends of Texas worldwide to volunteer and join the long term effort of The Group to raise donations to support the conservation, preservation and restoration work of the Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team at Caprock Canyons State Park as an annual STAR DAY birthday gift for the State of Texas.

#### EXPEDITION TO THE CIBOLO CREEK RANCH-MAY 7, 2011

Students from Presidio ISD Lucy Rede Franco Middle School (LRFMS) in Presidio County gathered on a high bluff to explore and study a herd of bison located in a valley below as the bison migrated toward a watering hole located close by at a natural spring shaded by cottonwood and grey oak trees on the 30,000 acre Cibolo Creek Ranch established by Don Meliton (Milton) Faver (ca 1822-1899) in 1857 and owned today by Dr. John B. Poindexter. The expedition to the Cibolo Creek Ranch was supervised by Science Teachers Cynthia Obrero (Photographer) and Jaspher Valeriano (Back Row-Right). The Expedition school bus driver was Manuel Aguilar.

The Ranch expedition was guided by Ranch Manager Robert Cavness (Back Row-3<sup>rd</sup> left), and Ranch Activities Director Mike "Sugar" Domis (Back Row-2<sup>rd</sup> Left). "The Texas Bison Student Study Group" was organized on September 12, 2010, the birthday of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926), under the supervision of Principal Teresa Porras and sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation of El Paso under the direction of President Dennis M. Kulvicki (Back Row-Left) as an expanded learning opportunities after-school student enrichment program.

The Group is engaged in studies to explore and discover ancient Texas Bison, "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" at Caprock Canyons State Park in Briscoe and Floyd counties, and to pioneer and lead an effort to explore and discover the benefits of the use of Texas bison ground meat in partnership with school cafeteria staff and family volunteers to enhance the school year lunch menu program with a lower fat and calorie content meat. The Group shall also explore and propose ways and means to raise needed funds to support the work of the management team whose mission is save the herd from extinction in these very difficult economic times and engage in activities to enhance the story of Texas for the people of Texas.

After a lunch at a beautiful tree shaded natural

spring, the students returned from the field to explore and discover the history of "EL FORTIN DEL CIBOLO (The Fort)", one of three forts established by Faver protecting natural range springs. A tour of The Fort was led by ranch employee Cindy Hernandez. Dr. Poindexter pioneered and led a decade-long conservation, preservation and restoration effort to historically recreate the three forts established by Faver as ranch guest accommodations featuring an internationally known restaurant. The Cibolo Creek Ranch is located on the frontier of the Great State of Texas at http://www.cibolocreekranch.com.

NOTE: The Texas Bison Student Study Group proposed a bill in 2010 to designate "The Texas State Bison Herd" at Caprock Canyons State Park (The Park) as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" as a service achievement of merit "STAR DAY 2011" birthday gift for the State of Texas. State Representative Pete P. Gallego was the initial author of House Concurrent Resolution (HCR 86). State Representative Warren Chisum at the request of Rep. Gallego volunteered to be the primary author of HCR 86. State Representative Jim Landtroop and State Representative Pete P. Gallego volunteered to be joint authors of HCR 86. The Park is located in the House Districts of Rep. Chisum and Rep. Landtroop. HCR 86 was sponsored by State Senator Robert Duncan with the support of Lt. Governor David Dewhurst. Governor Rick Peny, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, issued a Commendation Letter to honor and recognize LRFMS teachers and students for their service achievement of merit in proposing HCR 86. The Group has proposed in 2012 the creation of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund (The Fund)" to be established and maintained by The STAR DAY Foundation as an endowment fund whose annual interest shall be presented as a grant to The Park Superintendent to support the conservation, preservation and restoration work of The Herd management team. The Group has partnered in 2011 with The Marian Blakemore Planetarium in Midland under the direction of Planetarium Curator Dr. Andrew Kerr and with the support of The West Texas Astronomy Club to create "The Great Texas Blue Bison Constellation" rising in the southern Texas sky in the month of September. The Constellation is composed of 254 stars, one star for each Texas County. Each star that tails behind The Constellation as it races across the Texas night sky represents the "Spirit" of a Texas Plains Bison that once roamed free on the land that is now known as the Great State of Texas. The Fund was formally launched on September 12, 2013 at The Park with a 15 year goal of raising at least \$100 million dollars with the help of Texas students and their families and others.

#### CAPROCK CANYONS STATE PARK AND TRAILWAY (A View from Haynes Ridge)

Caprock Canyons State Park, located in Briscoe, Floyd, and Hall Counties three miles north of Quitaque, was acquired from the estate of Theodore Geisler in May 1975 and is approximately 100 miles (160 km) southeast of Amarillo. The state park opened in 1982 and is 15,313.6 acres (6,197.2 ha) in size, making it the third-largest state park in Texas and its terrain is the roughest. In 1993, a hiking, biking, and equestrian rail trail opened that stretches through the park through Floyd, Briscoe, and Hall counties. The trailway was created after the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department acquired 64.25 miles (103 km) of right-of-way from the abandoned Fort Worth and Denver Railroad's lines between Estelline and the South Plains.

The park is located in West Texas and has a semi-arid climate. The average January minimum temperature is 19 °F (-7 °C) and the average July maximum is 91 °F (33 °C). The park receives 20.4 inches (520 mm) of precipitation annually. The area contains badlands with mesquite, cacti and junipers with tall grasses, plums, hackberries and cottonwoods in the canyons. The park features spectacular landscapes carved by erosion at the edge of the Caprock, colorful cliffs and canyons, and abundant wildlife African aoudad sheep (barbary sheep), mule deer, white-tailed deer, coyotes, opossums, raccoons, bobcats, foxes, porcupines, numerous species of snakes and lizards, and over 175 species of birds including Golden Eagles are found within the park. Lake Theo contains bass and catfish

The Park hosts "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas." At the urging of his wife, Charles Goodnight preserved several plains bison from those that were being slaughtered. This herd became one of the genetic sources from which current bison herds descend. The state herd only contains plains bison which have no cattle DNA. One of the park's most interesting features is the Folsom site near Lake Theo, one of five such sites in the nation. Among the artifacts first excavated there in 1974 were several Folsom points and remains of an extinct Ice Age bison. This bison-kill site gives substantial evidence that Folsom man manufactured and made use of his weapons here about 10,000 years ago. Springs in Holmes Canyon probably contributed to making this area a favorite campsite

for pre-Columbian man. Activities available at the park include camping, hiking, horseback riding, fishing, picnicking, swimming, mountain bike riding, rock climbing and sightseeing.

The Group partnering with their state legislators proposed a bill during the 82<sup>nd</sup> Texas State Legislature in 2011 that successfully designated the Goodnight Bison Herd at the park as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas." Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, issued a Commendation Letter honoring and recognizing The Group for their service achievement of merit. The Caprock Partners Foundation has established a volunteer program to invite the public to help insure the future of Caprock Canyons State Park and Trailway and may be visited at http://caprockpartnersfoundation.com.

"BISONSTAR" The Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group) was initially organized by The STAR DAY Foundation at Lucy Rede Franco Middle School in the Presidio ISD under the supervision of School Principal Teresa Porras with the volunteer support of school teachers, staff and community members on September 12, 2010, the anniversary of the birthday of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926), known as "The Woman Who Saved the Texas Plains Bison." The primary objectives of The Group are: to provide students with the opportunity to explore and discover the origin of the Texas Plains Bison and the native Americans who hunted them: to understand and appreciate the conservation, preservation and restoration efforts being pioneered and led by the Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team at Caprock Canyons State Park near Quitaque, Briscoe County, Texas dedicated to saving "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" from extinction; to honor and remember the life and achievements of Molly and Charles Goodnight as the first Texas bison ranch family; to plan, develop and conduct school history and science field trips to partnering Texas bison ranches; to encourage Texas families and other to plan, develop and conduct an expedition to Caprock Canyons State Park and to study and evaluate school lunch menu applications of Texas bison ground meat in partnership with student families and school cafeteria staff. The Group shall also seek ways and means to help raise needed funds to support additional conservation, preservation and restoration work of the park land and the work of the Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team as a service achievement of merit to enhance the story of Texas for the people of Texas. The primary activities of The Group have included pioneering and leading successful legislative efforts to designate the Texas State Bison Herd at Caprock Canyons State Park as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas", to designate the 12th of September as "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Day" in Texas, the 5th of March as "The

Charles Goodnight Day" in Texas in partnership with the Texas State Legislature and to designate the City of Quitaque as "The Official State Bison Capital of Texas.". Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, issued Commendation Letters to honor, recognize The Group for their proposed legislative service achievements of merit. On September 12, 2013, The Group formally launched "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" to plan, develop and conduct activities over the next fifteen (15) years to raise \$100 million dollars as an endowment fund managed by The STAR DAY Foundation in partnership with a leading Texas bank whose annual interest shall support a Texas conservation, preservation and restoration grant presented to the Caprock Canyons State Park Superintendent to support the work of the Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team to help conserve, preserve and restore "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas-a State of Texas Treasure" for the people of Texas and friends of Texas worldwide. Caprock Canyons State Park Interpretive Ranger, Volunteer Coordinator and Advisor of The Group Le'Ann Pigg proposed a female bison born during May 2013 to be designated by The Group as an "Official Mascot" of The Group. The Group named this new born calf "BisonStar."

NOTE: The Group is pioneering and leading a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) project initiative called: "The Great Arc of Bison Migration Project (The Project)." The Group proposed a research hypothesis that the great, great,...,great grandparents of "BisonStar" are in fact the ancient bison of China that possibly migrated along a great arc from China to Mongolia, to Siberia then across the Bering Land Bridge to Alaska down through the western Canadian provinces to the upper states then eventually to Texas! The Group has invited teachers, librarians, students and their families to organize a China Bison Student Study Group in China to help prove their research hypothesis with the help of scientists at universities and museums in China. The Group also has established a "Student Exchange Program" of The Project to invite a delegation from a China Bison Student Study Group to visit Caprock Canyons State Park hosted by The Group to explore and discover the majestic park land and "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas." In addition, The Group is planning to organize a delegation to visit a Great Panda Research Station in China to explore and discover conservation, preservation and restoration initiatives hosted by a China Bison Student Study Group. Each Group shall pioneer and led the effort to raise funds to support the Student Exchange Program and seek the help of scientists to prove their research hypothesis.

FIRST PIONEERS AND LEADERS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS HALL OF HONOR



MARY ANN (MOLLY) GOODNIGHT (1839-1926)

Accomplished Texans who serve as positive role models for young people deserve special recognition, and Mary Ann "Molly" Goodnight, Armstrong County pioneer and wife of Charles Goodnight embodied the strength and spirit that has made Texas an enduring example to the rest of the country.

Molly Goodnight was born September 12, 1839, in Madison County, Tennessee; she moved with her family to Fort Belknap, Texas, in 1854; after the death of her parents, she worked as a schoolteacher and took care of her five brothers.

She met Charles Goodnight in the mid-1860s, and they married in 1870; the couple settled in Pueblo, Colorado, where Charles had already established a ranch; drought and the Panic of 1873 caused the family to return to Texas, where Charles received backing from Irish investor John George Adair, who became his partner.

The Goodnights founded a ranch in the Texas Panhandle based in Palo Duro Canyon; Molly became doctor, nurse, spiritual comforter, sister, and mother to the ranch hands who worked there, but her most important role was wife and helpmate to the most famous rancher on the High Plains.

She became interested in the plight of the baby bison left behind by the commercial hunters who had ravaged the great bison herds that roamed the Plains; recognizing that the extinction of the bison was imminent, she encouraged her husband to establish the Goodnight bison herd, which has since become the Official State Bison Herd of Texas and is now located at Caprock Canyons State Park.

Known as the Mother of the Panhandle of Texas, Molly helped establish Goodnight College, and the town of Goodnight is named in honor of her and her husband; Molly died in 1926, and her headstone reads "Mary Ann Dyer Goodnight, One who spent her whole life in the service of others."



FIRST PIONEERS AND LEADERS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS HALL OF HONOR



CHARLES GOODNIGHT (1836-1929)

The names of certain individuals stand out boldly in the history of the Lone Star State, and for more than a century, the life of famed rancher Charles Goodnight has inspired generations of Texans.

Born on March 5, 1836, to Charles and Charlotte Goodnight in Macoupin County, Illinois, young Charles Goodnight joined his family in 1845 on the 800-mile journey to Milam County, Texas, where the boy arrived riding bareback on a whitefaced mare named Blaze; from an early age, he learned the virtue of hard work, laboring as a farmhand, racing as a jockey, and hauling freight with teams of oxen.

Mr. Goodnight entered into a partnership with his stepbrother, John Wesley Sheek, in 1856 to raise 400 head of cattle in the Brazos Valley; in the late 1850s, he met Oliver Loving, and together the two young men drove a herd to the gold rush camps in Colorado before the Civil War; during the 1860s, he worked as a scout for the Texas Rangers, taking part in the Comanche wars and fighting outlaws along the Colorado and Brazos River.

After his service with the Rangers, Mr. Goodnight returned to the cattle business, and in 1866, he, Mr. Loving, and 18 cowhands drove a herd from Fort Belknap, Texas, to Fort Summer, New Mexico, and the route they forged became known as the Goodnight-Loving Trail, one of the most heavily trafficked cattle trails in the Southwest; Charles Goodnight is also credited with inventing the chuck wagon during that legendary drive.

In 1870, he married Mary Ann "Molly" Dyer, a schoolteacher, and the couple settled in Colorado for several years before returning to Texas; in 1876, he entered into a partnership with John G. Adair to set up the JA Ranch along Palo Duro Canyon, with Mr. Goodnight serving as resident manager and part owner of the operation; over the next 11 years, he increased the ranch's herd and expanded its range and helped establish law and order in the Panhandle; he pioneered the use of many new techniques and inventions, including artificial watering facilities, barbed wire fences, and the development of Hereford bulls through crossbreeding; he also created one of the first western sidesaddles, for use by his wife.

From 1887 to 1926, Charles and Molly Goodnight lived in a spacious, two-story ranch house on the Goodnight Ranch near the Salt Fork of the Red River; when his wife became distressed at the decline of the southern herd of native bison, Mr. Goodnight took up their cause, breeding them on his ranch and shipping buffalo to Yellowstone National Park and to zoos on the East Coast and in Europe; he also raised other animals and performed agricultural experiments with the encouragement of botanist Luther Burbank.

Molly Goodnight died in 1926, and Charles Goodnight followed her three years later at the age of 93, and they are buried together in the Goodnight Cemetery, not far from the ranch they called home for nearly 40 years; the descendants of the Goodnights' buffalo live on as the Official State Bison Herd of Texas at Caprock Canyons State Park, and the legacy of Charles Goodnight, pioneer, cattleman, and naturalist, will endure as long as the Lone Star shines bright over Texas.

#### **Caprock Canyons State Park**



#### Home of the "Official State Bison Herd of Texas"

The State of Texas has customarily recognized a variety of official symbols as tangible representations of the state's historical and cultural heritage; figuring prominently in that distinctive list are animals that played a central role in the rich Western heritage of Texas, including the longhorn and the American quarter horse.

Another deserving candidate for recognition is the bison, popularly known as the buffalo; after arriving in North America some 25,000 years ago, the bison adapted particularly well to the environment of the Great Plains; by the 1700s, as many as 60 million buffalo were living on the continent, and the lands that were to become Texas were among the areas roamed by the vast herds.

The animals were central to the livelihood of the Native Americans of the Great Plains, providing not only their main diet but also materials for shelter, clothing, and many other staples; the ample supply of bison and the hunting culture of the Plains tribes were not to last, however, with the completion of the transcontinental railroad in 1869, it became possible to profitably ship bison hides and meat to eastern markets by rail, and in the next 15 years, buffalo hunters almost completely exterminated the herds; by 1885, fewer than 1,000 animals remained.

Fortunately, some Texans had the foresight to try and save this noble creature; Mary Ann "Molly" Goodnight, the wife of legendary Texas rancher Charles Goodnight, was so distressed by the rapid disappearance of the bison that she convinced her husband to begin capturing and protecting bison calves from the small number of wild animals that remained on the Southern Plains; he began to round up young bison in the 1870s in the northern Texas Panhandle, and the herd at Goodnight's JA Ranch eventually grew to about 250 head by the time Mr. Goodnight passed away in 1929.

The Goodnight bison herd became one of the five foundation herds in the United States from which the majority of surviving buffalo have developed; a number of animals directly descended from the Goodnight stock were donated to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in 1996, and a subset of that group was determined to be a pure strain that had not been crossbred with bison from other areas;

given a home at Caprock Canyons State Park, those buffalo and their offspring are today known as the Texas State Bison Herd and are notable for their strong genetic link to the original Southern Plains buffalo and because they continue to live in the area where their ancestors were first caught.

# QUITAQUE "THE OFFICIAL STATE BISON CAPITAL OF TEXAS"

In 1876, Charles Goodnight became the manager of the JA Ranch in the Caprock Canyonlands of the Texas Panhandle. The once-great bison herds of the area had been slaughtered almost to the point of extinction. At the urging of his wife, Mary Ann, Goodnight rounded up enough of the creatures to form a small herd, which allowed the Southern Plains Bison population to survive.

In 1880, Goodnight acquired the Lazy F Ranch and renamed it "Quitaque," which he believed was an Indian word for "end of the trail." Quitaque is located on State Highway 86 in southeastern Briscoe County. When the county was organized in 1892, the townsite of Quitaque was surveyed and platted.

Caprock Canyons State Park, located approximately three miles north of Quitaque, was acquired from the estate of Theodore Geisler in May 1975. The park opened in 1982 and is the third-largest state park in Texas.

The park is home to the "Official State Bison Herd of Texas." These bison are direct descendants of the last free-range Southern Plains Bison that the Goodnights saved from extinction. The herd was donated to the park in 1996 by the JA Ranch, which is the oldest privately owned ranch in the Texas Panhandle.

For many years, the citizens of Quitaque encouraged the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to establish a state park in the Quitaque area and encouraged the donation of the JA Ranch Bison Herd to the state park.

O. R. Stark Jr., born in Quitaque, understood the need for a friends group for Caprock Canyons State Park and Trailway. He was instrumental in forming Caprock Partners Foundation in 1996 and served as foundation president until his death. The foundation has supported the park and its historic bison habitat as environmental and recreational treasures.

State Representatives Warren Chisum, Pete Gallego and Jim Landtroop authored House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) 86 and State Senator Robert Duncan sponsored HCR 86. The Group was organized by The STAR DAY Foundation on September 12, 2009 at Lucy Rede Franco Middle School in Presidio County under the supervision School Principal Teresa Porras as an after-school student expanded learning opportunities enrichment program. The Group is engaged in studies to explore and discover the origin of "The Great Texas Southern Pains Bison Herd" and the Texas Native-Americans who hunted the bison; to study The Official State Bison Herd of Texas at The Park: to pioneer and lead an effort to explore and discover the benefits of the use of Texas bison ground meat in partnership with school cafeteria staff and family volunteers to enhance the school year lunch menu program with a lower fat and calorie content meat; and to plan, develop and conduct "Expeditions" to regional Texas ranches maintaining commercial bison herds. The Group shall also explore and propose ways and means to raise funds to support the work of The Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team whose mission is to save the last remaining Great Texas Southern Plains Bison initially saved by Molly and Charles Goodnight in the late 1800's from extinction in these very difficult economic times of greatly reduced state funding. 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

O. R. STARK, JR. (1927-2000)

O. R. Stark, Jr., a founder of Caprock Canyons State Park and Trailway and the Texas State Bison Herd, was nominated for induction by Caprock Canyons State Park Ranger Le'Ann Pigg as an activity of "The Founding and Founders of Caprock Canyons State Park Project" proposed by The Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group) sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation as an initiative supporting the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the founding of TPWD. Park Ranger Pigg is the Park Interpreter and Volunteer Coordinator. Park Ranger Pigg has volunteered to act as an eAdvisor for The Group. The Park is today the home of the Texas State Bison Herd now known as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" designated by state law by the Texas State Legislature in 2011and proposed by The Group

O. R. Stark, Jr. was a visionary man. He had a lifetime love affair with the beautiful canyons and prairies of the Quitaque area and wanted to find a way to share it with others. When he discovered that Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) was looking for new state park land in the Panhandle, he began working to draw their attention to Quitaque. Eventually, his hard work paid off when TPWD purchased the Theo Geisler ranch to make up most of what is now Caprock Canyons State Park.

O. R. Stark, Jr. was also instrumental in the Rails-to-Trails conversion of 64 miles of railroad into what is now Caprock Canyons Trailway. Over the years he had ridden the train many times up the Caprock through the tunnels and knew what spectacular views the Trailway had to offer.

When he learned that the JA Ranch was donating the historic Charles Goodnight bison herd to TPWD, he became a driving force for the local lobbying effort to make Caprock Canyons State Park the new home for the bison herd. His efforts once again became reality when the first bison were brought to the park in 1997.

O. R. understood the need for a friends group for Caprock Canyons State Park and Trailway. He led Quitaque citizens in forming Caprock Partners Foundation in 1996. He served as president until his death in 2000.

Roots run deep for the Stark family in Quitaque dating back to 1919 when O. R.'s dad, Orlin Stark, first came to Quitaque and was involved in the formation of the First National Bank in 1920.

O. R. Stark, Jr. was born May 4, 1927 to Orlin and Madeline (Whiteley) Stark in Quitaque, Texas. He was the eldest of two children having a younger sister, Patsy Stark Herrington. He started school in Quitaque Elementary and continued his education through the Quitaque schools to graduate in 1944. He attended Texas Tech University for one year and volunteered for the Navy, where he served two years during World War II. After his discharge he entered Texas Tech again, where he majored in Finance and graduated in 1949. He married Mary Hartgraves of Sweetwater, Texas August 21, 1949.

O. R. and Mary began their married life in Quitaque where O. R. went to work at First National Bank as assistant cashier. Over the years they raised their three children, Sherry, Scotty and Randy Stark in Quitaque. O.R. served as president of First National Bank for over thirty years and Chairman of the Board from 1983 until his passing on January 24, 2000

O. R. was very active in church and civic activities on both the state and local levels and was always a booster of anything positive in the Quitaque area. He published Comings, Goings & Doings an informative monthly bank newsletter for customers and other interested readers for over 47 years, and in 1995 it was named "the longest continuously published monthly newsletter in the history of the banking industry in the United States".

O. R. Stark, Jr. s leadership, foresight, positive outlook, boundless energy, and persistence are permanently etched on the Quitaque area and Caprock Canyons State Park and Trailway.

Marquis Robertson was formally inducted on September 12, 2013, "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Day", into "The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation as the "First Superintendent" of Caprock Canyons State Park on November 2, 1976. Marquis was nominated for induction by Caprock Rock Canyons State Park Ranger Le'Ann Pigg. Park Ranger Pigg is the Park Interpreter and Volunteer Coordinator. Park Ranger Pigg has volunteered to act as an eAdvisor for "The Texas Bison Student Study Group" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation.

Marquis Roberson was born of December 26, 1941 to Marquis de Lafayette and Virgie May (Riggs) Robertson in Shreveport, Louisiana. Marquis is the youngest of three children. He has two sisters. Marquis's family moved to Galveston, Texas in 1955 where he continued his elementary education at Steven F. Austin Junior High School. His family moved to Houston, Texas where he graduated in the first graduating class of South Houston High School in Pasadena, Texas in 1960. He initially studied at Howard Payne University in Brownwood, Texas. He elected in 1966 to join the AFL-CIO as a Pipefitter Apprentice and eventually became a Journeyman Pipefitter. He worked on the Houston Ship Channel.

In 1973 Marquis applied and was accepted as an entry level Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Park Ranger and served at Lockhart State Park in Lockhart, Texas for a year and a half. He was then assigned to serve as "Assistant Superintendent" at Bastrop State Park in Bastrop County, Texas in 1974. While at Bastrop State Park, he attended Texas Law Enforcement Academy at South West State University in San Marcos, Texas and was

graduated and commissioned as a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Police Officer on October 31, 1976

Marquis was offered and accepted the opportunity to be the "First Superintendent" of Caprock Canyons State Park near Quitaque, Briscoe County, Texas in 1976. Marquis and his family began their opportunity on November 2, 1976 living initially in a state trailer at the Park. At that time Caprock Canvons State Park was the largest State Park in Texas with an area of approximately 15,000 acres. Marquis with the help of his colleagues at the Park refurbished a cabin in the park as his family living quarters. The "First Park Ranger" at Caprock Canyons State Park was Park Ranger John Garbutt. Marquis and John pioneered and led a variety of park conservation, preservation and restoration improvements during his tenure. In 1981, Marquis accepted the position of "Superintendent" of Abilene State Park in Taylor County, Texas.

Marquis left the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in 1983 to take the position as the "Outside Security Director" of the Texas Youth Commissions' Brownwood State School in Brownwood, Texas. In 1985, Marquis pioneered and led an effort to enter private business in Brownwood by founding and opening "The Video Junction" offering video movie rentals. The competition in this field was intense with the entry of national video rental chains. Marquis decided in 1995 to leave private business and accepted a position of "Program Director" at the New Horizons Children's Ranch in Brownwood until his retirement in 2006.

Marquis decided to reenter the work force in 2009 by accepting a staff position at the Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) organization in Brownwood as a "Volunteer Recruiter and Trainer" which position he holds today.

He met and married a Johanna George in 1971 and they have a family of two girls. His wife passed away in 2003. With his daughters grown, married and pioneering and leading professional lives, Marquis now spends and enjoys summer vacations in Colorado with colleagues who are Four-Wheel (ATV) trail vehicle enthusiasts exploring and discovering forest trails in the high country. His most enjoyable pastime in his life today is spending quality time with his grandchildren and great grandchild.

John R. Garbutt, III was formally inducted on March 5, 2014, "The Charles Goodnight Day", into "The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation as the "First Park Ranger" of Caprock Canyons State Park in August 1975. John R. Garbutt, III was nominated for induction by Caprock Canyons State Park Ranger Le'Ann Pigg. Park Ranger Pigg is the Park Interpreter and Volunteer Coordinator. Park Ranger Pigg has volunteered to act as an eAdvisor for "The Texas Bison Student Study Group" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. The Park is today the home of the Texas State Bison Herd.

John R. Garbutt, III was born on September 16, 1948 to John R. and Jeanne (Trevethan) Garbutt in Amarillo, Texas. He is the older of two children with a younger sister. His father and mother worked for the United States Air Force so the family moved away and back to Amarillo several times during his early childhood and school years.

John graduated from Tascosa High School in 1967, attended Amarillo Junior College and then transferred to the University of Texas at Austin in the fall of 1969 to finish his undergraduate work. He graduated in 1971 with a BA in Anthropology and minor in Philosophy. He remained in Austin after graduation working with the hope of one day realizing his dream of being hired as a park ranger for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. He stayed persistent in his quest by submitting a new application for employment each year and visiting with key personnel at the department's headquarters in Austin on a regular basis until he received the call he always hoped would come and was offered the "Park Ranger" position at Caprock Canyons State Park in August 1975.

The only problem was John left his sweetheart, Janet Meziere, behind but that situation was remedied in October of that year and he brought his bride to the park at Quitaque, Briscoe County, Texas. They both fell in love with the community, its people and the land. When Marquis Robertson (the first park superintendent) and his family arrived they quickly formed a lasting friendship and they worked happily together to give birth to a new state park. The community of Quitaque fully supported them and the state park.

During John's tenure Marquis and John worked on refurbishing an old bait store into the park headquarters, an old barn for park equipment and the old Theo Geisler home as a residence for Marquis and his family. John also did an archeological survey for the department on one of the sections in the park and worked closely with the Panhandle High Plains Museum on the important Lake Theo Folsom archeological site. Marquis and John worked on a variety of park conservation, preservation and restoration projects. They will always have fond memories of their life and times at Caprock Canyons State Park.

After two and a half wonderful years at Caprock Canyons State Park and the community of Quitaque John was promoted as "Assistant Superintendent" at Lake Whitney State Park in March of 1978. It was with mixed feelings John left but it was time. John was then promoted to "Superintendent" at Jim Hogg State Historical Park in Rusk, Texas in September of 1980 where he was superintendent until March 2002. At that time the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department decided to give the park to the City of Rusk.

By this time John and Janet had four children. The City of Rusk was their hometown and he did not want to up root them to continue his career and was fortunate to have the department honor his request to be transferred to the Texas State Railroad State Park as "Assistant Superintendent." John retired from the department in December 2005 but could not stay away from the venerable railroad so he returned in March of 2006 as "Special Projects Administrator" for the railroad wearing several hats. In August of 2007 the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department ceased to manage the railroad and with it came a new company to operate the facility. John and many others simply separated from the department and went to work for the new company.

John is still with the Texas State Railroad (2013) working in the "Marketing Department" and enjoys being able to continue to help with the preservation and promotion of this "True Texas Treasure."

Karla M. Helms was formally inducted on February 19, 2014, "The State of Texas Anniversary Remembrance (STAR) Day", into "The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation as the "First Woman Ranger" of Caprock Canyons State Park. Karla was nominated for induction by Caprock Canyons State Park Ranger Le'Ann Pigg. Park Ranger Pigg is the Park Interpreter and Volunteer Coordinator. Park Ranger Pigg has volunteered to act as an eAdvisor for "The Texas Bison Student Study Group" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation.

Karla Meyer Helms was born on October 31, 1960 to Opal and Willie Meyer in Quanah, Texas. She is the third of six children, with three brothers and two sisters. Karla grew up in Flomot, Texas, and graduated from Valley High School in 1979.

After graduating high school, Karla attended Clarendon College where she became a licensed cosmetologist. She took her first cosmetology job in Pampa, Texas, where she resided and worked for the next several years.

Karla returned to her hometown of Flomot, Texas, to marry her high school sweetheart, Kenneth Helms. Shortly after returning she began employment in November 1983 at Caprock Canyons State Park, where she worked on the Force Account for one year. The Force account was created out of a need to complete one-time projects at the park, and it necessitated the hiring of more employees without a guarantee of employment after the projects had been completed.

While working on the Force Account, she diligently worked at miscellaneous park maintenance jobs, the most important being the pouring of the sidewalks in all the camping areas.

After her first year on the Force Account, she was hired as park ranger, where she became the first female park ranger of Caprock Canyons State Park. 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


#### THE JOHN ADAIR (JA) RANCH STORY BOOKMARK SERIES



**NOTE:** The above photograph entitled "A Lonely Home in Texas (Grande Vista)" was captured by London photographer John George Hyde in 1879 as he and his colleague London's *The Field Newspaper* Correspondent Samuel Nugent Townsend visited The John Adair (JA) Ranch in Palo Duro Canyon in the Texas Panhandle. The albumen print is drawn from the University of Texas in Austin Dolph Briscoe Center for American History photographs collection and identified as di\_04356. The photograph illustrated the book: "*Our Indian Summer in the Far West*" authored by Nugent and Hyde in 1880, a copy of which is archived at Center. The Nugent and Hyde book was republished in 2016 by the Oklahoma University Press at Norman edited by University of West Texas A&M University Dr. Alexander Hunt and University of Oklahoma Press Kristin Loyd. The Texas Bison Student Study Group has proposed a Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Library project as an activity of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" to support the conservation, preservation and restoration of the "Our Indian Summer in the Far West" book at the Center. #### THE JA RANCH BRAND

PART 1-3: The JA Ranch is the oldest privately owned cattle operation in the Panhandle. Its beginning may be traced back to the summer and fall of 1876, when Charles Goodnight drove 1,600 longhorn cattle from Pueblo, Colorado, to the Palo Duro Canyon, where he established his "Home Ranch" near the Prairie Dog Town Fork of the Red River in southwestern Armstrong County. After getting his men and cattle settled in for the winter, Goodnight returned to Colorado to make arrangements to bring his wife, Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight, to the new homestead. In Denver he met John G. Adair, an English aristocrat who was interested in going into the cattle business himself. As a result of their meeting, Adair agreed to furnish the capital Goodnight needed to build up the ranch. In May 1877 the Goodnights and Adair, along with four cowboys, arrived at the Home Ranch with 100 Durham bulls and four wagons loaded with provisions. On June 18, before the Adairs left for Ireland, the partners drew up a five-year contract under which two-thirds of the property and profits were to go to Adair and one-third to Goodnight. There were to be as many as 1,500 cattle and 2,500 acres of land. Goodnight, who borrowed his third of the investment from Adair at 10 percent interest, was to receive an annual salary of \$2,500. At Goodnight's suggestion the ranch was named Adair's initials. The letters of the JA brand at first were separated; three years later the present connected design was adopted

After the money was made available, Goodnight bought the first 12,000 acres from Jot Gunter and William B. Munson, Sr., who agreed that he could pick the land wherever he pleased. Over the next two years he continued buying choice pieces of property crazy-quilt fashion in and around a seventyfive-mile stretch of Palo Duro Canyon, carefully selecting areas with good grazing land and water, until the ranch was solidified. In 1878 he drove the first JA trail herd, led by his famous bell ox Old

Blue, north to Dodge City, Kansas, then the nearest railhead. In 1879, desiring a more central location for the ranch headquarters, Goodnight moved it to a choice site at the foot of the Caprock, twenty-five miles east of the old Home Ranch. There he built a new four-room house of cedar logs and supervised the construction of several other buildings, including a bunkhouse, a bookkeeper's house, a wagon boss's house, a blacksmith shop, a wagonyard, and an ingenious milk and meat cooler. Later on, the twostory, nineteen-room main house was added. The old Home Ranch house was used as a line camp until it burned down on Christmas Eve. 1904.



#### CHARLES GOODNIGHT (1836-1929)

PART 2-3-As manager of the JA, Goodnight allowed no gambling, whiskey, or fighting, and would not take anyone who had been fired elsewhere for drunkenness or theft. Even so, he usually was able to hire the men he needed. Cape (Caleb B.) Willingham, Wint Bairfield, Jim (James T.) Christian, Frank Mitchell, J. W. Kent, George Doshier, Mitch Bell, and the brothers Judd, Jeff, and Lige Campbell were among the outstanding JA employees during its early years. Goodnight's brothers-in-law, Walter and Leigh R. Dyer, also worked off and on for the JA, particularly during traildrives and roundups. Almost from the start, Goodnight had sought to improve the quality of the JA cattle by bringing in blooded stock. In 1882 he built what is thought to have been the Panhandle's first barbed wire drift fence across a canyon bed above the Home Ranch to separate the purebred cattle, on which he used a JJ brand, from the main JA herd. He also kept a buffalo herd which he sought to cross with cattle to produce the "cattalo."

By the time their contract expired in 1882, Goodnight and Adair had bought 93,000 acres and were looking for more. In addition, Goodnight had purchased the Quitaque (Lazy F) range in Briscoe County for Cornelia Adair, and the Palo Duro post office had been established at the JA headquarters. To Adair's satisfaction, the enterprise had realized more than \$512,000 in profits; thus the partners opted to extend the contract for another five-year period. In 1883 Goodnight fenced the Quitaque properties and added the Tule Ranch in Swisher County, which he fenced in 1884–85, to the JA

properties. He also made other purchases from Gunter and Munson, the railroads, and the state that increased the ranch's size to 1,325,000 acres in parts of Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Hall, Briscoe, and Swisher counties.

After John Adair's death in 1885, following his third visit to the JA, his widow continued the partnership with Goodnight. By 1887, however, with the building of the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway, falling beef prices, the influx of settlers, and attempts by politicians to curb large-scale ranching, the colonel was ready to sell out and limit his ranching activities; thus their partnership was terminated on the expiration of the contract. Nevertheless, Goodnight, who acquired the Quitaque Ranch in the division of property, continued to act as manager until 1888, when he was succeeded by John C. Farrington, who served in that position for three years. James W. (Jack) Ritchie, Mrs. Adair's son by her first marriage, served briefly as foreman of the ranch's steer division in Tule Canyon before returning to New York City to handle the purchase of JA horses for the New York police department. Arthur Tisdale managed the JA in 1891 and was succeeded the following year by Richard Walsh, an Irish immigrant who had been with the ranch since 1885. Under his leadership, improvements continued to be made through crossbreeding with blooded Hereford and Angus stock in the JA herd, which had increased to 101,023 head by 1889. Walsh soon built up one of the finest-quality herds of cattle in the nation.

# "THE JA RANCH" Harold Bugbee (1900-1963)

PART 3-3-As the railroads brought in more settlers, the JA began leasing and selling much of its excess pasture. When several nesters located on school lands within the JA boundaries, Walsh shrewdly purchased their claims or traded land outside the range for their holdings within, thus consolidating the JA properties. In 1891 a school was opened for the children of ranch employees and neighboring settlers, in the Palo Duro community near the ranch headquarters. Over the years the ranch was gradually reduced in size as longtime employees like George Doshier, Wint Bairfield, Mitch Bell, and Jim Christian began their own operations on former JA lands. In 1917 Edward D. Harrell purchased the acreage where the old Home Ranch was located, and the Mulberry Ranch, named for the creek that drains it, was formed out of the JA's Mulberry Division.

After Walsh resigned as a manager in 1910, John S. Summerfield served for a year in that capacity and then was succeeded by James W. Wadsworth, Jr., a nephew of Cornelia Adair. Wadsworth held that position until 1915, when he was elected to the United States Senate from his home state of New York. At that time, Timothy D. Hobart of Pampa was named to succeed him; he and Henry C. Coke, a Dallas attorney, were named executors of Cornelia Adair's estate after her death in December 1921. In her will she left the bulk of the JA properties to her son, Jack Ritchie, and his heirs. Clinton Henry came as the ranch bookkeeper in 1924 and assisted Hobart in the management. In 1935, after Hobart and Coke died, Montgomery H. W. (Monte) Ritchie took over as manager. J. W. Kent retired in 1940, after having worked for a record number of years (since 1883) for the JA. Not until 1948 was the Adair estate, with its accompanying debts and inheritances, entirely settled. By 1945 the JA's operations were confined to 335,000 acres in Armstrong, Briscoe, Donley, and Hall counties. Subsequently, a tract of 130,000 acres was divided into eight leaseholds to decrease labor

and costs further. Watered by the Prairie Dog Town Fork and its tributaries plus several hundred natural lakes, dirt tanks, and fifty-eight wells, the ranch had twelve winter branch camps and five farms that raised feed for the livestock. The winter range in Palo Duro Canyon afforded maximum protection, and the summer range was singularly free from land waste. Nearly two-thirds of the extant JA properties was rolling pastureland; even the land north and west of the headquarters was relatively flat. As of 1990 the ranch was substantially fenced and crossfenced and noted for its purebred Herefords and Angus bulls. Quarter horses were raised primarily for ranch use, and a small buffalo herd was maintained; some commercial hunting of buffalo and deer was allowed. Tillable land continued to be leased. The Ritchie family also owned ranchland at Larkspur, Colorado, near Colorado Springs.

In 1988 the JA headquarters comprised several ranch outbuildings, including a supply store and garage, and was dominated by the "Big House," whose grounds were well manicured. A herd of longhorns, courtesy of the JA, roamed in Palo Duro Canyon State Scenic Park. In 1960 the house was designated a national historic landmark. Two of the JA's historic buildings, the old milk house and an oat bin, were given by Monte Ritchie to the Ranching Heritage Center at Lubbock in 1971 and 1988, respectively.

CORNELIA WADSWORTH RITCHIE ADAIR (1837-1821)

Comelia Wadsworth Adair, diarist and rancher, the second of the six children of Gen. James Samuel and Mary Craig (Wharton) Wadsworth, was born on April 6, 1837, in Philadelphia. She spent her early years at Hartford House, her father's country estate near Geneseo, New York. In 1855 the family left for a two-year sojourn in France and England. Soon after their return in 1857 Cornelia married Montgomery Ritchie, a grandson of Harrison Otis of Boston. Two sons were born to them. Her father and her husband died in 1864. The widowed Cornelia took her two small sons to Paris, where the older son died a few years later.

In 1867, while attending a ball in New York City given in honor of Congressman J. C. Hughes, Cornelia Ritchie met broker John G. Adair of Ireland. They were married in 1869 and afterward divided their time between America and their estates in England and Ireland. In the fall of 1874 they left Ireland to see the American West and to experience a buffalo hunt along the South Platte River in Nebraska and northeastern Colorado. Her brother had served as an aide to Philip H. Sheridan, and Cornelia Adair probably used the general's influence to obtain a military escort under Col. Richard Irving Dodge to accompany the party, which departed from Sydney Barracks in Nebraska Territory. She kept a detailed diary of the two-month journey, which included attending a council of cavalry officers and Oglala Sioux, near the South Platte. In 1918 she had it published.

In the summer of 1877, when her husband and Charles Goodnight formed a partnership to found the JA Ranch, Cornelia accompanied the party from Pueblo, Colorado, to the new ranch headquarters Goodnight had established in Armstrong County, Texas. Because the Adairs lived at the ranch only sporadically, Goodnight became its manager and, under orders from Cornelia Adair, paid high salaries for experienced, law-abiding ranchhands.

After Adair died in 1885, Cornelia became Goodnight's partner. In 1887 she traded a second ranch for his one-third interest in the JA, a share that comprised 336,000 acres, 48,000 cattle, assorted mules, horses, and equipment, and rights to the JA brand. Although she was a naturalized British subject and spent most of her time in Ireland, Cornelia Adair also maintained a home in Clarendon and contributed generously to various civic projects in the vicinity of the JA Ranch, which by 1917 covered half a million acres. She provided funds to build the Adair Hospital and the first YMCA building in Clarendon and strongly supported that community's Episcopal church. She also vigorously promoted the Boy Scout movement since she knew Lord Baden-Powell and many other of its British organizers. She died on September 22, 1921, and was buried next to her husband in Ireland. In 1984 the Adairs' Glenveagh Castle, which sheltered Belgian refugees during World War I, became an Irish national park.

JOHN GEORGE ADAIR (1823-1885)

John George Adair, Panhandle cattleman, was an English aristocrat of Scots-Irish descent who owned vast estates in England and Ireland. He was educated and trained for the diplomatic service but entered the world of finance instead. In 1866 he made his first visit to the United States and established a brokerage firm in New York City for the purpose of placing British loans in America at higher interest rates than those in Britain. The following year, at a ball given in honor of Congressman J. C. Hughes, he met Mrs. Cornelia Wadsworth Ritchie, whom he married in 1869.

Over the next several years the couple divided their time between Ireland and America. In the fall of 1874 they went on a buffalo hunt along the South Platte River in Nebraska and northeastern Colorado, accompanied by a military escort from Sydney Barracks under Col. Richard Irving Dodge. Adair killed no buffalo but accidentally shot his horse and almost killed himself. Nevertheless, he liked the opportunities the West had to offer and in 1875 moved his brokerage business to Denver, Colorado. The firm made a loan to Charles Goodnight in March 1876, and Adair sought him out when he decided to enter the cattle business. They entered into a partnership on June 18, 1877, in which Adair furnished the money and Goodnight the herd for the JA Ranch in Palo Duro Canyon. The Adairs accompanied the Goodnight party from Pueblo, Colorado, to the ranch headquarters in Armstrong County and stayed just long enough to inspect the range, help tally the cattle, and hunt game before departing for their estate near Rathdair. Adair's

conventional, and sometimes arrogant, British mannerisms were received poorly by the cowboys; even Goodnight later admitted that his partner's overbearing attitude was irritating. However, when the original agreement expired in 1882, the ranch showed a profit of \$512,000, and the owners renewed the partnership for five more years.

In the spring of 1885 Adair made his third and final trip to the JA, accompanied by his personal valet. He died on his return trip at St. Louis, on May 14, 1885. His body was shipped to Rathdair for burial on his estate. His wife maintained the partnership with Goodnight until 1887 and her family still owns the JA today.

The STAR DAY Foundation of El Paso, Texas is pioneering and leading a Texas Conservation, Preservation and Restoration STEMS (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics and Service) project to inspire and motivate students with the support of their parents, grandparents and other relatives to explore and discover the exciting history and science of the Texas Southern Plains Bison whose ancestors may have been the ancient bison of China who may have migrated to Mongolia to Siberia and then across the Bering Land Bridge to modem Alaska and Canada nearly 100,000 years ago then down to the upper states and finally arriving in the Texas Plains Panhandle approximately 25,000 years ago. From time to time its fun to add a bit of legend to help students visualize history and science as the ancient people did all over the world to tell their stories by creating land monuments geometrically linked to classical constellations in the night sky that we recognize

The Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group) sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation was organized on September 12, 2010 in partnership with Presidio ISD Lucy Rede Franco Middle School under the supervision of School Principal Teresa Porras with the volunteer support of science teachers, parents and students as an after-school student enrichment program. The Group pioneered and led a Texas legislative initiative in 2011 that successfully designated the Goodnight Bison Herd (The Herd) at Caprock Canyons State Park as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas." Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, issued a "Commendation Letter" to honor and recognize the students, teachers and advisors of The Group for their legislative service achievement of merit in enhancing the story of Texas.

Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926) with the help of her husband Charles Goodnight (1836-1929) helped save the last free-roaming Texas Plains Bison calves from extermination and extinction in the late 1800's. The surviving 80 descendents today (2013) of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas (The Herd)" are now

maintained by the Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team at Caprock Canyons State Park in Briscoe County, Texas under the supervision of the Park Superintendent Donald Beard. Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926) is known as 'The Woman Who Saved The Texas Southern Plains Bison." Her birthday on September 12th has been designated by the Texas Sate Legislature in 2013 as proposed by The Group as 'The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Day" to honor and remember her life and achievements.

The Group designated a bison calf born in May 2013 at Caprock Canyons State Park as "BisonStar" with the guidance of Caprock Canyons State Park Interpretative Ranger and Volunteer Coordinator Le'Ann Pigg who has volunteered to serve as the Advisor for The Group The Group proposed the project sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation to pioneer and lead an effort to create a legend based in history and science about the Texas Southern Plains Bison in partnership The Marian Blakemore Planetarium in Midland, Texas under the direction of Planetarium Director Dr. Andrew Kerr and in partnership with members of the West Texas Astronomy Club. "The Great Texas BisonStar Sky Constellation (The Sky Constellation)" Project"

The Sky Constellation created is composed of 254 stars, one for each Texas County in the State of Texas. The Constellation is illustrated by 38 generally visible framework stars high in the sky in the southern sky rising in September each year. The 38 framework stars form 39 constellation segments as depicted in the diagram. The Sky Constellation represents a Texas Southern Plains Bison named "BisonStar" roaming free across the night sky forever. Each star trailing "BisonStar" represents the historical spirit of each Texas Southern Plains Bison that once roamed free on the land that is now known as the State of Texas today over thousands and thousands of years. Each "Spirit Bison" is a member of "The Great Texas BisonStar Spirit Herd."

NOTE: The Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Volunteers organized by The STAR DAY Foundation in 2000 is an organization of student and adult volunteers that help carry out the Mission of The STAR DAY Foundation. The student volunteers of The Texas Bison Student Study Group who enlist in the effort to save and make donations to The STAR DAY Foundation with the help of their parents and other relatives to support the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" do so as a service achievement of merit STAR DAY birthday gift for the State of Texas. The Fund is dedicated to supporting additional conservation, preservation and restoration initiatives of park land and "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" for the people of Texas.

HARLAN JAMES SMITH (1924-1991)

Born on August 25, 1924, Harlan J. Smith was the son of Paul and Anna McGregor Smith in West Virginia He lived for the first eighteen years of his life in the same house on Wheeling Island-the only inhabited island on the Ohio River. His father was in the building supply business, which was not good during the depression.

Harlan attended Wheeling public schools, enhancing the moderate intellectual challenges presented by playing a game doing everything as nearly perfect as possible. He did this to such good effect that he won the prize for highest grades right through high school. His older brother Kenneth was determined to become a chemist (and did so), and Harlan was always convinced that he too would become some kind of scientist. Astronomy was singled out by the Buck Rogers radio serial, by the Boy Scout astronomy merit badge, and by using a 6inch reflector telescope which had been built by a local Catholic priest and donated to the city. He graduated from Wheeling High School in 1942, the same year he was first runner-up in the first Westinghouse National Science Talent Search. After some college in Ohio, Smith joined the U. S. Army Air Corps in February 1943, and served until the end of World War II

In summer 1946 he went to Harvard University where he earned his bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees in astronomy. During Harlan's first year in graduate school he met Joan Swift Greene, a Radcliffe student. They were married 18 months later, in December 1950. While writing his doctoral dissertation, he landed a teaching post at Yale University in 1953.

He remained at New Haven, Conn., until 1963 when he accepted the challenge of becoming both the first Texas-based director of the University of Texas at Austin's McDonald Observatory in the Davis Mountains of west Texas and chairman of the university's small astronomy department. Under his leadership, the McDonald Observatory grew to become an international scientific attraction and he built the university's astronomy department into the largest in the nation.

In the area of pure scientific research, Smith made his mark by discovering the optical variability, and thus small size, of quasars; studying the influence of solar wind on radio emissions from Jupiter; and discovering the existence of a class of variable stars known as dwarf Cepheid's, or Delta Scuti stars. Harlan served on the National Academy of Sciences ad hoc Committee on the Large Space Telescope, a project that eventually resulted in the Hubble Space Telescope.

Among the first astronomers to realize the importance of ground-based observations in the planning and support of space missions, he convinced NASA to fund the McDonald Observatory's gigantic 107-inch reflector telescope for that purpose. NASA still supports planetary research on that telescope, which the University of Texas dedicated in July 1995 as the Harlan J. Smith Telescope. The University of Texas also established an endowment in Smith's name at the McDonald Observatory and honored him with the creation of a professorship in astronomy named for him.

Smith helped create "StarDate," a two-minute syndicated daily radio broadcast about planetary happenings, heard weekly by 10 million people in the United States and Canada. During his years teaching at Yale, he also wrote and produced the award-winning "Story of the Universe" educational film series and became active in national astronomical affairs as the co-editor of Astronomical Journal and as acting secretary of the American Astronomical Society.

He retired from the McDonald Observatory in 1989, focusing his remaining years on teaching and on space. Smith died at age 67 on Oct. 17, 1991, after a battle with cancer.



CHARLIE MARY NOBLE (1877-1959)

Charlie Mary Noble, teacher of mathematics and astronomy, was born to a pioneer family at Giddings, Texas, in 1877. She attended Warren Institute in Fort Worth, Sam Houston State College, the University of Texas (B.S.), and Texas Christian University (M.S.). She taught in the Fort Worth public schools for forty-six years, beginning in 1897; for twenty-five of these years she was head of the mathematics department of Paschal High School. She retired from the school system in 1943.

Because of her knowledge of astronomy she was asked to teach mathematics, astronomy, and celestial navigation at Texas Christian University as part of the United States Navy's V-12 officer training course during World War II. After the war, she taught astronomy at the institution.

In 1947 Noble organized the Junior Astronomy Club at the Fort Worth Children's Museum (now the Fort Worth Museum of Science and History). This group met once a week and stressed individual observation and reports. Through this club, and her efforts to establish other astronomy clubs in Texas and elsewhere, young people were encouraged to study the universe. Charlie Noble developed a telescope rental library and, during the country's early experiments with satellites, organized a group for the purpose of visual tracking.

In 1951 she aided Henry M. Neely, lecturer and teacher at the Hayden Planetarium in New York City, by having her classes try a method that he thought would aid instructors in navigation. In 1956 Neely paid tribute to Noble in The Stars by Clock and Fist. Her friendship with Neely also brought about the publication of "The Texas Sky," a monthly folder sent to over 1,000 Texas school children. The procedures developed by Noble for junior astronomers were so successful that her methods

were adopted nationally by the Junior Division of the Astronomical League.

Charlie Noble was a member of the Woman's Club, the Daughters of the American Revolution, Colonial Dames, Delta Kappa Gamma, the Lecture Foundation, the Faculty Women's Club of Texas Christian University, the Texas Academy of Science, and the Tarrant County Historical Society. In 1950 she was awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree from Texas Christian University for her wartime teaching activities and her outstanding work in astronomy. In 1954 she was given the Altrusa Civic Award as "First Lady of Fort Worth" for her work in stimulating interest in astronomy among young people.

In 1955 the Fort Worth Children's Museum dedicated and named their planetarium in her honor. She was the regional director of the Southwestern Division, Astronomical League of America, and in 1956 was the first woman to win that league's annual award for outstanding achievements in astronomy. Miss Noble died on November 30, 1959, in Fort Worth and was buried in Greenwood Cemetery. She was an Episcopalian. A Charlie Mary Noble Memorial Astronomy Fund was established to further her work.

JOHN LOWRY DOBSON (1915-2014)

John Lowry Dobson (September 14, 1915 – January 15, 2014) was an amateur astronomer and is best known for the Dobsonian telescope, a portable, low-cost Newtonian reflector telescope. His design is considered revolutionary since it allowed amateur astronomers to build fairly large telescopes (Light Buckets). He was less known for his efforts to promote awareness of astronomy (and his unorthodox views of cosmology) through public lectures including his performances of "sidewalk astronomy." John Dobson was also the co-founder of the amateur astronomical group, the San Francisco Sidewalk Astronomers.

John Dobson was born in Beijing, China where his parents were Methodist missionaries. His maternal grandfather founded Peking University, his mother was a musician, and his father taught zoology at the University. As a child, he said, he lay on his back, gazed upward and imagined the sky as a vast ocean. He and his parents moved to San Francisco, California in 1927. His father accepted a teaching position at Lowell High School and taught there until the 1950s.

Dobson spent 23 years in a monastery, after which he became more active in promoting astronomy. Dobson's interest in telescope building was in part to better understand the universe, and in part to inspire in others a curiosity about the cosmos. To this end, he often offered assistance and corresponded about his work with those outside the monastery. Having left the order in 1967, Dobson in 1968 co-founded the San Francisco Sidewalk Astronomers, an amateur astronomy organization that aims to popularize astronomy among people on the street, along with Bruce Sams and Jeffery Roloff. Sams had built a large telescope but because he was only 12 at the time he was not eligible for membership in the only local club, the San Francisco Amateur Astronomers, thus the "San Francisco Sidewalk Astronomers" was born. It was also at this time that Dobson's simple form of telescope, which came to be known as the Dobsonian, became well known after he started

teaching classes to the public on how to make your own telescope.

John Dobson was most notable for being the originator and promoter of a design for a large, portable, low-cost reflecting telescope, the "Dobsonian telescope". [2] The design is a very simple, low cost alt-azimuth mounted Newtonian telescope that employs common materials such as plywood, formica, PVC closet flanges, cardboard construction tubes, recycled porthole glass, and indoor-outdoor carpet. Using this construction method makes the typical Dobsonian telescope large, portable, inexpensive, very stable, and easy to manufacture.

One of his favorite sayings is "If you figure something out for yourself, it doesn't make no nevermind who figured it out first, its' yours." His life of enthusiastic, selfless public service and his genuine love and concern for this planet and those that live on it are the foundation and guiding principle of The Sidewalk Astronomers Association.

Dobson died in Burbank, California on January 15, 2014. He passed away at age 98 and was active teaching, traveling, and doing sidewalk astronomy until 6 years before his death. In his 90's he would probably be the oldest sidewalk astronomer on the planet. Dobson had a son, Loren, with Ruth Ballard, a professor of genetics at Sacramento State University. They both survive him.

Art's program shall also introduce to attendees "The Great Texas BisonStar Constellation" created by "The Texas Astronomy Student Study Group" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation to honor "BisonStar" the "Official Mascot" of "The Texas Bison Student Study Group." BisonStar was born at the park during May 2013 and is one of the last descendants of "The Great Texas Southern Plains Bison Herd."

# October 23, 2010-An Expedition to The Shafter Silver Mine

The State of Texas has customarily recognized a variety of official symbols as tangible representations of the state's culture and history.

The precious metal silver has played a prominent role in the story of the Lone Star State, and it continues to be a visible part of Texas culture, reflecting the enduring influence of Spanish colonial design and the western heritage that is so much a part of the state's lore.

Silver has been mined in Texas for more than three centuries, beginning shortly after the Spanish established their first permanent settlements in the area in the late 1600s; the first mines were founded by Franciscan friars who dug for silver deposits near El Paso, and these same sites were worked periodically for the next 200 years.

In the late 1800s, prospectors began exploring other parts of West Texas, with figures such as John W. Spencer, Samuel B. Buckley, Lieutenant John L. Bullis, and Colonel William R. Shafter focusing their efforts on Presidio County; this led to the opening of the Shafter Mining District, which was the site of the famous Presidio Mine; operated between 1884 and 1947, it produced more than 90 percent of all the silver that has ever been mined in Texas and became a prominent business that spurred greater development in the Big Bend region.

Other mining districts in the state also yielded silver; Hudspeth and Culberson Counties were home to the Van Hom-Allamore and the Plata Verde Districts, and Hudspeth County also contained the Quitman Mountains District; in addition, Brewster County was the site of the Altuda Mountain District, and mining took place at locations in Llano, Mason, and Gillespie Counties in the Hill Country; in total, Texas mines yielded more than 33 million fine ounces of silver, which had a value of nearly \$23.5 million, between 1885 and 1952; the manual labor of carving these riches from the rocks fell to a hardy group of miners who, in true Texan fashion, used their skill and determination to complete a difficult and dangerous job.

Most mining came to an end in the 1950s, but interest in harvesting the state's silver deposits continues; 20 million troy ounces of the metal are believed to still remain in the Shafter Mining District, and resources of this kind may prove profitable given silver's widespread use in commercial and industrial applications, where it plays a role in everything from photography to coin making, x-rays, water treatment, and electronics.

Jewelry makers and other artisans also rely on this precious metal, and the stately sheen of silver is a key element in beautiful stylistic designs, both rustic and refined, that can be seen throughout Texas; in belt buckles, tie clasps, and boot decorations, it is a staple of the western-wear fashions that harkens back to the state's pioneer past; moreover, silver's rich, pure luster also makes it a favorite material for religious jewelry and other devotional objects, as well as any item or decoration that may benefit from its luxurious, glittering hues.

In both its historical and economic significance and its enduring connections to Texas imagery and culture, silver is a fitting symbol for the state and its people, and it is indeed appropriate that this metal receive special legislative recognition.

NOTE: The text above is the actual text of House Concurrent Resolution (HCR 102) filed on February 19, 2007, STAR DAY, by State Representative Pete P. Gallego, Jr. at the request of The Texas Silver Student Study Group (The Group). The bill designates "Silver" as the "Official State Precious Metal of Texas." State Senator Carlos Uresti volunteered to act as the bill's sponsor. The Group was organized on October 16, 2006, the birthday of Major General William Rufus Shafter (1835-1906), at Presidio ISD Lucy Rede Franco Middle School (LRFMS) as an Expanded Learning Opportunity Network (ELON) after-school student enrichment program under the supervision of School Principal Teresa Porras sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation and guided by volunteer teachers, parents and advisors. The primary goals of The Group are: to provide students with the opportunity to explore and discover the history, heritage and uses of silver; to study and learn about the silver mining and ore processing technologies being pioneered and led by the Aurcana Corp. of Vancouver, British Columbia, owner of the Shafter Silver Mine in Presidio County; to honor and remember the life and achievements of the mine founders and early pioneers and leaders of the Shafter community; to evaluate and recommendation donation premium gift applications of Texas silver and to plan, develop and conduct expeditions to explore and discover the mine in partnership with area schools. Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, issued a Commendation Letter to honor and recognize the LRFMS principal, teachers and students for their service achievement of merit in proposing HCR 102.

JANUARY 28, 2010 -CITY OF PRESIDIO-The City of Presidio Council approved a City of Presidio student proposed resolution to designate June 24th each year as "THE JOHN WILLIAM SPENCER DAY" in the City of Presidio to honor and remember the life and achievements of John William Spencer (1818-1898), an early Presidio settler and a founder of the Shafter Silver Mine (1883-1942). Spencer family members and City Council members gathered to celebrate the adoption of the Spencer resolution. The City of Presidio also approved a student proposed resolution to designate October 16th each year as "THE WILLIAM RUFUS SHAFTER DAY" in the City of Presidio to honor and remember the life and achievements of Major General William Rufus Shafter (1835-1906), a Civil War Medal of Honor recipient and a founder of the Shafter Silver Mine. Spencer and Shafter pioneered and led an effort as business partners to open up the mine in 1883. The Spenser and Shafter City of Presidio resolutions were proposed by "THE TEXAS SILVER STUDENT STUDY GROUP (THE GROUP)" at Lucy Rede Franco Middle School in partnership with The STAR DAY Foundation. City of Presidio Councilman John Ferguson (High School Band Director) sponsored the resolutions at the request of THE GROUP. The Aurcana Company of Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, the current owner of the mine, is pioneering and leading an effort to reopen the mine. The Aurcana Company in partnership with The STAR DAY Foundation is sponsoring a "School History and Science Field Trip" to mine on October 23, 2010 for LRFMS students. Mr. Michael Vogel, a LRFMS 7th grade Texas History Teacher and member of THE GROUP, and his students pioneered and led a successful legislative effort in partnership with their State Representative Pete Gallego and State Senator Carlos Uresti in 2007 to designate "SILVER" as the "Official Precious Metal of Texas" while participating in "The PALS of Texas Junior Legislators 2007 Program" sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation

JOHN WILLIAM SPENCER (1818-1898)

The Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Texas has paid tribute during the 80<sup>th</sup> State of Texas Legislature by passing Senate Resolution (SR) 1158 and House Resolution (HR) 434 to remember the life and achievements of John William Spencer (1818-1898) and has recognized his descendants on the grand occasion of their 2007 family reunion.

The first expedition to the Presidio territory was led by the Spaniard Cabeza de Vaca in 1536; the founding of the Mexican Presidio settlement for Spain in 1581 by Fray Juan Dominguez de Mendoza and Padre Fray Nicholas Lopez led to the establishment of the present City of Presidio, which is located at the confluence of Cibolo Creek, the Concho River, and the Rio Grande. In 1746, the Spanish explorers were the first to build, administer, and control the Presidio; they stationed a garrison of men at Presidio de Belen in 1760.

John William Spencer was born on June 24, 1818 and passed away on September 18, 1898 and is buried in Presidio County. In the spring of 1848 John William Spencer entered Texas at Indianola; he traveled throughout South Texas and Mexico, and upon settling in Presidio, he became one of the first settlers and entrepreneurs of the Presidio Valley.

John William Spencer and Ben Leaton contributed to the development of local and regional commerce by opening a retail business in Presidio that served the settlers arriving in the Presidio Valley. In 1860, John William Spencer established the Spencer Brothers General Store, from which he sold dry goods and provisions to the communities of the Presidio Valley and Ojinaga, Chihuahua, Mexico, thus serving the border region of the United States and Mexico.

On April 5, 1861, the Honorable Edward

Clark, governor of the State of Texas, appointed John William Spencer to the Office of Notary Public in and for the County of El Paso. John William Spencer was a man of strong character, generosity, and integrity who instilled these traits in his children and grandchildren; he was known for his charitable deeds on behalf of those families of few resources who resided in the border region.

In 1883, John William Spencer discovered areas rich with silver ore in the Chinati Mountains, samples of which he took to General William R. Shafter, who was garrisoned at Shafter, Texas.

In 1885, the Presidio Mining Company was organized by John William Spencer and General Shafter; the company continued to operate until the early 1900s, contributing significantly to the economy of Texas and regions of Mexico.

Over the years, John William Spencer's descendants have generously contributed to their respective communities, the State of Texas, and our country through their military service and their hard work as attorneys, health professionals, educators, civil servants, law enforcement officials, and entrepreneurs.

NOTE: On January 28, 2010, the Presidio City Council approved a resolution at the request of students designating the 24th day of June each year in the City of Presidio as "THE JOHN WILLIAM SPENCER DAY" to observe the birthday of John William Spencer and to share with students his life and achievements as a first pioneer and leader of Presidio County and a founder of the Shafter Silver Mine (1883-1942). The text of this bookmarker was drawn from SR 1158 and HR 434. The STAR DAY Foundation formally inducted John William Spencer into The First Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) Hall of Honor on October 24, 2007, at a commemoration event conducted at Lucy Rede Franco Middle School in Presidio to honor Franco Middle School Texas History Teacher Michael Vogel and his participating students in The PALS of Texas Junior Legislators Program for their service achievement of merit for proposing and supporting the introduction of House Concurrent Bill (HCR 102) designating SILVER as the "Official Precious Medal of Texas." The bill was authored by State Representative Pete Gallego and sponsored by State Senator Carlos Uresti. State Representative Gallego filed HCR 102 on STAR DAY, February 19, 2007, the birthday of the Great State of Texas. Mr. Vogel nominated John William Spencer to be inducted into The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor. The John William Spencer Post of The Junior PALS of Texas has been formally organized in Presidio on June 24,

WILLIAM RUFUS SHAFTER (1835-1906)

William R. (Pecos Bill) Shafter, United States Army officer, son of Hugh Morris and Eliza (Sumner) Shafter, was born on October 16, 1835, near Galesburg, Michigan. He had two brothers and one sister. After completing an elementary school education, Shafter worked on his father's farm and taught school at Galesburg, Mendon, and Athens, Michigan.

In 1861 he enrolled in Prairie Seminary, but when the Civil War broke out he left school to join a local volunteer regiment. During the war he took part in several campaigns, including the battle of Ball's Bluff and the Peninsular campaign. He was captured at Thompson's Station, Tennessee, in March 1863 and spent several months in a Confederate prison. After his release he was transferred to the regular army and served as an officer in the Seventeenth United States Colored Infantry, a regiment of black troops, in the battle of Nashville in December 1864.

Shafter was commissioned a lieutenant colonel after the war and went to Louisiana briefly before a transfer in 1867 took him to Texas. He served as lieutenant colonel of the all-black Twenty-fourth United States Infantry along the Rio Grande until 1868, when he moved to Fort Clark in West Texas. After 1870 Shafter served primarily as a field commander. He executed his assignments with vigor despite his physical bulk, which would have slowed most men. Working under Col. Ranald S. Mackenzie. Shafter commanded scouting expeditions and campaigns against hostile Indians. He led several excursions into the Llano Estacado and Big Bend areas, thus proving these regions accessible to the military despite their barrenness. His expeditions also deprived hostile forces of the psychological and military advantage of safe refuge. Shafter's most renowned feat in West Texas was the Llano Estacado campaign of 1875.

Combining two companies of his Twenty-fourth Infantry with parts of the Twenty-fifth United States Infantry and Tenth United States Cavalry and a company of Seminole Indian scouts, Shafter drove his men more than 2,500 miles from June to December. Often exhausted and short of water, the troops made three crossings of the Llano Estacado and swept the plains clear of Indians. Shafter's campaign also proved the plains habitable and paved the way for white settlement of the region.

Between 1876 and the end of 1878 Shafter led three separate campaigns into Mexico against Indians. He became colonel of the First Infantry in 1879 and the following year participated in the war against Victorio, the great Apache leader.

In 1883, John William Spencer (1818-1898) discovered areas rich with silver ore in the Chinati Mountains of Presidio County, Texas, samples of which he took to Lt. Col. William R. Shafter, who was then garrisoned at Shafter, Texas. In 1885, the Presidio Mining Company was organized by John William Spencer and Lt. Col. Shafter; the company continued to operate until the early 1900s, contributing significantly to the economy of Texas and regions of Mexico.

After leaving Texas, Shafter served in Arizona before a transfer in 1886 took him to California. In 1890-91 he was in South Dakota helping to return Indians to Pine Ridge after the Wounded Knee massacre .He was promoted in 1897 to brigadier general and in 1898 led American troops to Cuba during the Spanish-American War, in which he commanded the largest force of United States troops that had left American soil up to that time. Shafter was a Republican and a Protestant. He married Harriet Grimes in 1862, and they had one child, Mary. In 1895 Shafter received the Medal of Honor for meritorious service in the Civil War. Shortly after his promotion to major general in 1901, he retired to his sixty-acre farm adjoining his daughter's ranch near Bakersfield, California. On November 12, 1906, Shafter, terribly overweight, died at his daughter's home from an intestinal obstruction complicated by pneumonia. He was buried next to his wife at the Presidio in San Francisco, California.

BRIG GENERAL JOHN L. BULLIS (1841-1911)

May 26, 2011, marks the centennial of the death of United States Army Brigadier General John Lapham Bullis, commander of the famed Black Seminole Scouts and a hero of the Texas frontier.

Born in Macedon, New York, in 1841, John Bullis enlisted in the 126th New York Volunteer Infantry in 1862 and was wounded and captured twice during the Civil War, in the battles of Harpers Ferry and Gettysburg; following 10 months in the notorious Libby Prison, he was released in an exchange of combatants and was commissioned as a captain in the 118th Infantry, U. S. Colored Troops, a volunteer regiment composed entirely of African American enlisted men and white officers.

General Bullis briefly ran a business on the Mississippi River after the war and was commissioned in the Regular Army as a second lieutenant in 1867; although many other white officers scorned African American regiments, he served with the 41st Infantry and then requested a transfer to the new 24th Infantry, a consolidation of three Colored Infantry regiments; he was stationed at Fort Clark in the borderlands, where property raids and attacks on settlers were a regular occurrence, and assumed command of a remarkable group of scouts, skillful trackers descended from escaped slaves who had intermarried with members of the Seminole tribe and eventually settled in the Santa Rosa Mountains of northern Mexico.

Resolute and resourceful, General Bullis earned the nickname "the Whirlwind," leading the Black Seminole Scouts during the Red River War and on numerous missions to track raiders from the Comanche and Apache tribes; in one celebrated battle, he and three scouts took on more than two dozen Lipan Apaches before they ran low on ammunition and were forced to retreat; General Bullis's horse was lost, but his comrades returned for

him under fire and he was able to leap up behind his sergeant and escape on his steed; the scouts were awarded Congressional Medals of Honor.

The stoicism, valor, and fairness General Bullis demonstrated won the complete loyalty of his men; he lived off the land and suffered severe privations alongside them, and they gladly followed him even on a pursuit all the way to New Mexico Territory, which kept them in the saddle for 80 days and more than 1,200 miles; over the course of 8 years, he led his scouts in 26 battles, yet not one was killed or seriously injured; he received brevet citations for his gallant service, as well as recognition from the Texas Legislature, and the people of West Texas and residents of Kinney County showed their gratitude by presenting him with engraved swords.

Once the area had become comparatively calm, General Bullis was transferred to Indian Territory, and he was later appointed the paymaster at Fort Sam Houston, with the rank of major; he served in Cuba during the Spanish-American War and in the Philippines during the Philippine Insurrection; the day before his retirement in 1904, President Theodore Roosevelt promoted him to brigadier general in recognition of his outstanding achievements.

John Bullis settled in San Antonio and established himself as a successful businessman, investing in real estate and the Shafter silver mines, and he helped to promote the settlement of West Texas; in addition, he remained a stalwart advocate for the Black Seminole Scouts, trying in vain to obtain for them the military benefits and land grants that the federal government had promised; he died in San Antonio on May 26, 1911, and is buried in the San Antonio National Cemetery; a military camp just north of San Antonio was named Camp Bullis in his honor in 1917.



# THE SEAL OF THE OFFICIAL STATE BISON HERD OF TEXAS FUND

Every Texan knows that these are difficult economic times for Texas families, businesses, and all levels of community, county and state government. The State of Texas had to recently pioneer and lead a special effort to balance its budget with the result that state agencies and their programs had to consolidate and in some cases eliminate or greatly reduce support for important programs. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department budget was reduced with the result that park programs and other sites had to maintain services with less funding. The Caprock Canyons State Park located near Quitaque in Briscoe County is home to descendants of The Great Texas Southern Plains Bison Herd. Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1826) with the help of her husband, Charles Goodnight (1836-1929), are responsible for saving a small herd of thirty six (36) Texas Southern Plains' bison found on The JA Ranch in Palo Duro Canyon and donated to the park in 1996 by The JA Ranch where Charles Goodnight was the first JA Ranch Manager in 1876. The herd today is known as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas, a State of Texas Treasure!" Numbering approximately 120 bison today (2016), the herd is one of the very last genetically pure Texas Southern Plains Bison Herds in the nation! The STAR DAY Foundation has pioneered and led an effort to organize and maintain The Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group) since 2010 composed on volunteer adults and students at partnering Texas schools and home schooling families to provide an opportunity for students to explore and discover the story of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas" and with the help of their parents and others raise donations each year as a STAR DAY service achievement of merit birthday gift for the State of Texas to enhance the conservation, preservation and restoration of park land and support the work of the Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team under the supervision of the Caprock Canyons State Park Superintendent. The Motto of The Group is-"WORK HARD, HAVE FUN AND MAKE HISTORY!" The STAR DAY Foundation proposed on September 12,

The interest generated by The Fund each year shall support an annual grant from The STAR DAY Foundation to the Superintendent of Caprock Canyons State Park to pioneer and lead additional conservation, preservation and restoration initiatives to help enhance the park land and "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas-A State of Texas Treasure!" for the people of Texas. The reverse side of each Texas Silver BisonStar Donation Coin shall feature the "Official Seal" of the State of Texas. The Texas Bison Student Study Group invited Governor Rick Peny, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, to authorize the use of the "Official Seal" of the State of Texas to support the manufacturing of a "Texas Silver BisonStar Donation Coin Series" to help raise funds to support the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund." The Texas Department of State issued a license to use the "Official Seal" of The State of Texas to The Texas BisonStar Mint Corporation.

NOTE: Each Texas Silver BisonStar Donation Coin shall represent the "Spirit" of a Texas Southern Plains Bison that once roamed free on the land that is now the State of Texas. The "Spirits" of Texas Southern Plains Bison now roam free across the night sky in "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Monument Sky Valley" a Texas Flag shaped patch a sky just east behind "The Great Texas BisonStar Constellation" which rises in the month of September in the southern sky. The Great Texas BisonStar Constellation features 254 stars with a star representing each Texas County. The Constellation design and fantasy legend are illustrated at the website of The STAR DAY Foundation. The STAR. DAY Foundation shall invite Texans and friends of Texas worldwide to volunteer to challenge and encourage their school children to pioneer and lead an effort to explore and discover "The Great Bison of Texas" and to save and donate to support the goals and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund" as their annual STAR DAY service achievement of merit STAR DAY birthday gift for Texas.

The Constellation research and development program in 2011 was proposed by The Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group). The Group is sponsored each year at one or more schools by The STAR DAY Foundation as an after-school student enrichment program supervised by a school principal and guided by volunteer teachers, librarians, parents and community members.



#### DENNIS MICHAEL KULVICKI

Mr. Kulvicki has been the President of The State of Texas Anniversary Remembrance (STAR) Day Foundation for the last 18 years. The STAR. DAY Foundation is headquartered in El Paso. Mr. Kulvicki also acts the lead Storyteller and Story Bookmark author of The First Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Hall of Honor and Library sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation. Mr. Kulvicki has a Masters of Arts degree earned from the University of Texas at Austin in Mathematics. He completed his undergraduate mathematics studies at Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) in Portales, New Mexico. He has served as a faculty member of the Department of Mathematics at the College of the Mainland in Galveston County for 5 years. He had been a pioneer and lead Consultant and Workshop developer and presenter for the Society for Applied Learning Technology (SALT) Foundation of Warrenton, Virginia for 10 years. Mr. Kulvicki was a member of the Galveston County Historical Commission for 4 years and served as a member of the El Paso County Historical Commission for 3 years.

Mr. Kulvicki was born on Good Friday morning, March 22, 1940 in Hudson County, Jersey City, New Jersey at Saint Francis Hospital. He is the oldest of the 14 children of Edward and Marion Buckley Kulvicki. He attended and graduated from Sacred Heart School and Saint Peters Preparatory High School in Jersey City.

Mr. Kulvicki arrived in Texas on August 14, 1958 at Lackland Air Force Base as an Air Force volunteer. After basic training, he trained at the Missile Guidance and Electronics School at Lowry Air Force Base in Denver Colorado. His first duty assignment was with the USAF 51 A&E Squadron at Naha Air Force Base on Okinawa. After serving 18 months overseas, he was assigned as a Missile Guidance System Research and Development technician with the rank of Airman First Class at

Holloman AFB in Alamogordo, New Mexico for the remained of his four year tour of duty which ended on August 12, 1962.

After his military service, Mr. Kulvicki entered Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) in Portales, New Mexico as a freshman in January 1963 majoring in mathematics and physics. Mr. Kulvicki founded the first Veterans Club and German Club at ENMU in partnership with faculty and students. Mr. Kulvicki also pioneered and led and effort with faculty, student and community volunteers to establish and maintain The Blue Tree Coffee House in Portales in 1967 to serve as an offcampus social club for students featuring music and classical movies. Mr. Kulvicki had the opportunity to work as a part-time physics laboratory assistant and taught the first freshman astronomy course at ENMU. Mr. Kulvicki built the first telescope and astro-camera at ENMU. Mr. Kulvicki is an avid Amateur Astronomer in El Paso today.

Mr. Kulvicki is a proud father of three children: Alayne D., Michael M. and Daniel B. Alayne graduated from Southwestern University in Georgetown and the University of North Texas Health Sciences Medical School in Fort Worth. Alayne is now a University Assistant Professor in Medicine and a Gerontology and Geriatrics Researcher. Michael and Daniel both graduated from Texas A&M University at College Station majoring in Computer Software Engineering and both are currently employed as software engineers.

When Daniel was a 9th grade student at Galveston County Dickinson High School, he proposed the concept of STAR DAY in his U. S. history class paper to honor and remember the life and achievements of his ancestor, Lorenzo Van Cleve (1806-1858) who was the first furniture maker in Austin in 1839 and to commemorate the birthday of the State of Texas. On February 19, 1846, James Pinckney Henderson (1808-1858), was inaugurated as the first governor of the State of Texas in Austin. Van Cleve built the platform used at the inaugural event. Lorenzo and Margaret Smith Van Cleve attended the event. There first child has been noted as the first girl of record born in Austin in 1841.

Daniel with the help of Dickinson Mayor Mitchiner, Galveston County Judge Yarbrough, State Rep. Eiland, and State Sen. Jackson along with all 253 remaining County Judges were able to encourage the 76<sup>th</sup> State Legislature in 1999 to pass Daniel's STAR DAY bill. The STAR DAY bill states that all Texas public schools and other organizations shall celebrate the birthday of the State of Texas on the 19<sup>th</sup> of February each year with appropriate and patriotic programs to inspire a greater appreciation of the history of the state.

WILLIAM ELMO MERREM (1897-1982)

Accomplished Texans who serve as positive role models for today's youth are deserving of special recognition, and one such individual is Shiner native William Elmo Merrem, the first person in the Lone Star State to become an Eagle Scout.

Born on May 22, 1897, Mr. Merrem was the son of Edgar Jacob Merrem and Willie Crane Merrem and grew up in Shiner alongside his three siblings; he joined the town's first Boy Scout troop as a charter member, and on July 3, 1913, he was awarded the Eagle Badge; not only was he the first Texan to receive the highest rank that scouting offers, he also was the first person west of the Mississippi River to do so, and he joined that elite group when there were fewer than 50 Eagle Scouts in the entire United States.

The leadership and dedication that Mr. Merrem demonstrated as a Boy Scout served him well throughout his life; a 1914 graduate of Shiner High School, he served his nation during World War I as a pilot in the United States Marine Corps; after completing studies at Southwestern University, he went on to earn his law degree at The University of Texas at Austin School of Law and embarked on a distinguished career in business; he served as vice president of the Houston Oil Company, president of the Southwestern Settlement and Development Company, and founder and vice president of the East Texas Pulp and Paper Company, and he held prominent positions in the Texas and American Forestry Associations.

Mr. Merrem and his wife, the former Mary

Elizabeth Caldwell, were longtime residents of Houston and active members of the congregation at Saint Luke's United Methodist Church; through the years, he volunteered his time to assist various civic initiatives, and he was a 32nd-degree Mason who devoted more than 50 years to the charitable work of the Shriners; after a lifetime of service and achievement, he passed away on June 29, 1982, at the age of 85.

William Elmo Merrem (1897-1982) was nominated to be inducted into "The First Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Hall of Honor" by Brad Newton, City of Presidio, Texas Administrator, who is an Eagle Scout. William Elmo Merrem (1897-1982) has been formally inducted into The First Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Hall of Honor during "THE SPIRIT OF STAR DAY 2011 CELEBRATION" in the State Capitol Rotunda on February 18, 2011, to observe the 165th birthday of the State of Texas. The Shiner High School Band under the direction of Stephen Krupicka and Assistant Band Director Sara Brown performed a concert in the Texas State Capitol Rotunda as "THE OFFICIAL SPIRIT OF STAR DAY 2011 SCHOOL BAND." The Shiner High School Band had dedicated their concert performance in tribute to William Elmo Merrem (1897-1982), the First Texas Eagle Scout and 1914 graduate of Shiner High School. Band Director Krupicka volunteered and organized the band students as "The William Elmo Merrem Student Study Group" in partnership with The STAR DAY Foundation to explore and discover the life and achievements of William Elmo Merrem and to pioneer and lead an effort to invite the City of Shiner, Lavaca County and the State of Texas Legislature to designate May 22nd each year as "THE WILLIAM ELMO MERREM DAY" as a service achievement of merit to enhance the story of Texas for the people of Texas. The STAR DAY Foundation is a nonprofit 501(c)3 Texas corporation founded in 1999 to carry out the legislative intent of The STAR DAY bill (SB 1656 -76th State of Texas Legislative session) in partnership with Texas schools and other organizations to celebrate STAR DAY on the 19th of February each year with appropriate and patriotic programs.

The event was conducted on STAR DAY, February 18, 2011 in the State of Texas Capitol Rotunda beginning at 12 noon to celebrate the 165<sup>th</sup> birthday of the State of Texas featuring a Shiner High School Band performance under the direction of School Band Director Stephen Krupicka and Assistant Band Director Sara Brown.

**AUSTIN-FEBRUARY 19, 1846** 

On Thursday, February 19, 1846, two great Texas politicians met in front of the wood-planked Capitol building of the Republic of Texas in the City of Austin, Travis County to conduct one of the most important peace time flag services in the history of the United States. Dr. Anson Jones (1798-1858), the last President of the Republic of Texas, lowered the Lone Star flag of the Republic of Texas for the last official time at 12 noon and witnessed the flag of the United States being raised over the State of Texas, the 28th state of the Union, as James Pinckney Henderson (1808-1858) was sworn in as the first governor of the State of Texas to the cheers of a few thousand Austin residents and visitors.

The entry of Texas as the 28th state of the United States was a leading factor in the Republic of Mexico declaring war against the United States in 1846. Governor James Pinckney Henderson was formally invited by the first State of Texas Legislature to take a leave of absence from his duties as Governor and lead the State of Texas volunteers into battle which he did as an outstanding leader of men. Governor Henderson was formally honored by the United States Congress with commemorative sword for his feats of valor during the Mexican War.

The concept of "THE STATE OF TEXAS ANNIVERSARY REMEMBRANCE (STAR) DAY" was pioneered and led by Daniel B. Kulvicki, as a 9th grade United States History class paper at Dickinson High School in Galveston County. As part of his paper, Kulvicki invited City of Dickinson Mayor John Mitchiner to issue the first STAR DAY Proclamation on October 24, 1995 designating February 19, 1996 as STAR DAY in Dickinson.

The State of Texas was planning to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Texas statehood on February 19, 1996 as a birthday celebration with a huge cake in the shape of Texas in front of the Texas Capitol draped with a huge Texas flag. Kulvicki was invited to attend the event and participate in a gathering in the Texas Capitol hosted by Lt. Governor Bob Bullock before the birthday party event. Kulvicki brought with him copies of an "EXTRA" edition of "The North Galveston County Weekly News," his hometown newspaper. Editor Timothy Paulissen presented Kulvicki with a press credential letter designating Kulvicki as the official reporter of the newspaper to cover the birthday

party. Copies of the "EXTRA" edition were passed out to guests. In the "EXTRA" edition, Kulvicki included a copy of a broadsheet published in Austin on February 20, 1846 which told the story of the inauguration and featured the Valedictory Address presented by Dr. Anson Jones and the Inaugural Address presented by James Pinckney Henderson after being sworn in as the first governor on a wooden platform constructed by Lorenzo Vancleve (1806-1858), Kulvicki's ancestor. Vancleve is known as the first Texas furniture maker in Austin. Vancleve's oldest child, Eleanor Vancleve (1841-1900), has been recognized as the first girl of record born in the City of Austin.

Kulvicki invited State Representative Craig Eiland and State Senator Mike Jackson to pioneer and lead an effort to designate February 19th each year as STAR DAY during the 75th State legislative session convened in January 1997. The bill was introduced but failed to be passed. State Representative Craig Eiland again introduced the bill and State Senator Mike Jackson sponsored the bill during the 76th State of Texas Legislature at the request of Lt. Governor Rick Perry. The bill was signed into law by Governor George W. Bush on June 18, 1999. In order to show support for the bill, Kulvicki invited and received Memorial Resolutions from all 254 Texas County Judges, a first in Texas history in support of a legislative initiative. The support of all 254 Texas Counties for the passage of The STAR DAY Bill was pioneered and led by Galveston County Judge James D. Yarbrough and Loving County Judge Donald C. Creager.

The STAR DAY bill states that all Texas public schools and other organizations shall celebrate the birthday of the State of Texas on the 19th of February each year with appropriate and patriotic program to inspire a greater appreciation for the history of the state. During odd-years The STAR DAY Foundation pioneers and leads an effort to organize "THE SPIRIT OF STAR DAY CELEBRATION" in the Texas Capitol Rotunda featuring a school band concert, featured speakers and presentations. Since 2001, "THE SPIRIT OF STAR DAY SCHOOL ADDRESS" issued by the governor is share with Texas SCHOOLS and is read at the event by a student. The event is sponsored by Texas legislators representing the school band.

The STAR DAY Foundation was organized in 1998 and established in 1999 as a Texas nonprofit, 501(c)3 tax exempt organization with the MISSION to carry out the legislative intent of the STAR DAY Bill in partnership with all Texas public schools and the people of the Great State of Texas.

THE SPIRIT OF STAR DAY 2015 CELEBATION-FEBRUARY 19, 2015

State of Texas First Lady Cecilia Abbott, Comanche Nation of Oklahoma Chairman Wallace Coffey and The STAR DAY Foundation President Dennis M. Kulvicki met at the Texas State Capitol Rotunda sponsored by State Senator Troy Fraser to participate in "THE SPIRIT OF STAR DAY 2015 CELEBRATION" to celebrate the 169th birthday of the State of Texas on STAR DAY, Thursday, February 19, 2015 in partnership with delegations from schools and other organizations featuring a school band and school choir presentations.

The STAR DAY Foundation dedicated the event to honor and remember the sacrifices of the American service men and women who participated in the World War II "Iwo Jima Campaign" from February 19, 1845 through March 26, 1945 and to honor and recognize the living service men and women in Texas who are survivors on the occasion of the 70th anniversary of "IWO JIMA DAY." Governor Greg Abbott at the request of partnering schools issued "THE IWO JIMA DAY PROCLAMATION" designating February 19, 2015 as "IWO ЛМА DAY" in Texas. Governor Abbott also issued "THE SPIRIT OF STAR DAY 2015 School Address" dedicated to challenging and inspiring students to explore and discover the founding and founders of the State of Texas.

The event featured "THE IWO JIMA DAY" Posting of the Colors Ceremony which was performed by The Wilson County Floresville High School Air Force Junior ROTC Cadet Color Guard under the direction of Lt. Col. Steven Rakel and SGT. Walter Cook. The Air Force Junior ROTC CADET Choir presented a patriotic music program including the song "God Bless America." The Color Guard marched the US and State Flags around the Texas State Capitol Rotunda to the Podium to the stirring march "The National Emblem March" composed by E. E. Bagley and performed by the Gillespie County Fredericksburg High School Band.

The Invocation was presented by the Comanche Nation of Oklahoma Chairman Wallace Coffey in the Comanche language. Chairman Coffey lead a delegation of tribal leaders, Comanche Nation College administrators, teachers and students to witness the induction nominated by students of the Comanche leaders who pioneered and led the signing on May 9, 1847 in Fredericksburg of "The Meusebach-Comanche Peace Treaty." Representative Doug Miller authored "The John O. Meusebach Day" and "The Meusebach-Comanche Pease Treaty Day" House Resolutions for the event.

The Wilson County Floresville High School Junior Historians Club students sponsored by Tambria Read nominated and inducted several inductees into "The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor." The STAR DAY Foundation inducted twenty (20) Texas including First Lady Abbott who was noted as the "First Hispanic First Lady of the State of Texas."

The Gillespie County Fredericksburg High School Band and Choir also presented an outstanding STAR DAY music program. The Jefferson County Beaumont Charlton-Pollard Elementary School Choir performance was dedicated to their to two (2) first Beaumont school principals who where also inducted during the event.

FIRST LADY CECILIA P. ABBOTT LIVING INDUCTEE STORY BOOKMARK



The Pioneers and Leaders of the State (PALS) of Texas Volunteers was organized and announced by The STAR DAY Foundation on STAR DAY, February 19, 2001 at "The Spirit of STAR DAY Celebration" conducted in the Texas State Capitol Rotunda to observe the anniversary of 155th birthday of the great State of Texas. The PALS of Texas Volunteers was organized with the primary goals to pioneer and lead the effort to plan, develop and conduct the anniversary of the birthday of the great State of Texas on STAR DAY, the 19th of February each year, in partnership with Texas schools and the people of Texas; to pioneer and lead the effort to nominate and support the induction of Texans who are noted as being "First" in a walk-of-life in Texas into "The First Pioneers and Leaders of the State of Texas Hall of Honor" established by The STAR DAY Foundation on STAR DAY, February 19, 2000; and to pioneer and lead the effort to organize and support Texas Student Study Groups sponsored by The STAR DAY Foundation in partnership with Texas schools as after-school expanded learning opportunity student enrichment programs under the supervision of school principals.

The Texas Bison Student Study Group (The Group) was first organized at Lucy Rede Franco Middle School in Presidio, Texas under the supervision of School Principal Teresa Porras on September 12, 2010, the birthday of Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight (1839-1926), with the volunteer support of school science teachers and staff. The primary objectives of The Group are to provide students with the opportunity to explore and discover Texas ancient bison and the early people who hunted the bison in the Texas Plains over the years; to understand and appreciate the conservation, preservation and restoration work being pioneered and led by The Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team at Caprock Canyons State Park near Quitaque, Briscoe County, Texas dedicated to helping save the "Goodnight Bison Herd" for the people of Texas; to honor and remember the life and achievements of Molly and Charles Goodnight as the first Texas bison ranch family; to plan, develop and conduct school history and science field trips to partnering Texas bison ranches; and to study and evaluate school lunch menu applications of Texas bison ground meat in partnership with student families and school cafeteria staff. The Group shall also seek ways and means to help raise needed funds

to support the work of The Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team as a service achievement of merit to enhance the story of Texas for the people of Texas. Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, issued Commendation Letters to honor, recognize teachers and students of The Group for their service achievements of merit in proposing successful Texas legislative initiatives to designate the bison herd at Caprock Canyons State Park as "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas"; to designate September 12th on the State Calendar as "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Day" in Texas: and to designated March 5th on the State Calendar as "The Charles Goodnight Day" in Texas. Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight has been inducted into The First PALS of Texas Hall of Honor being noted as "The Woman Who Saved the Texas Plains Bison."

The STAR DAY Foundation and The PALS of Texas Volunteers with the help of teachers and students of The Group at partnering schools launched on September 12, 2013 at an event in Quitaque hosted by The Caprock Partners Foundation, "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund (The Fund)" created by The STAR DAY Foundation to pioneer and lead the effort to establish and maintain an "endowment fund" whose annual interest shall be presented to the Caprock Canyons State Park Superintended as a Texas Conservation, Preservation and Restoration Grant to support the work of The Official State Bison Herd of Texas management team to save and enhance "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas-a State of Texas Treasure!"

The Group invited Texas Governor Rick Perry, a 1999 STAR DAY Founder, to support a Partnership in Education Proposal Initiative that would authorize the use of the "Official Seal" of the great State of Texas as one side of a "Donation Coin" series that would be offered to students. Texas families and friends of Texas worldwide as a thankyou gift for making a donation to The STAR DAY Foundation to help pioneer and lead the goal and activities of "The Official State Bison Herd of Texas Fund." The Texas State Department issued a license to use the "Official Seal" to The Texas BisonStar Mint (TBM) Corporation organized by The STAR DAY Foundation to mint a series of "Donations Coins." The first donation coin is called "My BisonStar" and shall be introduced on September 12, 2014, "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Day" in Texas and the 175th anniversary of her birthday. "My BisonStar" shall weigh 1 gram and shall contain .999 pure silver with a diameter of 15mm. "My BisonStar" shall represent a newborn Texas Plains Bison "spirit" calf also of small weight and size saved by the donor that now roams free in "The Mary Ann (Molly) Goodnight Sky Valley" just east of "The Great Texas BisonStar Constellation."
